Rubel's Castle

What do you do when your mother's extravagant parties, located in an old citrus packing house, gets loud and out of hand? You begin building a small get-away house in an old one million gallon concrete reservoir using cement and disgarded champagne bottles.



Such was the case in 1960 when Michael Rubel began building what was to become Rubel Castle in Glendora. Six Model A's and twenty-five people made the trip to "Rubelia" and toured the grounds of this unbelievable structure.

In 1959 Michael Rubel purchased a 2 ½ acre citrus orchard and tried to make ends meet by farming frogs and vegetables. He was unsuccessful so he wound up following a boyhood dream and <u>compulsion</u> of building a castle. With his wide circle of friends, Rubel built the structure without architectural plans utilizing salvaged river rock, cement, steel, aluminum, telephone poles and wine bottles.



Rubel drove a school bus for work and after dropping the kids off he would drive down to the river bed in Azusa Canyon and load up the bus with the river rock.

The castle grew to be thousands of square feet with towers five stories high. One of these towers is seventy-five feet tall and is crowned with a clock and brass bells. It is powered by a restored 1890 Seth Thomas clock works. The "clock tower" began construction in 1964 and was completed in 1986. Most of the materials used to build the castle, including all of the cement, were donated. On the castle grounds one can find a 1940's-era Santa Fe Caboose in pristine condition, a 16-ton irrigation pump used to run a bird bath, a tree house, blacksmith and machine shops and a windmill donated from a ranch in Lompoc. There is also a mock cemetery with rejected marble tombstones. The castle was completed in 1986.

Before Rubel passed on in 2007, he presented the castle to the Glendora Historical society in 2005 to ensure its future. It was added to the National Register of Historical Places







in 2013.

After the castle tour, our group headed over to Pinnacle Peak Steakhouse for lunch. The restaurant has a no-tiesallowed policy that is said to be strictly enforced. Club members Frick and Kroeger, known as the "Jim's" decided to test that policy but alas, they weren't kidding. Their ties were cut off at the table.

Model A Year 1931

The year 1931 was the end of an era. The years from 1928 through 1931 were the years that our precious Model-A automobiles were birthed, lived, then sadly passed away. Oh but they were glorious years! The year of their birth, 1928, was a year full of fun and gaiety, the tail end of the 1920's. The time was high, the living easy and the new Ford Model-A car fit right in! It seemed the A's appeared out of nowhere and they just filled up the streets! Near everybody wanted one, and many fortunate folks were able to afford to buy one. So they became all the rage! In women's clothing fashions the year of 1928 sported skirts on the short side, barely covering the knee. By the year of 1931 however, our female fashionistas were sporting skirts half way down their calves. More fabric as mentioned in the article about fashions in 1930 was covering more skin. Hairstyles were also lengthening, shoulder length was the norm.

As the year was now 1931, the country was heading into its second full year of The Great Depression. This was a very different time than The Roaring Twenties! As fashion seems to follow economics as well as sometimes function, clothing moved in a more conservative direction. This year of 1931, however, was less restrictive regarding women's personal expression. Maybe due to the fact that fashion was taking a back seat to other more serious things women could experiment more freely with fashion choices.



Women began to express themselves subtly through more personal preferences in the ways in which they dressed. This year of 1931 is known in fashion as one of change and departure from

some of the previous fashion rules. More fashion choices were becoming available through fashion magazines, catalogues, and patterns to make. So ladies were encouraged and empowered to try out some "personal style choices". From the tilt of their hats, to the height of their heels they could express their own special little differences that made them special.

Some specifics of the year included a basic straight silhouette, the fuller flared skirt was no longer in vogue. Skirts were straight or discretely pleated. Raglan sleeves, button up the front, and V-necks were "in".

One popular style was a one-piece dress with the appearance of a blouse and skirt. A bag and gloves were a definite fashion accessory for all outfits. From short gloves, worn for spectator sports, to medium white kid for afternoon, gloves were very important fashion accessories. Suede gloves were also fashionable. Scarves became very popular including fur and silk scarves. Shoes this season were short heels in calf worn with sport stockings of silk and wool mesh. The evening formal wear for going to the opera was a pump of suede or kid with leather trim. Dying was very important this year, and shoes could be dyed to match or contrast with the costume. In an evening ensemble Rushing and Shirring were two important details, along with skirt hemlines and were also used to outline collars and cuffs on daytime dresses.

This completes the series of articles addressing fashion through the Model-A years from 1928 through 1931.





Chuck Sharpe US Army 1950-1952

In December of 1950 I was drafted into the army. Basic training was at Fort Ord. There they discovered I was "left eyed." I was classified as "non-combatant." The army does not have left eyed rifles. I was certainly no Audie Murphy! By this I mean while I admire those on "the front lines" and thoroughly enjoy reading the exploits of other Model A members' stories of their service, mine is more a story of those who served in a back line support capacity (way back line).

After basic I spent a year at Camp Roberts, just South of Paso Robles. There I drove the post bus mostly delivering ambulatory patients to the post hospital (mostly pregnant women). While doing my bus duties you would think I was the Camp Chaplain. I must appear very trustworthy because some of these women would tell me stuff so personal it would burn the hair in your nose. Nancy says I must just be a good listener.

I was then transferred to Base North Richland in Richland, Washington. Although no one would admit it, they must have misfiled my papers. After 10 days of sleeping in till noon and no one seeming to know I was not assigned to anywhere, an officer spotted me one day and asked me where I was assigned and why I wasn't doing anything. When I told him I wasn't assigned they looked into this and found my M.O.S. (Military Occupational Specialty) papers. My "M.O.S." said I was a welder and I was expected 10 days ago (as though their losing my paperwork was my fault). I was then told to immediately report to the dental lab. Why, to weld gold bridges. This was not related in any way to welding I had done in the past, but I learned quickly.

