

Orange County Pancake Breakfast Canceled

The Orange County Model A Club has canceled their 2012 pancake breakfast. Because it has been a major Southern California Model A event I thought it important to report the reason for the cancellation. Below is a communication from the president of the Orange County Chapter.

Spoken Wheels Editor

At last night's meeting (2/9/2012) we had a spirited debate regarding the pancake breakfast.

We have produced our famous pancake breakfast for 50 years at Hart Park without a single significant complaint, with no accidents, no injuries and no damage to the park; we have paid substantial fees and cleaned up after the event. We have received praise from attendees and local businesses (i.e. the Plaza Motel, CW Moss and others); yet we feel the requirements being imposed by the City of Orange, Parks and Recreation Department, place a significant hardship for a successful execution of the event, now and/or in the future (see attachment).

An overwhelming majority of members in attendance, voted to cancel this year's breakfast due to the shortness of remaining time, the City of Orange negative responses to our requirements, lack of volunteers for committee chair and co-chair positions, unavailability of dates in April and the city's outrageous statement that "If even a single person violates their rules they would immediately shut us down."

We had been trying to negotiate with the city since last April with this being the result. Mark Schwing approached the mayor to intercede for us and the result after four weeks was another letter from parks and recreation stating the mayor had upheld their position in this matter in verbiage that essentially said "take it or leave it".

We have investigated alternate venues, even prior to this, and feel confident that we can find a more friendly venue in another city but, the time constraints have made it prudent to cancel the breakfast and notify our many neighbor clubs.

We have every intent to reorganize the event to be less labor intensive require less equipment and again put on a top rated event in another city. It most likely will not include pancakes, sausage and eggs. We are open to suggestions for this future event. Will it be this year, next year? You can make it happen.

FROM THE SHOP BENCH by Bob Travis

Radios in Cars

Below is a story about how the installation of radios in automobiles first began. The story was picked up on the Internet. Both the source and author are unknown. This is Part 2 of a 2- Part series.

HIT THE ROAD

Selling complicated car radios that cost 20 percent of the price of a brand-new car wouldn't have been easy in the best of times, let alone during the Great Depression – Galvin lost money in 1930 and struggled for a couple of years after that. But things picked up in 1933 when Ford began offering Motorolas pre-installed at the factory. In 1934 they got another boost when Galvin struck a deal with B. F. Goodrich tire company to sell and install them in its chain of tire stores. By then the price of the radio, installation included, had dropped to \$55. The Motorola car radio was off and running. (The name of the company would be officially changed from Galvin Manufacturing to "Motorola" in 1947.)

In the meantime, Galvin continued to develop new uses for car radios. In 1936, the same year that it introduced push-button tuning, it also introduced the Motorola Police Cruiser, a standard car radio that was factory preset to a single frequency to pick up police broadcasts. In 1940 he developed with the first handheld two-way radio – the Handie-Talkie – for the U. S. Army.

A lot of the communications technologies that we take for granted today were born in Motorola labs in the years that followed World War II. In 1947 they came out with the first television to sell under \$200. In 1956 the company introduced the world's first pager; in 1969 it supplied the radio and television equipment that was used to televise Neil Armstrong's first steps on the Moon. In 1973 it invented the world's first handheld cellular phone. Today Motorola is one of the second-largest cell phone manufacturer in the world. And it all started with the car radio.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO

The two men who installed the first radio in Paul Galvin's car, Elmer Wavering and William Lear, ended up taking very different paths in life.

Wavering stayed with Motorola. In the 1950's he helped change the automobile experience again when he developed the first automotive alternator, replacing inefficient and unreliable generators. The invention lead to such luxuries as power windows, power seats, and, eventually, air-conditioning.

Lear also continued inventing. He holds more than 150 patents. Remember eight-track tape players? Lear invented that. But what he's really famous for are his contributions to the field of aviation. He invented radio direction finders for planes, aided in the invention of the autopilot, designed the first fully automatic aircraft landing system, and in 1963 introduced his most famous invention of all, the Lear Jet, the world's first mass-produced, affordable business jet. (Not bad for a guy who dropped out of school after the eighth grade.)
