



July 14-18, 2014 -- Puyallup, WA



Model A Ford Museum Officially Open

The Grand Opening of the Model A Ford Museum on May 18, 2013 was the culmination of the efforts of many people; supported by MAFCA and MARC, and spearheaded by the Model A Ford Foundation, Inc.



The Model A Ford Museum is part of the Gilmore Car Museum located in Hickory Corners, Michigan. It is a large facility which contains 15 exhibition buildings, housing a wide range of automobiles and auto collectibles . The Model A Ford museum is the newest of the structures located on the the Gilmore Car Museum property.

The all-new Model A Ford Museum is a 13,000 square-foot re-creation of a vintage Ford dealership, complete with service bay and gas pumps (showing 18 cents a gallon!). It is the largest public museum dedicated to the Model A Ford in existence.

The driving force behind the new museum has been the non-profit Model A Ford Foundation, Inc. (MAFFI) established in 1987 to preserve Model A Fords and related memorabilia, as well to educate present and future generations on its legacy. The organization has successfully united the tens of thousands of Model A enthusiasts who are members of various clubs in support of the new venture. The all-new Model A Ford Museum provides MAFFI a permanent home for its collection of automobiles, display engines, and artifacts including factory photos, blueprints and research materials.

In conjunction with the Grand opening of the Model A Ford Museum, Grape Country Model A club of Southwest Michigan hosted their 2013 Michigan Regional Round up. The event which was held at the Four Points by Sheraton hotel in Kalamazoo included local tours, a banquet, raffles and door prizes. On Saturday, the group toured 21 miles to the Gilmore Museum facility where the dedication ceremony was held. Participants were then free to tour the museum's various facilities.

Stated vs. Agreed Value:

The Insurance Trap Owners Must Learn to Avoid

Owners of classic or collectible cars often find themselves in something of an adversarial relationship with their insurance companies. Many new owners of specialty cars simply tack the vehicle on their regular coverage only to find out, generally when they file a claim, that to their insurer that beloved beauty is just an old car with a low Blue Book value.

The best avenue for owners of truly special machines is to go with one of the classic car insurance companies like Hagerty, Grundy, or American Collectors Insurance. Regardless of the insurer used, however, the owner must be prepared to negotiate from a position of knowledge, both about the automobile itself and about the types of insurance coverage, "stated value" and "agreed value." Both carry distinct advantages and disadvantages.

Stated Value Policies

Stated value coverage pays the cost of repair to the car or the stated value of the car, whichever is less, at the time that a claim is filed. There are a number of problems with this type of policy: The stated value is actually used only to determine the premium level. The higher the stated value, the higher the premium. In the event of a claim, the language of the contract allows the insurer to set an actual cash value instead of paying the stated amount as the insured party was given to believe. Essentially, the company accepts the owner's stated value at the time the policy is issued, but does not issue any formal agreement with that value in the event of a claim. This gives them considerable leeway in honoring the benefits of the coverage. It's a rule of thumb in insurance that the company will always pay the least amount possible.

Agreed Value Policies

Agreed value guarantees a set amount of coverage agreed upon at the time the policy was issued and is generally accepted as the best position for the owners of classics, unique, or highly modified vehicles. It carries a number of advantages:

Allows the driver to secure and present a professional appraisal of the vehicle that they accept as a valid representation of its worth. Unlike standard insurance, the value of your car does not depreciate over the life of the policy. It is the only type of coverage that guarantees the owners will be paid in full in the event of a loss.


Obviously, agreed value is the prime position. By going with a classic or specialty car insurer, the driver may have to accept some limitation on driving time, but most of these companies are generous with their leisure driving allowances, especially if the car is well-protected and maintained. Insurance companies like to know a car is securely garaged and protected by anti-theft devices.

By being a knowledgeable negotiator and getting at least three comparison quotes, classic and specialty car owners can find coverage that is both comprehensive and affordable. The trick is to go with a company that appreciates the vehicle's intrinsic value from the start and that specializes in writing unique insurance product.

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
