Doheney Mansion Tour



Tech Seminar - Rebuilding Transmission Towers

At the seminar we were prepared with enough refurbished hardware to restore 22 transmission towers. What we accomplished was the complete restoration of twelve 30-31 towers and two 29 towers. In addition, we restored several others where the owner decided to use his own tower instead of an exchange. In all cases the shifting lever was welded up and

re-ground and all the shifting forks were replaced with those that had been welded and milled. A good number of club members are now expert in the ability to restore a Model A transmission tower.

This seminar was a year and a half in the preparation and planning. The replacement tower hardware was collected and refurbished by Tom Endy. Art Moore welded

up all the shifting forks and Chris Wickersham milled them.

At the seminar, Sam Thompson and his dad, Bryan Thompson did all the welding and re-grinding of the shift levers. Bryan Thompson also designed



and fabricated the shift lever grinding jig and the "wine bottle corker" looking spring removal and installation tool.



Many club members participated in the disassemble and re-assembly of the towers. This was definitely a hands-on seminar with the result being many restored transmission towers and many club members becoming expert in the

restoration of Model A transmission tower.

The following article is reprinted from Hemmings Motor News, August 2016 issue written by David Conwill.

For 1932, Ford introduced an improved version of the Model A four-cylinder to accompany the new V-8 in its cars and trucks. This 200.5 cubic inch, 50-hp engine was known, appropriately enough, as the Model B.

The Model B shared many elements with its Model A predecessor, and the two had a great deal of physical interchangeability attested by the fact that today, many updated Model A's incorporate some or all of a Model B engine for improved drive-ability.



Model B engine can be identified by the fuel pump on right side of block and no oil drain tube.

A prominent change between the Model A and Model B engines was the addition of significantly more bearing area. Larger diameter bearings for both the connecting rods and mains meant better durability and more potential for power. An oil passage below the valve gallery fed pressurized oil to the main bearings, as opposed to the dip-and-splash system used on the Model A engine, was another improvement designed to make these engines more durable. The rods were still lubricated with dippers, however.

The refinements to the oiling system led to one of the more noticeable external differences between the A and B engines, the lack of an oil-return line from the valve gallery to the bottom of the crankcase on the passenger's side on the Model B engine. Ford utilized this freed space for the addition of a mechanical fuel pump driven off the front of the camshaft to replace the gravity-feed fuel system used on the Model A.

Both the crankshaft and the cylinder head, as well as some changes made to fit the Model B engine into the 1933-'34 Ford chassis have created some persistent myths about the Model B. It is rumored that 1932 Ford Model ,B crankshafts came with no counterweights at all, like a Model A crank. Given the paucity of non-counterweighted survivors and the illustrations shown in 1932 Ford advertising materials, it seems more likely that the big difference between 1932 and '33-'34 crankshafts is a change from sweated-on counterweights to integrally forged counterweights. Both cranks are good, but the forged-counterweight cranks are preferred for their ease of reconditioning.

Also confusing are the cylinder heads, because Ford chose to distinguish a s.:i compression "Police" head offered for the Model A with a cast-in "B?' When it was time to

distinguish the Model B head, Ford used a cast-in "C" for the Model B's 4.6:1 compression head. This, coupled with the change in counterweights and a shorter water pump used to clear the angled radiator introduced in 1933, has led to enthusiasts labeling the '33-'34 engines as Model C.

Other improvements over the Model A included a better camshaft profile (often incorporated when Model A cams are re-ground for touring), larger carburetor with power jet tube (which acts like an accelerator pump) and a distributor with centrifugal advance weights instead of the manual spark advance on the Model A. Ford made numerous other improvements to the B -too many to list here - which combined with limited demand after the V-8 caught on, make them rare and sought-after engines today.

B is for Banger The 1932-'34 Ford Model B engine may look like its predecessor, but it's a major improvement.

SAA General Meeting Minutes June 24, 2016

- The meeting was called to order by John McDannel at 7:31 PM.

