Red Cross Meeting Facilities Update by Joe Wilson

There has been an increasing concern that we have outgrown our meeting room at the Red Cross Facilities. Last year the board decided that we should begin a search for another location which would better accommodate our needs.

Last month we reported that beginning in 2017 the Red Cross would no longer commit to a year long agreement for us to use their facilities. At their September meeting the board voted to mount an aggressive effort to find another meeting location due to the newly imposed three month deadline. Since then Vicky Balmot was successful in getting the Red Cross to allow us to use their facilities through 2017 but with an increase in rent from \$50 to \$100 per night.

Carol Emanuelli identified a potential new location which was checked out by Sheri Johnson and Elaine Perry who then reported their findings to the board at their October 12th meeting. However, prior to the board meeting a decision was made to put the search for a new location on hold and a commitment was made to the Red Cross that we would continue to use their faculties through 2017.

ERA FASHIONS

1930 Fashions

The exuberant wild and free 1920's came to a sudden halt on October 29th, 1929. The crash pulled the rug out from under people's feet and threw them into darker days.

The fashion market responded accordingly. Hemlines continued a "dropping trend" and descended between six to eight inches below the calf for day wear, and were very long for evening. This signified a more conservative approach to dressing. As the

economy turned downward a more austere attitude descended over the land. Skirts matched this trend by dropping and showing off "less leg". Gone were the days of carefree frolic, and just dancing under the

If this wasn't bad enough, well, necklines on ladies wear all got higher! Sleeves became a new fashion focus. They were the latest things in detail change. There were many different ones to be seen. A new look was the cape sleeve which incorporating an actual cape attached at the collar of the garment, covering shoulders and sleeves as well, short or long. There were elbow sleeves, and sleeves ending just below the

elbow. Sometimes ladies wore a short sleeve for afternoon usually accompanied by the long glove. Yes, it did just keep on getting better that year.

Big voluminous bishop sleeves appeared. These are full puffed sleeves, which come to the elbow, and were reserved mostly for eveningwear.

There were tailored suits, which were simple with a long jacketed look worn over longish skirts. Coats were voluminous, some sporting puffed top sleeves with panels swinging from the elbow and skirts with widened hemlines. One popular coat style was borrowed from a Russian Cossack style with fur collars. Most coats were richly trimmed with such furs as seal, and Persian lamb. The collars were large, and many coats also had fur cuffs reaching far up the arm. A popular evening style was to wear a short white fur jacket over dresses. Many women wore a matching white fur muff along with the short jacket style.

Other styles popular this year included the relatively simple tunic, and overalls made just for women! These could be purchased from the Sear's catalogue for a few dollars. Sports clothing was now being designed for active participation in specific sports. Sports attire was now being taken seriously, and created to encourage and facilitate freedom of movement. Previously women's sports clothing could be cumbersome, and was really more of a fashion statement and could be worn throughout the day. Now, however, sports attire had a specific purpose, and was pared down to the essential elements. The sporting attire was changed upon cessation of the activity.

The year of 1930 was a somber one, and most definitely showed it's influence in fashion. It also brought with it a new burgeoning industry centered right here in Hollywood. A new world of cinematic escape would be bringing fashion and fantasy to the masses! Fashion would carry on in all it's exultant and exuberant array in the new "talkies", and everyone went to the movies!

Tinkering with Our Toys (Part 2)

This article is "borrowed" from the July - August 1982 issue of the Restorer, written by Arnold 'Bud" Dodge - Yakima, WA.

Very often a simple hint or procedure can save considerable disappointment and frustration. Many of us working on the mechanics of our Model As have become experts "after-the-fact." The following is a personal on-thejob compilation of brief and to-the-point suggestions. These might be helpful in an endeavor to become a "before-the-fact" expert.

With 50 years of writings in this area by numerous authorities, it is not without some trepidation that there can be recall of some "old hat" and debatable ideas. An honest attempt has been made to avoid a major invasion in this area..

NOISES

- A strange idle knock can come from a crankshaft pulley that is slightly short. The ratchet nut can not be drawn up enough to tighten the pulley on the crankshaft. A thin washer under the ratchet nut (or a new pulley) will repair this and stop the oil leak at the same time. A loose pulley can usually be easily found by rocking the fan blade.
- To remove a fan blade from the water pump shaft, remove blade retaining nut, screw on a head bolt nut about half its depth, follow this with a head bolt stud, tighten, rap bolt sharply with a hammer while holding fan blade. The fan blade will loosen and pump shaft will not be damaged.
- Intermittent noises in flywheel region can originate from starter Bendix drive working its way into the flywheel ring gear while car is being driven. A small spring loaded retaining lug located at the edge of the Bendix gear is usually at fault. If stuck, light oil will free it up. If broken or worn out, it will no longer hold the idle gear in "home" position.
- Constant or intermittent valve noise after installation of adjustable push rods is not uncommon. The lifter surfaces are not always square with the valve base and the oil cushion is lost. While this is annoying there is no harm if valve adjustment is within specs. With wear-in the noise often quiets down.
- An unexplained intermittent noise in front of engine can be caused by omission of the tension plunger on the end of the camshaft. The side cap of the timing gear cover can be carefully removed to check.
- Many disconcerting sounds can originate from front motor mounting and side splash pans. Pushing in the clutch can . aggravate these sounds especially when motor is warm. With a bit of patience these nuisance noises can be eliminated.
- Even slightly loose fan front roller bearings can set up a nasty resonance or clatter at certain engine speeds due to a small degree of blade imbalance, a whipping fan belt or an out-ofround pulley. The sound resembles loose wrist pins or piston slap and usually occurs in the higher speed ranges and can

be detected by temporary removal of fan belt. While the noise, once identified, is of minor consequence, it may mean that the fan will self destruct in time. Replacement parts may be the only answer. In any case, frequently inspect fan blades for cracks and loose rivets if of that type.

