



Clutch Adjustment Made Easy

Clutch adjustment is a necessary element of keeping your Model A in good working order. The process, however, can be a frustrating pain in the butt! Keep reading - help is on the way.

There should be one inch of "free travel" when you push on the pedal before it begins to disengage the Clutch. Over the miles, the clutch plate will wear and free travel will lessen. If no adjustment is made, ultimately, the clutch will begin to slip. If the free travel is too great, for some reason, the pedal will fail to completely disengage the clutch and the gears will grind.

To adjust the clutch pedal, follow these steps:

1) Take a pair of pliers and lay on your back under your pedals. There's no way to avoid this pain in the butt unless you have a car lift.

2) Remove the cotter key on the pin in the clevis rod attached to the clutch actuating arm.

3) Raise the clutch actuating arm enough to slide the pin out that connects the clevis rod to the clutch actuating arm. This is the frustrating part. You can use a hydraulic jack on top of a block of wood to raise the arm, or continue reading and learn how to make a handy tool to resolve the frustration. 4) Rotate the clevis rod in the trunion nut clockwise to increase pedal travel, or counter clockwise to decrease travel. This is a trial and error process until you get it "just right". You can use a small stick under your pedal wedged against the floorboard if you tire of it falling down. Remember to close the driver's door after each check so that you don't whack your head the next time you crawl out from under the car you love so much.

5) When the free travel is "just right" (one inch), climb under one more time and put a new cotter key in the clevis pin. The will prevent the clutch pedal from falling to the floor next time you are in the middle of nowhere with a dead cell phone.

To prevent the frustration mentioned in #3, I developed a crude, but effective tool that is used to raise the clutch actuating arm. I used a one foot length of 2" X 2" angle iron. Hardware stores and metal merchants usually have lots of this. Simply cut a ¾" wide notch, 5/8" deep in one end. I used a cutting wheel and grinding wheel to accomplish this. Place the flat edge over the base of the arm and slide it back until the notch captures the end of the arm. Use the tool as a lever by pulling down to raise the arm enough to pull out the clevis pin.

Note: The heavier welded-up after-market levers are wider. A wider notch may be ground in the opposite end of the tool to accommodate these levers as well. Be sure to grind the notch on the correct side of the angle iron so that the side of the tool will engage with the lever when being used to rotate the lever.

SEMINAR NEWS

The Low End Boys were asked to check out John Spielmann's engine for a problem of not running. John was out for a ride and the engine guit running. He had it towed home and the Low End Boys came over to check it out. At first we thought he had carburetor problems. Wrong. We opened his distributor cap and had him start the truck. Oh yes, he has a real pretty green pick up - like real pretty. We noticed his cam was not turning - not good. We pulled his distributor - it was frozen. Marlin took it home and took it apart using a hammer and power to get the distributor shaft out. Once apart, we found the distributor bushing on top was replaced with a metal part instead of a brass bushing. We rebuilt his distributor using a new shaft because the old one was bent on the bottom spline. Also, new bushings, both brass, (\$1.00 each) were put in.

Next trip we decided to open the valve cover and look inside for possible damage. Once inside we found his oil pump drive gear was not good. We tried to get it out. No luck, so we dropped the pan, took out the oil pump and found part of the oil pump gear stuck to the oil pump. We replaced the drive gear housing and oil pump drive gear. The next trip to John's found us checking out the timing gear, and yes, we found it all torn up. John went down to Antique Ford and got parts from Jim Gordon; this is where Gene Reinhardt came in. Timing gears need real love; perfect fit or all is not good. Gene did it with white chalk and lots of patience. John Emanuelli was under the truck pushing and praying.

On our last day at John's with Perma Glue and all clean new parts they were put in place. John took the truck out and came home smiling. All in all, it took 5 different days to get everything fixed - all because of a \$1.00 bushing. If you're going to repair something, check your car parts books and use the right parts.
