Saturday March 5



SPECIAL REPORT

Making More of the Mitchell By Keith Smith

In the last issue of *Spoken Wheels*, Mickey Fruchter told us a tale of woe about how he wore out the thrust bearing of his faithful engine simply because he consistently held the clutch in while waiting for the stop light.

This is not an unusual practice. Many of us do the same thing since we wish to move out as soon as the light changes to green. It's not because we plan to beat out the hot rod we are sitting beside, we simply don't want to be one of those drivers that unthinkingly hold up traffic and cause delays to other drivers.

Because the Model A transmission doesn't have a syncro-meshed gear train, it takes some time between pushing in the clutch pedal until the transmission can be put into low smoothly and allow us to move out. Thus, Mickey put his car in first gear and held in the clutch so as to avoid this delay.



If you have an overdrive like the Mitchell, you can avoid the delay that Mickey encountered by putting your transmission in low and shifting your Mitchell to neutral. This allows you to plant both feet firmly on the floor. Then, when the light changes to green, you can rapidly push in the clutch pedal and move the Mitchell into its syncromeshed "low" position and move out swiftly. No wear and tear on the engine's thrust bearing! The Mitchell has other driving advantages, let me tell you of a few of the tricks that the more seasoned touring drivers already know.

Driving in a parade? Most of this driving is in low gear, right? Keep your transmission in low and when you need to slow down, shift the Mitchell to neutral. You can coast along this way and when the car needs a little power, the Mitchell can be moved easily to "low." You don't have to "ride the clutch" and wear out your clutch or thrust bearing. Easier on the legs, too!

Coming to a stop light? Put the Mitchell in neutral and when slow enough, you can shift the transmission into low gear while <u>still rolling</u> – ready to move out when the light turns green.

Cruising through a town or through hills and curves below 35 MPH? Try putting your car in second overdrive instead of continually shifting between third and second gear to avoid "lugging" the engine. This gives immediate power to climb the hills, or accelerate as traffic moves out.

Going down a steep hill and need to down-shift? Put your Mitchell in neutral and you can easily down-shift to second without clash of gears. Do this quickly, however, since the Mitchell in neutral is like free-wheeling and will allow the car to accelerate on the hill. You can even shift from second to first using this technique. A good rule for going down steep hills is to use the same gear you would use to climb it.

Coming out of a full stop and facing a long hill as you accelerate? Shift to "second over" from second and hold it to about 35 MPH before shifting into third gear. This gives you a much better acceleration than shifting directly from second into third.

If you have an overdrive, learn to use it effectively and don't think that it's only for cruising down the freeway.

FROM THE SHOP BENCH

It's Here !!!

In a recent article in the Spoken Wheels I spoke about the perils and pitfalls of using ethanol in our Model As and said that we would see ethanol fuel at service stations beginning in January 2022. Well, guess what? It's already here. I saw a pump at a Mobile station located at the corner of Huntington Drive and Olive in Duarte that were clearly labeled "contains ethanol". There is no question that ethanol blended fuel is here to stay as further evidenced by the following article that appeared in this month Popular Mechanics web site. Thanks to Jack Dawson for bringing this to my attention.

E15 In Your Future?

The idea has officially been signed off for the legality of using E15 in 2007 and newer cars, based on testing that showed no problems in engine performance, durability or emissions. Why on earth do we need E15? It's the Blend Wall. By passing the Energy independence and Security Cat of 2007, congress mandated that 15 billion gallons of corn ethanol be blended into the nation's gasoline supply by 2015. Last year's production of 11 billion gallons will ramp up to 22 billion by 2012. The amount of alcohol in gas must therefore be increased. Jeff Broin, CEO of Sioux Falls, S.D. - based POET, the nations largest ethanol producer, says that the ethanol industry would like to increase that 15 to 20 percent or more. All of which is okay in vehicles engineered to use it, but what about those that aren't?

Broin suggests that in the future "consumers will be able to dial up the concentration of ethanol they'd like to to burn, at the pump from zero to 20 percent or more, just like they choose their octane ratings today". That's exactly what those of us with older cars, tools or toys will need.. Problem: Getting different blends to the consumer will require massive infrastructure changes. Gas station owners will have to upgrade existing pumps to handle E15 and higher concentrations.

The blending pumps Brown is suggesting will cost more than a typical \$2000 conventional unit. In addition, station owners will have to install more tanks. An energy policy that mandates more domestic production sounds like a great idea. But sneaking more ethanol into the supply stream at the expense of people who rely on their cars, boats and outdoor power equipment might better be left to the market place and not to bureaucrats.
