Santa did show up, but again this year he didn't get to talk to Mickey; perhaps they don't get along well with each other.


























MORE PAST EVENTS

Kim Rhode shares her Olympic experience at November SAA meeting.

Kim Rhode provided our Santa Anita A's club members an interesting look at her life-long experience in the sport of shooting, including her participation in the last five Olympic events.

Kim brought all five of her medals to the meeting and shared stories about each one. She also brought "Information" cards which she personally signed for our members.

Kim has a love of cars and has a nice collection, including several Model As. Kim Joined our club earlier this year; her parents, Richard and Shawn, joined this month. They have a 1928 Model A Roadster. John McDannel presented Kim with a "Congratulations" card from the Santa Anita A's, signed by our members in recognition of her Olympic achievements.









Kim Rhode

In sport, there is no such thing as a sure thing, but Kim Rhode is about as close as one can get. Kim has won an Olympic medal in each of the last five Olympic Games, including winning her third Olympic Gold Medal in London at the 2012 Games by hitting an astounding 99 out of 100 (moving) targets.



Kim's Olympic career began by winning gold in 1996 at just 17 years old and in London she became the first American in history in any individual sport to win medals in five consecutive Olympics Games. and she has no intention of stopping there. Kim expects to compete for another four or five Olympics."

Kim is a fourteen-time National Champion and has been World Champion, World Cup Champion, PanAm Games Champion and CAT Champion. She has collected thirteen individual World Cup gold medals. In the world of competitive shooting, she has won it all, most more than once. With virtually no room for error in her sport Kim has mastered the art of performing her best when it matters most. From Southern California, Kim began shooting at just 10 years old and even lettered in the sport all four years of high school...which culminated with her first Olympic gold medal. She has been a spokesperson for both the Outdoor Channel and The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. When she's not taking aim at targets she enjoys restoring classic vehicles and collecting first edition children's books, her favorite being Raggedy Ann and The Wizard of OZ.

Kim was the first US athlete in any sport to qualify for the 2012 Olympic Games and not surprisingly, the USOC has labeled Kim as one of their "Top 12 Athletes to Watch in 2012". Kim is currently preparing to return to the Olympics in 2016

More on fire extinguishers

The article on fire extinguishers in last month's issue brought a response from SAA member, Mike Kniest, a retired LA County Fire Department specialist, on the use of fire retardants. He pointed out that the article was misleading and has prepared an article which better explains fires and the appropriate fire extinguisher for use in automobile fires. I thank Mike for preparing this informative article.

Are you prepared for "A" car fire?

Common Sense Approach

All fires are usually extinguished if detected in the incipient stage with the use of a proper extinguisher and application method.

RISK verses GAIN

Your safety must always be paramount when approaching the task of extinguishing **ANY FIRE**. Understanding the fire hazard is only the first step. There comes a time when waiting for the properly trained and equipped first responder fire fighter is the only **SAFE** option.

If your present solution to a vehicle fire is to just carry any fire extinguisher in your car until it's needed without any second thought, your good intentions and efforts are placing your *personal safety at serious risk*.

Ask yourself:

Do I have an extinguisher?

Do I know where it is?

Is it the proper type and size?

Is it maintained and up to date?

Do I know how to safely and properly use it?

Do I understand all the other surrounding hazards?

The Fire Hazard and Extinguisher Types.

Every car fire consists of at least one or more of the following type of fires:

- Ordinary combustibles use Class A extinguisher
- Flammable Liquids use Class B extinguisher
- Electrical use Class C extinguisher
- Combustible Metals use Class D extinguisher

Your Extinguisher Choice by Type, Rating and Size
You must choose your extinguisher by its type, rating
and size, whether it is: Water, CO2, Dry Chemical,
Halon or Foam. The main visual distinction among
extinguishers is size. In most cases bigger is better
(1-A vs. 4-A), but sometimes the biggest extinguishers
are too heavy or bulky to maneuver and store.

Most of the above choices are available in a rechargeable or disposable extinguisher. A rechargeable one will cost more, but refilling it once the pressure gauge shows that its use or time has depleted the contents, is still in the long run, less expensive than buying a new disposable one.

Once a choice is made as to the extinguisher by its rating, then you must chose a size. Often the car extinguisher is purchased to fit into a limited storage area. Your choice should be of a proper size to accomplish the task and still have some agent left in reserve in case of a rekindle. Do not permit the unit cost to be the deciding factor, type and size, matched to your working knowledge is the key. All extinguishers have not only operational limits but require timely inspections and maintenance to insure optimal performance.

Training and Skills

Many local fire departments offer extinguisher training to groups like seniors. You may get some limited training over the Internet, through video or written lecture courses. But, you can't beat supervised handson training. Extinguisher training is not a one-time event; for your safety ongoing or annual refresher courses provide you with up to date information and skills.

Additional Safety Awareness and Considerations:

- Read and follow all cautions and instructions on the extinguisher.
- Understand and do not exceed either your, or the extinguisher limitations.
- Dry chemical extinguishers carried in vehicles require timely (once a month) shaking.
- Install a battery master shut off switch, which assures all electrical current is off.
- Make sure that the fuel line shutoff valves are properly functioning.
- Make sure the gasoline nozzle is bonded with the filler neck while refueling.
- You must understand static electricity when fueling or transferring fuel.
- NEVER fuel in a confined area, a well vented area is a must.
- Adhere to all warning signs "STOP YOUR MOTOR", NO SMOKING, NO CELL PHONE".
- Get extinguisher training and keep skills up to date.
- Environmentally blended fuels make extinguishment more complex.

Bottom Line

For the average car fire you need a versatile and effective extinguisher and most ABC class extinguishers will meet those needs. Due to the many variables involved, I can not <u>recommend</u> a specific fire extinguisher for your use, but do <u>suggest</u> that you purchase a versatile ABC type as big as you can store, maintain, carry and safely use.