Because there was not a lot of "welding" they taught me to take dental impressions. Having a lot of spare time in this duty, I started fixing and driving a jalopy, a 1934 Ford Vicky in great shape, until I got a hold of it. I'd like to say how great a driver I was and how many races I won, but I would be lying. I was not very good at it but it was a lot of fun. Working on a jalopy and racing put a lot of grease and oil under my fingernails. This must have helped in taking dental impressions because the molds didn't stick to my fingers anymore.

After all this, my last exploit is how I was discharged two hours early from the Army. In the winter of 1952, it was cold and snowy. My GI shoes that had been issued to me were all worn out. I only had nine days left before discharge so if I had to buy a new pair of shoes my choice was a nice pair of black wingtips. I was spotted by an officer who gave me a hard time but when I told him of my impending discharge date, he went away grumbling. As luck would have it, on the day of discharge, it was this same officer who was giving the reenlistment pep talk and how great it would be to re-up now that they needed men. We could have our pick of assignment and get the \$600 reenlistment bonus. However, as soon as he saw me (still wearing my wingtips) he just said "you can go now" even though it was two hours early.

A couple of days before my discharge, as a bonus, a guy I knew was going to abandon a 1932 Ford sedan because it wasn't running and was missing the front grill and radiator. He said I could have it, so I towed it home because I wanted the "B" engine. Yes, it had a four cylinder engine.

You have heard my many comments about the problems created by Ethanol gasoline. I want to share with you this article written by Jay Leno which first appeared in Auto Week Magazine. He agrees with me that Ethanol is bad for our cars.

Talking About Cars

As someone who collects old cars, and keeps them up religiously, I am now replacing fuel-pressure regulators every 12 to 18 months. New cars are equipped with fuel lines that are resistant to ethanol damage, but with older cars, the worst can happen - you're going down the road, and suddenly your car is on fire.

There's more. I find that gasoline, which used to last about a year and a half or two years, is pretty much done after a month or so these days. If I run a car from the teens or '20s and fill it up with modem fuel, then it sits for more than two months, I often can't get it to start.

Ethanol will absorb water from ambient air. In a modern vehicle, with a scaled fuel system, ethanol fuel has a harder time picking up water from the air. But in a vintage car, the water content of fuel can rise, causing corrosion and inhibiting combustion. It gets worse. Ethanol is a solvent that can loosen the sludge, varnish and dirt that accumulate in a fuel tank. That mixture can clog fuel lines and block carburetor jets.

Blame the Renewable Fuel Standard. This governmentmandated rule requires certain amounts of ethanol and other bio-fuels be blended with gasoline and diesel fuel. But when Congress first passed KFS as part of the Energy Policy Act in 2005, our demand for energy was increasing. Today, it's the opposite. Total demand for fuel has decreased thanks to more-efficient vehicles, more hybrids and increased environmental awareness. The EPA is set to release the 2015 standard in June. Meanwhile, some legislators are pushing to reform or eliminate the Renewable Fuel Standard entirely.

I just don't see the need for ethanol. I understand the theory—these giant agri-business companies can process corn, add the resulting blend to gasoline and we'll be using and importing less gasoline. But they say this diversion of the corn supply is negatively affecting food prices and the ethanol-spiked gas we're forced to buy is really awful.

The big growers of corn have sold us a bill of goods. Some people are making a lot of money because of ethanol. But as they divert production from food to fuel, food prices inevitably will rise.

Last week, I went to start up one of my Duesenbergs. When I pulled out of the spot where it had been parked for about a month, I saw a huge pool of gas. I looked at it while it was running and saw gas just pouring out. "OK, I've got to buy another fuel regulator." I pulled it out and opened it up. The fiber diaphragm was eaten right through. Should manufacturers make diaphragms for old cars out of modern materials like Viton or Teflon-Yes, they should, but not all of them do. Consequently, your chances of a fire remain. Here's another problem: When you have vehicles with fuel cells in their gas tanks, ethanol tends to eat the coating out of the fuel cell. If you have an old motorcycle and redo the fuel tank, the first thing you do is seal the tank with some sealant. It's generally a cream or a gray color, and it looks like you painted the inside of the tank on a lot of my bikes now, I'll open the gas tank and I'll go in with a long set of tweezers. I'm pulling out sheets of this coating. Really, it comes out in 6-inch strips.

The ethanol is just eating it up and clogging the fuel pump because it'll move around as a sheet of material and block the opening. With cars like my McLaren FI, if I buy a 55-gallon drum of VP racing gas, the fuel cell will last twice as long.

It's time for us as automobile enthusiasts to dig in our heels and start writing to our congressmen and senators about the Renewable Fuel Standard, or we'll be forced to use even more ethanol. Most people assume, "Oh, that'll never happen. They'll never do that." Remember prohibition? In 1920, all the saloons were closed. It took until 1933 before legal liquor came back. Most people don't really look at what goes into their car. Obviously, the days of highoctane gas like Sunoco 260 are long gone. Those of us with older vehicles are the ones who end up paying the price. The car manufacturers don't care. They don't mind if your vintage car burns up or breaks down. They want to sell you a new one. It's hard for enthusiasts. We really have nowhere to go.

So write those letters. But I also suggest you drain and clean your old car's fuel tank, use a quality fuel-tank sealer that's impervious to ethanol, replace fuel filters, keep all the screens clear and use a fuel stabilizer (added to a full fuel tank), if your car is to be stored for the winter season.

Oh, and keep a fire extinguisher handy.
