The Santa Anita A's took advantage of a beautiful Saturday morning and headed down to Yorba Linda to check out the 37th President's new galleries. Needless to say it did not disappoint.



Our private tour began on the outside grounds as we explored Army One which was the presidential helicopter. A few yards away resides a small house built by Nixon's father utilizing a kit from a local lumber yard. It is here that Richard Millhouse Nixon was born in 1913. His final resting place is also located next to this boyhood home-talk about coming full circle.

It was time to enter the library and we began with a through the years. The library has 70 new exhibits, numerous selfie stops, floor to ceiling graphics and five White House Tapes Listening stations.

The exhibit begins with a look back at the turbulent 60's, followed by the Vietnam War, Nixon's election, the Apollo Moon landing, the opening of China, the White House, the Watergate Scandal and concludes with his childhood. One of the highlights was a replica of the White House Oval Office in a 360-degree panaramic view. Our own President, John McDaniel was quick to hop behind the big desk with our group for a photo opportunity.





When the original library first opened its critics pointed out that there was very little information devoted to Nixon's involvement in the Watergate Scandal.

The new gallery does a fantastic job of presenting Watergate in an honest and updated light. For all his highs and lows, President Nixon did open up relations with China, ended the draft, lowered the voting age to eighteen, integrated public schools in the south and created OSHA and the EPA.





After our library visit we headed around the corner to Polly's Pies for lunch. Polly's is located in the old Pacific Electric train station and the eats were fantastic. Everyone enjoyed a piece of pie with their meal.

Fashion Focus on Men

During the Model A Era men were outfitted for style as well as purpose. Men's styles were designed specifically for the activity of the "man wearing the pants," so to speak. For example, men working outdoors on farms, or in garages and factories many times wore overalls. They wore one piece garments designed to cover them well, and to be practical. They were sturdy, and the fabric had to hold up through much hard work, and many washings. A good example of such a material would be denim in darker colors, so that dirt would be less noticeable. A pair of Levi jeans when new may give one an idea of fabric strength and durability.

Another area of work calling for a specific type of style and fabric would be indoor professions and jobs. For example a druggist, as well as soda clerks, restaurant and grocery men, barbers and dentists, among many other occupations wore white "duck" coats and jackets. These coats and jackets were made of an exceptionally high quality preshrunk eight-ounce duck fabric, a cotton fabric, and were bleached to a snowy whiteness. It was touted in the Sear's Catalogue of 1930 that these tailored, and neat fitting patterns would symbolize the purity

and cleanliness of your establishment to your customers. They saved man's better clothing, which was worn underneath them, from excessive wear and tear and straining. They claimed to be easily laundered and to wear almost indefinitely. For \$1.89 postpaid, any man could purchase one of these jackets from the Sear's Catalogue.

For sportsmen, a range of all wool worsted sweaters in V-neck or round neck varieties were available. Some of these sweaters had buttons up the front with a wide shawl collar, and front pockets. For the man going to work in an office job, suits were the preferred attire. Suits were worn with matching vests and slacks. The rather wide-cuffed pants bottoms were all the rage! The new suit coat had a shaped waistline and the "lifted sleeve" and notched lapels, which were attempting to achieve an athletic, square shouldered appearance. These coats were made of wool with half lined fine alpaca fur. The asking price for these three-piece suits was just \$18.85, with one pair of trousers, and \$25.00 dollars with two pair of trousers.

Men's shoes this year exemplified by the "oxford" style, which were available either in one color or as two tones. They were made of calfskin leather with soles of "oak leather" with rubber heels. Here is a description of one shoe offered in Sear's Catalogue: "One, two, three brass slugs- like a clatter plate in the springy heel. They're GOLD BOND high quality calfskin Oxford, GENUINE GOODYEAR WELT. Available sizes 5-11, \$4.00 post paid". Post paid meant that Sear's paid the freight!

El Monte, California was my home town. I graduated from El Monte High School in June 1967 and enlisted in the navy in November. Boot camp was in San Diego followed by 16 weeks of Machinist Mate School at Great Lakes, Illinois.

I served on several ships during my time in service; my favorite was the battleship USS New Jersey BB62. The ship operated off the coast of Vietnam on one tour while I was on board. One memorable incident occurred on February 22, 1969 at 1 O'clock in the morning. I was sound asleep and woke to the sound and fury of the ship firing it's batteries of 16-inch guns, with many of the 5-inch guns firing as well. The firing continued for four hours. I found out later that morning that we fired over 100 16-inch rounds and close to 1700 5-inch rounds to save a Marine outpost from being overrun by the Viet Cong. I had two more Vietnam tours while serving on board the Destroyer Escort USS O' Callahan DE1051.

Twenty years later I was shopping near my home and happened to be wearing my USS New Jersey ball cap. A gentleman came up to me and asked if I was on the New Jersey back in 1969? I told him that I was. He asked me if I remembered the ship saving a Marine outpost, which I did. He then shook my hand and thanked me for helping save his life. That really hit home. It just shows what an impact you may have made in someone's life even if it was not evident at the time.

