sequence as each of the three destinations was reached. One player per car. The navigator of each car also drew two playing cards. Elaine Perry, Sheri Johnson and Tracy Butkus had worked for several months in planning the routes, questions to be answered along the route and assembling the individual packets for each car. And with each new set of directions, there were questions to answer about places along the route. The first envelope was opened at the start of the run.

#### ERA FASHIONS

We begin our investigation into men's shoe styles from the Model A Era by thinking: "Great Gatsby", '20's gangsters and "Downton Abbey". These afford us some possible mental images.

The shoes, well, they came primarily in brown or black cap toe oxfords for office wear. They came in spunky white leather nu-buck for sports, and casual wear. They were also known as summer lace ups.

Back in the days of our Model A Era women were losing their one go to style of the lace up boots so familiar until the twenties. New styles were gracing the shelves in finer shoe shops everywhere. Men's shoes were close on their heels and were now including more styles than just the cap toe lace up boot! An add-on to the boot style transformed ordinary boot styles through the addition of "spats". Spats were first popularized by gangsters as well as fashion savvy men. Spats were usually made of wool or linen fabric. The wearing



of spats, some sporting buttons on the sides really dressed up a suit and screamed "fashionista"! They were very popular indeed. They added a decorated element to traditional fashion suiting looks.

The 1920's oxford maintained a plain clean style through much of the 1920's with black, red-brown and dark brown options. Oxfords were like old cap toe lace up boots, without the portion covering the ankle. One thing was changed, now the soles and heels were made with rubber rather than leather. Two tone oxfords became extremely popular during this time, offering a mix of formal and casual details. Another variation on the oxford was the more exciting Wingtip style Trading off the oxford's straight toe, Wingtips had a curved line that looked like a "W". They were primarily selected to wear with formal attire such as an evening suit. Wingtips were worn for "steppin' out in style". During the twenties the movies portrayed men in popular, vogue styles. The general public copied them. One style called the "Hollywood Boulevard Style " was trendy. Men wore a finely tailored vest along with spats and were considered to be "dressed to the nines".

Men appreciated the roomier toe of the era's shoes. They eschewed the previous era's comparatively sharper and pointed toes. The new styles were replaced with round toe, or wide box toe oxfords.

In 1917 "Chuck Taylor All Stars", also known as "Converse", and were originally designed to be tennis shoes. The Chuck Taylor signature was added circle patch in 1923, and he was recognized for taking the shoe to athletes everywhere, but especially to basketball. The 1920's version of the sports shoe was white high top, or black or brown rubber gum crepe soles, with a round seal over the ankle. These were worn for many sports including hiking.

Men's shoe styles in the era were definitely different from the shoes of a few years previous, and much more fun! Just like the Model A Fords we all love.





# Gordon N. Johnson USMC 1944-1946

The San Gabriel area is where I grew up. I had graduated from Alhambra High School just before I entered the Marine Corps. I was 18 when I entered the USMC on January 10, 1944. Boot camp was in San Diego, with mortar training at Camp Pendleton. My unit, the Third Marine Division shipped out to the pacific on September 1, 1944; with a two week stop over at Pearl Harbor. We then continued on to the Marianas Island campaign.

After the initial invasion of Guam on July 21, 1944, my unit went in for the mop-up operation with a lot of jungle patrolling and constant intensive training at an outpost in the middle of the junglę.

On February 19, 1945 the 3<sup>rd</sup> Marine Division took part in the invasion of Iwo Jima along with the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Marine Divisions, each landing in different sectors at different times. We watched from onboard transport ships as battleships further out shelled Iwo before the amphibious landing of the Marines began. The battle there was during cold and rainy weather. When the Island was secured those of us who survived were returned to Guam in April 1945.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Division was now being trained for the invasion of Japan. However, on August 14 the Japanese surrendered, with the official signing of the surrender on September 2, 1945.

On October 10, 1945, twenty four of us were volunteered from the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Division, and were landed on the island of Chichi Jima. Our purpose was to secure the island and collect war crime prisoners. Our squad of eight Marines captured one Japanese general plus five other high ranking officers. We held them until reinforcements arrived two weeks later and a stockade was built.

In May 1946, the same 24 Marines brought these six war crime prisoners back to Guam to stand trial. It was our duty to escort the prisoners to and from the court room plus guard them during the trial proceedings.

At the end of May 1946 I had enough points for discharge and was returned to the United States on a former Italian luxury liner converted to a troop ship and disembarked at Treasure Island, San Francisco and from there taken by another ship to San Diego where I was discharged on June 5, 1946 with the rank of corporal.

When I returned from the war I went to work for my father who was in the construction business. Later I obtained a contractor's license and went into business for myself. I have been retired for the past 25 years. My first wife died in 1973; we had one son. My current wife, Helen, and I have been married for over 40 years and we are charter members of the Santa Anita A's.

## The Best Operating Temperature for Your Model A Ford

Years ago, most Model A owners did not give much thought to the temperature of their engine just as long at the radiator did not boil over. Henry did not include a temperature gauge in the Model A so unless an accessory temperature gauge had been installed, the only way the driver knew if the engine was running too hot was the appearance of steam from the radiator cap or water on the windshield when the radiator started to boil over.

Today a lot of owners have installed a temperature gauge that allows easy monitoring of the engine temperature. This is especially important for those who use their cars for long distance touring.

A temperature gauge is also very useful for knowing if your Model A is running too cold. On a cold day, especially when using a

heavy duty radiator, the engine may not come up to a good operating temperature. Now, you may ask "What is the problem with the engine running too cold? As long as the radiator is not boiling over, that should be good enough." Model A engines run best if the coolant temperature is between approximately 160 and 180 degrees. The carburetor can be run a little leaner which promotes more complete combustion and a cleaner more efficient engine. It is also very important, the oil will get completely warmed up so the accumulated moisture within the engine will be evaporated. Allowing moisture to accumulate inside the engine will

promote the formation of sludge and cause corrosion.

Along with a temperature gauge, a thermostat is strongly recommended. Good quality 160 deg. thermostats are available from most parts suppliers. Now, some people say that the addition of a thermostat will make the engine overheat. This is not true. If

there is a problem with your Model A running too hot, adding a thermostat will not make the problem worse. The problem is with the cooling system itself and not because a thermostat had been installed.

A thermostat will help maintain a more even coolant temperature, especially on a cool day. When going uphill, the engine has to work harder and the coolant temperature will increase. When going downhill with little load on the engine, the coolant temperature will go down. A thermostat in the system will help even out these changes in the coolant temperature.

You will find that installing a 160 degree thermostat and a good temperature gauge will allow your Model A engine to warm up quicker after a cold start and operate more efficiently. A good quality temperature gauge will allow you to monitor the temperature of the coolant.

## Tech Tip The best temperature gauge to use

A good quality mechanical gauge is preferred for your Model A. Mechanical gauges are more accurate and have better resolution than most electric gauges. Temperature gauges with a full 270 Deg. sweep of the dial offer a longer scale which makes it a lot easier to see the actual gauge reading. Some gauges have such a short scale you cannot tell if the temperature has changed by just a little or a lot.

Thermo gauges in the radiator cap (Moto-Meters or Thermo Quails) are not of much use. To operate correctly, the sensing bulb must be in the coolant, not just positioned above it. Most of the time, when these devices indicate the engine is running hot it is too late as the coolant is already boiling.

Knowing the temperature of your engine is a good thing. If you do not already have one, install a temperature gauge in your Model A.
