



Today Molly Brouse owns and operates The Souper by featuring home cooked meals in an old-time, at-home atmosphere. Their address is 388 N. 1st Ave. in Upland.

Rain or shine, we will tour the W.K. Kellogg Home at Cal Poly Pomona followed by a lunch at Kellogg West Conference Center and Hotel. If there is shine, we will see the Arabian Horse Show. If there is no shine, we will have a docent who will take us through the horse barns.

Built in 1926, the W.K. Kellogg House was designed by Myron Hunt, a distinguished south land architect whose projects include the Pasadena Rose Bowl and the Huntington Library. Charles Gibbs Adams, a colorful character whose work was popular among many silent screen stars, was selected to landscape the grounds. One of his more notable commissions was the Hearst Castle garden in San Simeon California. The Kellogg house was built at a cost of \$150,000.

After the house tour, we will go to Cal Poly's Kellogg West Conference Center and Hotel for a buffet lunch. Following lunch, we will visit the horse stables. If there is a horse show, which will start at 2:00 PM, we will be there. If time permits, after lunch, we will stop at the Farm Store.

The cost for the Kellogg House tour, lunch at Kellogg West and the Arabian Horse Show is \$25 per person. (Actually, the horse show is free)Payment must be made in advance and the headcount on November 20 will be provided to the restaurant. Santa Anita A's visit "The Big Stick"

More than thirty club members drove down to Berth 87 in the Port of Los Angeles and took a tour on one of our nation's most iconic naval vessels. We pulled our A's up to the bow of the ship and began a day steeped in naval history. Included in our group was Seaman First Class Lyle Umenhoffer, who served on the U.S.S. Indianapolis that was sunk by the Japanese in 1945.



Once up the gangway, our tour began on the bow of the ship. Launched in August of '42 at the New York Naval Yard and commissioned in '43, the Iowa is the lead ship of her class of "fast battleships" and designated BB-61.




Finally entering the ship, we toured what was the officer's mess hall and then explored the Captains quarters.







It is here where President Franklin D. Roosevelt stayed during his 1943 trip to Cairo and the Tehran Conference where he met with Winston Churchill and Josef Stalin. A bathtub was installed for Roosevelt by cutting a large hole in the side of the cabin along with an elevator to shuttle him between decks. This bathtub remains the only one ever installed on a U.S. Navy warship. This is one of the reasons why the lowa is known as the "Battleship of Presidents."







In 2012 the Iowa was donated to the Pacific Battleship Center which operates the ship as a museum and education platform. If you are a veteran touring the ship you are required to sign in upon boarding. Your name is then announced over the ship's loudspeaker including rank, and branch of service. It is a great way to say thank you to all our men and women who have served this country so well.

After we finished touring the ship we headed over to the Acapulco restaurant for some fine Mexican food and margaritas. It was a fantastic way to end what had been a remarkable day.

Jack Dawson National Guard\US Army 1948-1964

My place of birth was Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, although in my early years my family lived in 42 different places. My first three years of high school were in Evanston, Illinois, where I met the woman I eventually married over 60 years ago. My family then moved to Sierra Madre, California where I spent my senior year in high school on the campus of Pasadena City College.

I enlisted in the California National Guard, 223rd Infantry Regiment, heavy mortar company when I was 17 in high school in 1948. The meetings were held in the basement of the Sierra Madre City Hall building. The only event of action was fighting a forest fire on Mt. Baldy's Devil's Backbone. We trained each summer at Camp San Luis Obispo. I transferred to an ordinance maintenance company while at Camp San Luis Obispo. When the Korean War broke out in June 1950 the whole 40th Division was called into active duty and assembled at Camp Cook, which is today Vandenberg Air Force base. They trained there until the 40th was sent to Japan, and then to Korea. My company was left behind at Camp San Luis Obispo to maintain the camp. Some of my high school friends in the 40th never came back from Korea.

In 1953 I was discharged from the National Guard with the rank of corporal and left California. At the age of 25 the draft board came calling so I decided to join the army reserves that required six months of active duty. Basic training was at Fort Ord, followed by five months at Fort Belvoir where I joined the critical skill reserves as a graduate engineer and served as an inspector on a nuclear power plant they were building.