I was discharged from active duty in 1971 and remained in the navy as an active reserve for the next six years for a total service of ten years. I was rated a Machinist Mate, Petty Officer Second Class (MM2).

Santa Anita A's new Technical Director

A few weeks ago, our new president, John McDannel, asked me to accept the position of Technical Director and I agreed. Part of the job description of Technical Director is to submit articles for our newsletter. I am by no means an accomplished writer but I will give it a try so here goes.

First, a little about my involvement with the Model A hobby. I purchased my first Model A Ford, a 1930 Tudor Sedan, in 1956 when I moved to St Louis, Missouri to start college. The local Gas Station near where I was living had this '30 Tudor for sale with the asking price of \$200.00. It was relatively straight except the fenders were banged up a bit. It still had the original interior that was much worn but still serviceable. The top had recently been recovered and the exterior had just received a fresh application of bright yellow paint that had been applied with a brush. This yellow Tudor was to be my main means of transportation for the next four years.

To save money I did all my own repairs. I would either rebuild a failed component myself or buy used parts from one of the local junk yards. I slowly was able to get the car in better condition and even repainted it bright red. I found the Model A to be relatively easy to repair and keep running and also fun to drive. The last two years of college, I ran a small repair garage for Model A's. During these years, I learned a lot about Model A Fords and met other Model A owners. We started a local Model A Club that eventually turned into the Missouri Valley Region of MARC which I am one of the founding members.

After graduation, I sold the Tudor and became involved with other "more modern" cars but I always had a soft spot in my heart for the Model A. About fifteen years ago while reading Hemmings Motor News, I saw a 1930 Tudor for sale and could not resist. I purchased the car and once again found myself involved with the Model A Ford hobby.

My approach to these cars has always been to keep them basically original and for the most part the way Henry built them. The Model A is a simple car but very well designed and engineered. It was Ford's philosophy to build a car that was affordable, reliable and could be easily repaired with simple tools. When properly repaired and maintained, these cars are still reliable and fun to drive and enjoy. It is not necessary to make a lot of modifications or changes to Ford's original design and for the most part just returning the car to the way it was originally built will give you a car that is dependable and enjoyable.

Future columns will deal with issues involving dependability, reliability, drivability, safety and overall usability of our cars. The enjoyment of the hobby is being able to drive our cars with confidence and that we will not

be having ongoing problems with reliability. However, if we do encounter a problem we will have the ability to solve it in an efficient manner. I plan to also deal with questions about sources for information, parts, component repair and restoration and repair work by others. Hopefully, you will find this column to be interesting, informative and helpful.

Tech Tip - Poor Quality Points by Chris Wickersham

Recently we have run into two cases where poor quality "Modern" ignition points have failed causing the engine to stop running. The insulator where the wire attaches was so thin that when it got warm, it collapsed and the spring shorted against the metal frame of the point set. Buy only quality ignition parts. Good quality modern points are being supplied by Motorcraft, Borg-Warner and Standard. (Borg Warner part number A101V or equvalent)

NO ON THE GAS TAX!

This is a summary of a notice we received from the Association of California Car clubs asking members to contact their state representatives and protest their proposed bills which will increase the state fuel tax.



Well here we go again...proposed fuel tax increases in 2016 failed. Now that the legislature has a Super Majority in both the Senate and the Assembly we can all expect to see legislation that looks to increase fuel taxes in 2017.

This is urgent! We need you to stand up against the out of touch politicians in Sacramento to defeat this bill! The Legislature had barely reconvened before Senator Jim Beall and Assemblyman Jim Frazier had proposed another tax increase against Californians.

First out in the Senate is Senate Bill 1. This is a bill by Senator Beall that looks to increase fuel taxes on both gas and diesel fuel. Diesel will be increased 60 % from \$.33 to \$.53 per gallon. Gasoline will be increased 36% from \$.33 to \$.45. In addition, sales tax on each will be increased 4%. This bill actually failed to pass in 2016.

Also coming is Assembly Bill 1 by Assembly Member Frazier. This is almost an identical bill as SB1. Additional components in the funding in both bills would increase the annual vehicle registration fee from \$43.00 to \$81.00, a 53% increase and apply an annual \$165.00 fee for zero-emission vehicles. Also, a requirement to shift \$500 million in existing truck weight fees back to road repairs is also included.

Since 2010 state lawmakers have stolen funds from the state's highway account and moved to the general fund for special pet projects and to also balance the budget. Both bills look to fund the repairs of California's roads.

I'm all for road repairs and would suggest we use the 68 Billion Dollars from the "Train To Nowhere" instead of taxing Californians into oblivion.

Here's what the tax increase will roughly cost;

- Average Car 20 gallons per week or \$2.40 per week times 52 weeks = \$125.00
- Vehicle registration fee \$38.00 increase to \$81.00 per year.
- \$125.00 plus \$38.00 = Roughly an increase of \$163.00 minimum per vehicle. If you are driving two vehicles that's almost \$326.00 per year increase.

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
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
























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
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How to pose with a statue
