# **COMING EVENTS**

#### Armistice Day Became Veterans Day Tuesday, November 11

World War I officially ended on June 28, 1919, with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles. The actual fighting between the Allies and Germany, however, had ended seven months earlier with the armistice, which went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918. Armistice Day, as November 11 became known, officially became a holiday in the United States in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. veterans.

In 1968, new legislation changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans. Therefore, in 1978 Congress returned the observance to its traditional date.

Comment- November 11 is Veterans Day. Thanksgiving is November 27. Let's recognize them both as more than just a day off work.

A celebration on Saturday, September 27, 2014 marked the culmination of a dream that three women had more than 20 years ago. It marked the official opening of the Thoroughbred Racing Walk of Champions in Arcadia.



The walk with 67 24" x 24" bronze markers in the sidewalk celebrates the many horses, owners, trainers and jockeys who have made thoroughbred racing history. Instead of stars like the Hollywood Walk of Fame, these honorees have horseshoes in the walk. The markers can be found on the sidewalks along Huntington Drive from Santa Anita to just beyond Second Avenue on both sides of the street, as well as on First Avenue from Huntington Drive up to the Gold Line station. "Lucky" Baldwin's marker is at the Northeast corner of Santa Anita and Huntington Drive looking toward the Santa Anita Race Track. It was Baldwin that brought horse racing to Arcadia.

The celebration featured guided and self-guided tours of the walkway. Along with live appearances from legendary retired Hall of



Fame jockeys Eddie Delahoussaye and Laffit Pincay, Jr., we were treated to a 50's – 60's live band, cake, popcorn, cookies, and bottled water.






Participants were Jim Constantion, Ken Mallory and Tom & Sheri Johnson.

#### **Utah Great Circle Tour**

September 25 - October 8

Things look different when you are driving in a Model A. And that certainly was true during the recent tour of Southern Utah organized by the Model A Touring Club.

A group of 33 cars, including 13 from the Santa Anita A's, visited five National parks, four National Monuments and various state parks. We traveled 1,300 to 1,500 miles, depending which of the optional routes you took. The Utah Great Circle Tour was organized by Bob Travis, assisted by Bob Moore.



The Model A Touring Club is an international organization of Model A owners who want to participate in major driving tours to interesting places. Their tours have included Europe, Mexico, Canada, Australia, Hawaii, Alaska and various states in the continental US.





Although many of the participants were from Southern California, cars came from Nevada, Arizona, Texas, South Dakota, Canada and Arcadia.

The tour actually started in Mt.

Carmel Junction, just outside of Zion National Park, although most of the SAA group stayed in St George the night before, then joined the rest of the tour group in Mt. Carmel. Six of us shipped our Model A's. Others towed their cars to St. George where we stored our modern cars. The storage facility for our cars was a man made cave carved out of a mountain. Bob Travis's daughter and son-in-law drove a "trouble trailer" towed by Bob's Ford Excursion which was put to use several times. Several break downs, including the "trouble trailer's" tow vehicle resulted in a number of vehicle substitutions during the trip and caused Bob to drive many more miles than the rest of us.

Bob had organized the tour in such a way that it provided everyone the flexibility of selecting optional additional destinations, deciding our departure times and choosing our lunch, refueling and other "necessary" stops. We usually traveled in groups of 4 to 6 cars and not always with the same people.

Picking a most favorite place or event would be difficult. In addition to the wonderful scenery, we had some unique






"special events" which included an evening "Light show boat tour" and driving our individual ATV vehicle's through the sand dunes.

# A Tale Of Two Clutches by John Carine


Eddy and Terry Pitts, Lynn and Marilyn Elvestrom and Diana and I were returning home from Tillamook, Oregon in our Model A's when we stopped at a light in Clalamas, Oregon. Mike had attempted to downshift his overdrive to slow for the light. He made it to neutral, but it would not engage in low. He found his clutch would not disengage.

We pushed his 30 Tudor into a nearby gas station. After taking the ladies home in the remaining Model A's we hooked up my trailer to Lynn's Expedition and gave Eddy's Model A a ride to my shop.

I spoke to Jerry Lane about the symptoms and he said he had the same thing happen to his Model A some years before. He said a spring in his clutch plate had come loose and lodged between the plate and the flywheel. Jerry said there had been a clutch manufactured in the past under the name "Nova" which captured the springs so they could not come loose. It appeared the Nova clutch was no longer available. After digging through my huge pile of "too good to throw away stuff," we found a like new Nova clutch plate. The springs on this clutch were caged so they could not slip out and cause trouble. We put the Nova clutch in Eddy 's car and all is well.

Eddy, who has many years of experience as a procurement manager, did some detective work and found the Nova brand had been purchased by a Baltimore Maryland company who still made clutches. He called our good friends at Bratton's Antique Auto Parts in Mount Airy, Maryland, and sure enough, the springs in the Model A clutch they sell have caged springs just like the Nova.

I don't know how common a failure this is. These are the only failures I know of, but in the future when I replace a clutch I will replace it with caged springs.
