Our tour group gathered at the Walmart on a very overcast morning. The clouds hung low in the mountains. A few hours earlier it had drizzled or rained depending on where you lived. I was accused of scheduling another tour on a rainy day. As we passed the Morris Dam on Highway 39, the overcast became heavier and it looked like rain. However, just after passing the San Gabriel Reservoir, about four miles before the bridge over the San Gabriel River, blue skies began to break through and the humidity level dropped. Ten minutes later as we sat in the shade of the oaks at the Oaks Picnic area, the weather was perfect with blue skies, 70 degrees, with a light breeze.



Twenty two of our members plus Tom and Sheri's granddaughter Valerie, sat down at a long table to enjoy a picnic lunch. There was plenty of shared food being passed around and for dessert, everyone had a Klondike bar.

Ken Mallory US Army 1943-1945

Pasadena, California was where I was born in 1924. I grew up in the area and was attending Pasadena City College in March 1943 when I was drafted into the army. Basic training was at Camp Roberts in Central California. I was trained as a mortar man. My first war time service was in the Aleutian Islands Campaign during 1943-1944. Upon my return to the States I was attached to the 87th Infantry Division, Company L of the 345th Infantry Regiment. In October 1944 the division was deployed to France where I saw combat action in the Ardennes (Battle of the Bulge), the Rhineland, and Central Europe. In the first day of action in the Battle of the Bulge our regiment suffered 50 to 60 casualties. My company crossed the Rhine River at night in ten-man boats under fire to seize the eastern bank. Once across my squad set up a mortar position and started dropping mortar shells on a German gun emplacement overlooking the river. Many years later at an 87th Division reunion an infantryman came up to me and shook my hand and thanked me for taking that gun position out. He and his squad had been ordered to prepare to assault it. Significant campaign medals I received are the Combat Infantryman Badge, a Bronze Star, and the ETO Campaign Medal with three battle stars, the World War II Victory Medal, and a Good Conduct Medal. I was honorably discharged at Camp Shelby, Mississippi in October 1945 with the rank of Sargent.

Following World War II I obtained a bachelor's degree from USC in 1950 and spent a long business career in sales with the Dow Chemical Company. Today I live in Bradbury, California with my wife Elizabeth. We have a daughter, a son, three grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

ERA FASHIONS

Collecting and Coordinating Outfits

The separate years of the Model A Era seemed to be different when it came to the cars, but there was a lot of crossover when it came to fashion. People then as people now were basically thrifty with their clothing. We often keep clothing we like for several seasons. People in the 20's and 30's did too.

Perhaps a handbag was carried for a few years... clothing could be passed around families or remodeled into newer looks. The hats were cared for and used for years 1928... the 20's continue .. some flapper styles, double breasted suits, cloche hats, fedoras, caps. 1929.... styles continue ... shorter hair styles for women.



1930... styles begin to change... skirts longer, natural waist, knickers, vests, women's riding outfits, longer hair, purses a bit larger, hose sheerer, some veils on hats. Brims on both men's and women's hats widen. In researching hair styles, from the 1800's forward the women wore longer hair. As the 20's came women cut their hair and shortened their skirts and went to work. As more salons were available, women had perms and different styles. After the stock crash in 1929, some women let their hair grow again because of the economy. They saved money by not having regular hair cuts.

When coordinating a current outfit consider your choices. • Recall to Order You may have a favorite style in mind. Perhaps a man may like the "Clyde Barrow" look. He wore slacks, dress shirt, suspenders and a fedora. Or, perhaps a farmer or rancher look. Overalls or loose jeans, a long sleeved plaid shirt, and suspenders, and a straw hat. Ladies may like the matching "Bonnie Parker" look. She wore blouses, skirts or dresses with a bit fuller skirt and a length below her knee. Her hats were usually made of felt, and her hair wavy or curly. Ladies in a farm or ranch environment wore house dresses with aprons with bandannas around their hair, sometimes.

More formal styles include a basic black dress or suit for ladies with a fur stole and a hat with some flair. A man may choose a striped suit with a vest and formal shirt with a bow tie or a long tie, wider during these years.

As I have suggested before, I feel we will find these items in many places. It will take awhile to gather everything. Do research in old magazines, old movies and on the Internet if you can. Keep a list or file about things that appeal to you. Thanks for your comments.



Car Overheating or Pumping Water Out or Both?

Below is an article from the Tulsa Model A club which comments on one of the typical problems faced by Model A owners. I thank them for this interesting article.

Did you ever say the following: My engine continues to overheat. We have put on a new water pump, the radiator was "cleaned and soldered and filled", but it still overheats. Not an abnormal thing, especially in the Oklahoma summers.

First let's define overheating. Is it steaming or just pumping water out the top? If it's just pumping water out you may be over filling it — let the radiator find its own level. Each "A" seems to have it's own level. As an example, in Kansas City I added water to our 1929 all the way to the top — I knew it was too full but it sure looked good!! When I started the car it promptly pumped out the excess water until it reached its normal operating level.

Suggestions:

There are several things that can cause a Model A to overheat. The main cause is usually the radiator. First you can check to see if your radiator has 3 rows of tubes. Some of the older replacement radiators had only 2 rows. That will not provide sufficient cooling. If the radiator is old and has been in the car a long time, the fins of the radiator become loose and cannot dissipate the heat. Also, if the radiator is old and has been in the car a long time, calcium deposits in the radiator will reduce the cooling efficiency of the radiator.

Like many Model A owners we had to replace a radiator as once we got the car over 40 MPH it would get hot. The radiator had 3 tubes but only 6 fins per inch (normal) plus the flow rate was quite slow. The new core that was put on has 12 fins per inch plus they are crinkled to provide maximum cooling surface area. Replacing the radiator along with slowing the rate of flow (installed a Thermostat) stopped the overheating on our "A".

Now let's consider other potential causes of overheating. First make sure the timing is set correctly. Then make sure nothing is blocking the front of the radiator, like a license plate. If you have a new engine it will sometimes run hot until it is broken in. There are several books and articles that have been written that will tell how to correctly set the timing. A blown head gasket can also cause overheating. Check for bubbles in the water at the filler neck. This may indicate a blown head gasket. Running your car too lean (Gas Adjustment Valve, GAV) can also contribute to your motor running hot. In this hot weather there can be many contributing factors.

This month the Low End Boys were very busy. First they worked on my Woody Wagon installing an engine. Working with me were Mickey, and John Emanuelli. Next came installing another engine in my 1 1/2 ton Truck and working on that project were Mickey Fruchter and Chris Wickersham. I also want to thank Joe Wilson, Bob Travis and Art Moore who worked on the carburetor for my Station Wagon.

Next we received a call from Frank Izbinski saying his car would not run, I called John Emanuelli and away we go not knowing what to expect. We tried many things no luck. John asked for an emery board and he filed the distributor four ends inside the cap. Guess what - the engine starts and runs like a scared rabbit. This is a true story.

Another thought for everyone. Let's help Sheri Johnson and Ronald McDonald help kids. Save your tabs off your soda and beer cans. Closing out - Happy Model A'ing