Santa Anita A's Veteran



Mickey Fruchter US Army 1962-1964

August 6th, 1962 is a day which I will always remember. It was our first wedding anniversary and along with all the cards there was a letter without a stamp. I wondered, "Who do I know who owns a post office?" It was my draft notice! I boarded a train along with about 200 other draftees to travel to Salinas and then take a bus to Ft. Ord, CA for basic training. Problem, we hit a parked car on the tracks in Glendale and by the time all the investigations were completed we were running 6 hours late. By the time we arrived at Ft. Ord were not late...but "AWOL". After a few hours to confirm our delay getting to Ft. Ord, we were excused.

The first day of basic training the truck jerked as I was getting off and I fell off the truck and broke my arm. Basic training was delayed until my arm healed. While receiving physical therapy on my arm at the hospital, I was checked by a nurse, and I had a high fever. As it turned out, I had spinal meningitis and was isolated as it was very contagious. At that time we lost 19 men and I was lucky that it was discovered early since I was going to the hospital every day for therapy on my broken arm. THAT IS WHEN IT ALL BEGAN! I was recorded as "deceased" by the Army. After I was released from the hospital...no orders came to send me back to Basic training and I stayed in the hospital for many weeks doing nothing but eating, sleeping and watching TV. Eventually orders came through to send me back to Basic. Then when I finally completed Basic ...AGAIN...no orders. I was sent out in the rain wearing my poncho to water the lawn. People would drive by and take my photo. Weeks later I received orders to go to band school. At the end of band school ...no orders came in. I was a "hold-over" AGAIN! With only 14 months to go I eventually received orders to be stationed at the Presidio in San Francisco, CA with the 6th Army Band playing the tuba. Bea and I rented a tiny apartment near the base and at that time it was a fun city to live in. All Army units are required to qualify on the rifle range once a year. When the band bus showed up at the firing range we were not allowed to get off the bus. When the officer in charge of the range found out that we were in the band, he gave us all "Marksmanship" medals and told us that he was afraid that we would kill someone or ourselves if he let us on the range.

My main concern was that my discharge papers would never come. As it turned out... everything came and I was released on time. My pay was messed up and I ended up with almost one month's pay (\$74.00) BUT the Army insisted that they were correct...so what can I say?

Playing in the band gave me many opportunities to go to some interesting places and be involved in official events. We played for parades, concerts and musical shows. We played for the St. Patrick's Day, Chinese New Year and Columbus Day Parades in San Francisco and the Rose Parade in Pasadena. We toured with the Fort Meade, MD, American Historical Flag Pageant to Seattle, WA, Portland, OR, Los Angeles and San Diego. We played for President Johnson right after he came into office. If you have to be in the military, the band is a nice unit to be in. I felt that I was contributing to the morale of many service people who were under much stress and needed a lift when things got rough.

I was truly lucky while I served my country playing the tuba, as many of my colleagues were not as fortunate. In high school my band/orchestra teacher said he needed someone with a "strong back and weak mind" to play the tuba in the band and he chose me. After my service time I thanked him for making me learn to play the tuba as it may have saved my life. Who knows?

The Beginning of Model A Era Fashion

In October 1927, the first Model A – number one, was completed. Although they did not go on sale until December 2^{nd} , the die was cast and the Model A was a reality. Therefore, this is the first year of our fashion era.

The waistline was still low, though not as low as in the earlier twenties. The necklines were V or rounded, but still high. Sleeves were usually long and snug fitted and summer styles were often sleeveless. Cloche hats were the rule; some had brims, but usually small or pulled down. (Except the wide brim or garden party hats.) Hemlines were directly below the knee. Some had flounces attached.

The high fashion was to have everything in harmony. Often dress, coat, purse and hat were of the same pattern and material. Of course silk hose were seamed, neutral shades for daytime and evening, although darker shades, sometimes black for evening, if the outfit



was black. Shoes were pumps but much higher vamp than today. T-straps, cross strap, or oxfords were popular show styles. Purses were small, envelope, snap-top or beaded, many black straps, always perpendicular. Purses with horizontal straps were not from our era. Gloves were worn but not so much as in the previous years. Hair was bobbed or, if long, pulled back in a bun at the neck and waved around the face. Evening dresses were the same length as daytime dresses.
