

Andy Sais USAF 1951-1954

In January of 1951, I was in my second year of college and had a deferment, but I signed up for the Air Force pilot training program. During the series of tests that we took prior to being shipped out, I qualified for Officers Candidate School and pilot training. However, a problem soon developed. Due to overcrowding I had been sent to an airbase in South Carolina for basic that had been re-activated a few months before and was considered a reserve air base. In order to be able to go to OCS right after basic, I had to be on a regular air base. Because I was in limbo and they didn't have a permanent job for me because of my status (waiting for OCS), I was sent to radar operators school at Biloxi, Mississippi for 6 weeks in June and July of 1951. Upon completion of the school, I was sent back to my base, awaiting transfer to a radar operations group. Because of red tape, my transfer did not take place until October, to Sewart AFB, outside of Nashville, Tenn. This was a regular AFB, but when I went through channels to transfer to OCS, I was told that there was now an 18 month waiting list for pilot training, so I was stuck in the radar group and we soon went overseas.

Our Group was made up of 4 National Guard squadrons, 3 from Georgia and 1 from North Carolina to which I was attached. One Georgia Squadron was sent to Korea and the other three of us went to French Morocco. We were used to set up a Radar ring around French Morocco, as we had a B-29 bomber base there, with nuclear bombs at the ready in case the Russians wanted war.


Before leaving the US, those of us that were regular Air Force, had to teach the National Guard guys how to become radar operators, including their officers. From January to July of 1952, we were just outside of Casablanca, teaching radar operations. Then I was sent with a detachment of 45 men about 80 miles north where I remained with the detachment for the next 10 months until I returned to the US in May 1953.

Here are a few highlights while in French Morocco. I was assigned to the Group calibration team, which went to different locations in Morocco, with the help of B-29's to calibrate sites for possible use as early

warning radar sites. In October 1952, a calibration team of ten of us was put together and sent to Korea, where we stayed for 5 days to calibrate a new site for our squadron stationed in Korea. Even though a demarcation line had been established, the war wasn't over and we were still bombing the north. The commanding officer of the squadron decided to move the site closer to the demarcation line, where we were promptly shelled by North Korean artillery and the radar antenna was destroyed and about 8 men wounded. New equipment was sent from Japan nd we had to calibrate it on a new site far enough back from the demarcation line that was safe. We had to calibrate the site by workings with the B-29's that were on actual bombing missions. After we were done we were flown back to Morocco and went back to our regular assignments.

In January, 1953, we moved our site, 300 miles to the Northeast, right on the Mediterranean Sea, where Morocco is only 6 miles wide, with Algeria on one side and Spanish Morocco on the other. It was a summer resort for Europeans but we were there in the winter and it was cold and the little town of Saidia was almost deserted. The Army Corps of Engineers and the French were arguing about who would build our permanent site, so in the meantime, we had to be a construction squadron as well as radar operations, and build our own site. We had to work at construction during the daylight hours when we were not working on the radar.

I returned to the US in May, 1953 and was advised my orders to OCS had come through. However, I declined the offer as it would have meant another four years and by then I wanted to return to civilian life. I discharged December 1954. I returned to college and became a high school teacher for the next 34 years. I retired in 1992.

Point & Condenser Ignition vs. Electronic Ignition

Point and Condenser Systems

The original ignition system in the Model A consists of a coil, points and condenser. The points are opened and closed with lobes on the distributor cam. The four



lobes on the distributor cam control the ignition firing to each of the four cylinders. When the points open, the ignition primary circuit is interrupted. But the flow of current cannot be stopped instantaneously. The current continues to flow and arc across the points. To stop this flow, a condenser is connected across the points so when the points start to open, the current surges into the condenser. By the time the condenser is fully charged the points are open wide enough to prevent an arc and the current flow stops and the magnetic field in the coil collapses quickly. The speed of collapse is aided by the discharge of the condenser back through the coil primary windings in reverse direction. Therefore, the purpose of the condenser is to reduce arcing at the points, thereby increasing point life, and to speed up the collapse of the magnetic field of the coil.

The period of time that the points remain closed is called "dwell time." The Model A dwell should be about 31 degrees on the cam. A point gap of .018" will result in about 31 degrees dwell on a standard distributor cam. At that setting, maximum saturation of the secondary windings in the coil is completed, allowing the coil to produce its maximum high voltage to the spark plugs.

The above explanation of point and condenser operation points out how critical "point gap" is for efficient running of the engine. Point gap is changed by: 1. Wear on distributor cam, 2. Wear on point block, 3. Wear on distributor shaft and bushings, 4. Wear on point contact and 5. engine rpm (causing point bounce).

Electronic Ignition

The most efficient ignition system is the electronic ignition. There are no moving parts or wear to cause a change in timing. A cobalt magnetic sleeve that slips over the Model A distributor



cam is used to trigger the igniter module. The electronic ignition provides a constant high voltage to the spark plugs when used with the recommended coil, allowing for a more even and quicker burning of the air/fuel mixture in the cylinders, resulting in more efficient power from the engine. Engine RPM has no reducing factor as there are no mechanical points to bounce at higher RPM's. High voltage remains constant at idle to max RPM, resulting in a smoother and more efficient running engine. In most cases, fuel economy will increase by 3 or 4 miles per gallon.

The end of the 1920's, and the beginning of the 1930's encompass our Model A Era period. The automobiles were designed, built and sold these years, and reflected the times. The clothing of the time period also reflected the times. The 1920's were good times, prosperous and expansive.

As the decade came to a close, however, things went downhill, and so did the skirt lengths. The years 1926 and 1927 had the shortest skirt lengths of the decade. By 1928 and 1929 the lengths had started coming down. Then at the end of 1929 the stock market came crashing down and the skirt lengths came down along with it!

In it's place skirts dropped from mid-knee to mid-calf, hair grew to a "shingle" that half hid the ears, and hats moved back to reveal the forehead. The clothing was now cut on the bias, which gave skirts a clinging fluidity. The most important accessory of the early to the mid 1930's was the glove, worn in all lengths, and often matching the gown.

When we dress and create our Model-A era facades we are reminded of the unique circumstances and challenges of an earlier time. These memories can be useful when we are re-creating the fashions of this time.



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
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