· Some fiber replacement camshaft timing gears are offcenter. This can create some unusual idle knock frequencies. A faulty gear can be readily noted during engine assembly by observation while turning engine over. Replacement with a quality gear is best. A rat tail file can be used to adjust and center the gear mounting holes. It is essential to draw up the large mounting nut very securely.

WATER PUMP

 New or rebuilt water pumps take a while to settle down and stop leaking. The leverage afforded by a large screwdriver on the gland nut can break off tightening lugs especially if you run out of threads. Back off and add a packing ring or two. Tighten slowly over several hours of operation. This can be done very effectively while motor is idling if due respect is given fan blade and tightening is not overdone. Leaking will stop.

WATER OUTLET

• Save your nerves and the flanges on the upper water outlet. File head (usually not needed) and outlet mating surfaces square. Use a thin layer of non-setting Permatex. No gasket. You can now tighten all head bolts without wincing. Replacement outlet gaskets often squeeze out on the ends and can eventually cause a break in outlet casting as head is drawn up.

OVERHEATING

- Many Model A's have been accused of overheating just because a leaky radiator cap gasket permitted windshield spotting from expanding coolant from a normal operating engine.
- Air bubbles showing at the radiator filler neck may not be a leaky head gasket, but air pulled in through the water pump grease fitting or past pump packing. Always use a capped type grease fitting at pump base fitted with a gasket under screw cap. Properly packed and maintained pumps should not leak air.

COOLING SYSTEM

- A leaky gasket on the water inlet on side of engine is just in the right place to trickle coolant on the dipstick and into crankcase. This can cause an unfounded worry.
- No use trying to fill your radiator to the top as it will just bubble out the overflow tube to seek an operating level. Don't be over confident, though, add a bit of coolant now and then to assure a safe level. A rubber tube extension on your overflow tube outlet will help keep water marks off of the firewall.
- The slight fluid oozing of a head gasket is not uncommon • One source of hard-to-locate engine noise can be the fan. even on trued blocks and heads. Replacement copper head gaskets have a minimum of crimping and can allow capillary action to pull fluid out the sides. One-quarter to a half a can of radiator sealant usually will stop this unsightly condition if the problem persists. Do not exceed normal head-bolt torque (50-55 foot pounds). It may make the condition worse.

My experience with the military was similar to John Emanuelli's in that we both took ROTC while attending Lincoln High in Los Angeles, although John was much more involved in the program than I was.

Fast forward a few years and while attending the University of Arizona on a football scholarship, I received the infamous "Greetings" letter to which I quickly began to panic because at that time all draftees were being sent to Viet Nam and I wasn't ready to give the ultimate sacrifice. Many of my friends had gone and several did not come back and if I was destined to go I wanted to serve on my own terms. I quickly dropped out of school and returned to SoCal to plan my next move to honor my obligation. This was to partner with a close buddy and join the US Marines and fly jets. We went to sign up and completed all the paper work and took the medical exam to see if we were physically good enough to be a Marine, (pause), my friend passed and I didn't because of a stigmatism in my left eye which would disqualify me from flying. My friend however joined the Marines and flew jets, 250 combat missions, became a member of the Blue Angels, retired as a "Bird Colonel".

Panic #2 set in, as this was Wednesday and I was to report the following Monday. Then I recalled my football coach at Pasadena CC, Don Hunt, was a Major in the California National Guard so I quickly met with him and explained my dilemma. Coach Hunt assured me to not worry and come to the Armory on Sunday to be sworn in, which I did and at that point I, for sure, was relieved and a member of the California National Guard and ready to complete a six year obligation.

The tour began in early 1963 for basic training at Ft Ord in beautiful Monterey Bay but we never saw it from the base because of the fog and we had no time off. After basic training everyone in our company received orders to our next assignment and that was a surprise for all. I being a `clerk typist` had no idea where my assignment would take me, low and behold, I was assigned to a Judge Advocate Office at the Presidio of San Francisco, WHEW! Needless to say that wasn't too bad.

After six months of active duty I spent 5 & ½ years with monthly meetings and 2 weeks in the summer at Camp Roberts in central California. The only real danger I experienced was being on the street guarding the Armory at 28th and Hope with a weapon and no ammunition during the Watts Riots. When I asked for ammunition, the officer in charge told me to "just look tough".

To sum up my service it really was easy compared to the many that lost their lives or were forever injured both physically and mentally. I will be forever grateful for their service and often pray for those who serve today.



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
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
