

## 1928 CAR REPAIR MAILER

#### **AUTOMOTIVE REPAIR ADVERTISEMENT IN 1928** SENT ON A PENNY POSTCARD



We're writing this letter to you today because we want to help you get your money out of your Model T.

It's still as good a car as it was the day the new Model A Ford was announced and there's no need to sacrifice it.

The Model T Ford is still used by more people than any other automobile. Eight million are in active service right now and many of them can be driven one, two, three and five years and even longer.

Bring your car to us and let us look it over. You'll be surprised to see how little it costs to put it in tip-top shape.

New fenders, for instance, cost from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each, with a labor charge of \$1.00 to \$2.50. Tuning up the motor and replacing commutator case, brush and vibrator points costs only \$1.00, with a small charge for material. Brake shoes can be installed and emergency brakes equalized for a labor charge of only \$1.25. A labor charge of \$4.00 to \$5.00 will cover the overhauling of the front axle, rebushing springs and spring perches, and straightening, aligning and adjusting wheels.

The labor charge for overhauling the average rear axle runs from \$5.75 to \$7.00. Grinding valves and cleaning carbon can be done for \$3.00 to \$4.00.

A set of four new pistons and rings cost only \$7.00. For a labor charge of \$20 to \$25.00 you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts are extra.

## 41st Annual Antique Nationals

You've been waiting in line and now it's your turn. You pull up to the starting line inching forward until the first pair of staging lights come on. Then you wait for your opponent to stage. Let him set his second set of staging lights before you roll forward enough to set yours. That makes you in control of when the tree lights up. You roll up. There, they're lit. Set your brake. Don't roll any further or you'll red light. Watch the



lights. The first vellow - get those RPMs up. Second yellow – get ready. Right after the 3rd yellow you must go but not too quickly.

If you actually see the green light, your reaction time stinks! There's the 3rd yellow. Release the brake, drop the clutch and there you go. Listen to that engine. Don't shift too soon or you'll run out of steam before you get to the finish line. It's peaking - shift - quickly. Don't lose momentum. Get ready for the second shift. #### **Update on Motor Oil & Ethanol**



I have consistently recommended the use of Penzoil 20W-50 detergent oil for use in freshly rebuilt Model A engines. This oil offers several features. It is a detergent (Non-synthetic), it's weight provides for a broad range of driving conditions, from startup to hard use, and contains a good level of zink as indicated by the API Service rating of SM. The oil has become hard to find and I suspect soon will be discontinued as the new service rating is SL, meaning less zink.

I have found a replacement in Valvoline VR-1 Racing Oil with the API Service rating of SM. It is available at all parts houses and recently Kragen's (O'Reilly's) had it on sale at \$ 2.99 /Quart.

Ethanol gasoline is definitely here! Some stations are offering both ethanol blend and regular unleaded so you need to check the pumps. They are clearly marked. Union 76 appears to be selling only ethanol blend. I have already read one horror story of using ethanol in an antique car.

And now for a Tiny Tip: There is a very simple and easy way to clean spoke wheels. Buy a good brand of "Foam Bathroom Cleaner" to spray on your wheels. After spraying, wait a few minutes to let the cleaner soak in and penetrate the dirt. Rinse off with a garden hose and you should have clean and shiny wheels. I've tried it and it works.


This car was owned by my father who was member of the Conejo Valley Model A Club. Two members of the Club have inspected the car and valued it at \$25,000. It has been fully restored.