My best learning experiences were learning how to drive WW2 tanks, operating huge machines, firing all sorts of weapons, and meeting such luminaries as Admiral Hyman Rickover. I was discharged from the army reserve in 1964.

When I had gone to college at Cal Poly, Camp San Louis Obispo was almost abandoned and our dorms were the old hospital area of the camp. It is now a high security state prison. Most of the old camp is now Cuesta College, the county junior college.

Veteran's Day- November 11

Veterans Day is an official United States federal holiday that is observed annually on November 11, honoring people who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces, also known as veterans. It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day, which are celebrated in other parts of the world and also mark the anniversary of the end of World War I (major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when the Armistice with Germany went into effect)

The following was adapted from an article which originally appeared in the Model A Times, written by Les Andrews.

ISOLATING ROAD TROUBLES

Following a logical sequence of checks can isolate most problems in as short of time as 10 minutes.

The Internal Combustion Engine requires just three components to run:

- 1. FUEL Ideally you need 14 pans air to 1 part fuel (14:1 ratio). Most Model A's get about 12:1 ratio from the carburetor.
- 2. COMPRESSION -The fuel needs to be compressed to at least 55 psi to enable today's fuel to ignite.
- 3. IGNITION 20.000 volts are needed at the spark plug to ignite the fuel. This combustion at the Power Stroke causes the engine to run. As little as 12,000 volts will ignite the fuel but a loss of power will occur when the voltage from the coil is less than 20,000 volts. If we look at the failure rate of each of the above components, the ignition circuit is the cause of 95% of all failures.

Failure Analysis

FUEL failures caused by:

Dirty gas tank, plugged gas shutoff valve, plugged sediment bowl, plugged fuel line, dirty carburetor, leaking manifold gasket. (4% of ail failures)

COMPRESSION failures caused by:

Head gasket leaking, stuck valve. (1% of all failures) IGNITION failures caused by:

Points burned or closed, condenser shorted or open, coil failure, high tension coil wire open, lower distributor wire broken, lower distributor plate shorted, ignition cable shorted or open, ignition switch faulty, ammeter nuts loose or open circuit, distributor cap carbon button worn or missing, distributor body cracked (shorted),rotor cracked,timing gear teeth broken. (95% of all failures)

Based on the overwhelming percent of failures in the ignition circuit, it stands to reason that the ignition components should be the first test when a failure occurs.

The ignition circuit provides voltage to the points and high voltage to the spark plugs.

- TEST 1 Open the points or place paper between contacts. Ignition switch On, test for 6 volts at the tip of the points. If this test fails, go to TEST 3. You now know the problem is in the ignition circuit. If there is voltage at the points, go to TEST 2.
- TEST 2 Remove high tension wire from the distributor cap and place or hold it 1/8" from one of the head nuts (or a bare ground). Ignition switch ON, open and close the points with a screwdriver. The points should spark each time they open and close. Each time the points open, a bright blue arc

should jump from the tip of the high tension wire to the head nut. This tests the coil for high voltage output.

TEST 3 - When test 1 fails, the problem may or may not be in the distributor. Remove the ignition cable from the distributor body and test for 6 volts at the tip of the ignition cable with ignition switch ON. If there is voltage, the trouble has been isolated to somewhere in the distributor body. Replace distributor.

When tests 1 and 3 test OK, the probability is the ignition circuit is OK. When tests 1, 2 or 3 fail, the problem is in the ignition circuit and further testing can trace the problem to the failed part. Use the Ignition Circuit Schematic to trace down the problem. With the ignition key ON or OFF, there should always be battery voltage measured at both coil terminals and at both wing nuts on the terminal box. Always check for loose connections at the ammeter. If the Ignition circuit tests OK, the next probability is FUEL.

- TEST 4 Remove the fuel line from the carburetor and drain a little fuel in a container (gas shutoff valve ON) to make sure a <u>strong flow</u> of fuel is going to the carburetor If a strong fuel flow is present, the problem is probably in the carburetor. Replace the carburetor.
- TEST 5- If tests 1 through 4 test OK, proceed with a compression test of each cylinder. Compression in each cylinder needs to be 55 PSI or more. A cylinder that measures no compression, or a difference of more than 8 pounds less than the other cylinders, indicates a blown head gasket or a stuck valve.



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
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





