



### **Downshifting Dilemma**

I read with interest the article "Learn to Downshift" by Bob Travis in the April issue of *Spoken Wheels*. I must admit, I had to read the article several times to insure that I understood every word.

I have a couple of suggestions. When the author refers to "cyclic compressive stress which does not hurt the babbitt . . . " I harked back to some earlier research I had done in this same area. I found that if you retard the thunkwiler 75% you can usually avoid this problem.

His reference to "Horsepower = torque (ft-lb) X RPM divided by a constant (5252) had me for a second. I believe the constant (5252) was Bob's address when he was in high school. But the ft-lb kinda threw me. Do you weight one foot or two? By the way, I had a torque for breakfast the other morning; it was creamfilled and chocolate covered.

I did take his advice of "lowering the bearing compressive limit". For those of you who are unaware, there is a small dial for doing this on the firewall, just under the steering shaft.

I think, with these footnotes, Bob's article will be even more useful to our members.

### A Shifting Viewpoint

Downshifting to maintain an appropriate engine operating RPM and prevent engine damage by "lugging" is a good driving technique. It is also common practice to downshift in order to retard a vehicle and "maintain" a safe speed when descending a grade. However, the concept of downshifting to brake a vehicle under normal driving situations is controversial. It will likely not have a significant affect on brake life, but will put extra stress on your drive train if you downshift badly.

There is a danger when downshifting a non-synchro transmission. You run the risk of "missing" the down shift, can't get it into gear quickly, and end up with a free-wheeling vehicle. The time required to downshift may exceed the time needed to avoid hitting the object in front of you. Using your engine for braking is only effective at higher engine RPM's.

Give your drive train a "brake".

### From the Bottom Boy

Learn to Downshift - Addendum to Bob Travis' (Learn to Downshift - Article in April, 2011 Spoken Wheels)

Last summer we drove to the wedding ceremony of one of my former violin students in our Model A. The bride and groom hired a chauffer-driven 1927 Packard Limousine to drive them to their reception. The owner of the limo has many vintage cars for hire; for weddings, film shoots. He told me that he spent a small fortune for new brakes on his Packard and that he downshifts a lot to save his brakes. I told him that I do the same on my Model A and my Kia Sportage (manual transmission).

It is more difficult to downshift a 'stock' Model A transmission (having to double-clutch) than a '39 tranny or modern type (syncromesh) transmission; but it helps to slow down your car and save your brakes.

A brake job on a Model A is NOT cheap (even if you do the work yourself), and if you can save money on brakes you can spend it on gas and drive your car more.

Our club gives back to its' members more than any other club that I know of. I know that most of our members don't look at the Treasurer's Report, which is posted each month and most of our members don't care. They come for fun and fellowship and I want to keep it that way.

### **Redlands Tour**

Saturday, July 30 - Sunday, July 31

There is a production of the musical "Cinderella" by Rogers and Hammerstein taking place at the Redlands Bowl. The plan is to leave Pasadena at 9:00 a.m. and drive non-freeway to Redlands (stopping for lunch on the way). Members can drive their Model A's or modern irons.

Part 1. We plan to visit the Historical Glass Museum. It was founded in 1976, to preserve specimens of American glass from artists and factories that were becoming extinct. On display are over 6,000 examples of American glass from the mid – 1800s to contemporary art glass. The museum has a large collection of milk glass dating as far back as the 1800s. Admission is by a \$3.00 donation.

Part 2. We would then travel to the Lincoln Memorial Shrine in Redlands. It is a beautiful and comprehensive museum and collection of Lincoln and Civil War items. Among the treasures on display are personal items from Lincoln, such as letters and a pair of his cufflinks. Among the thousands of books and manuscripts in the library pertaining to Lincoln and the war are more than 20 documents personally signed by the president. An interesting display features information on how the penny was made and how Lincoln's appropriate likeness was chosen for the coin. Mary Todd Lincoln is represented there, too. There is a Civil War collection well worth seeing including: uniforms, medical instruments, letters written by soldiers, canteens, playing cards and hard tack (a food item eaten by soldiers). There is a display of ammunition, swords, handguns, muskets, rifles and carbines. Also of interest are the first cannonball fired at Fort Sumter and the 9<sup>th</sup> Infantry drum used in the Battle of Gettysburg. Admission is free.

Part 3. Performance of "Cinderella" at the Redlands Bowl in the evening. The bowl is an outdoor theater and there are no reserved seats, so the plan is to purchase our own individual dinners and picnic in the theater. Admission is free.

**Part 4**. Those who want to drive back after the performance .... Drive carefully. Or stay overnight in Redlands



### Preparing for the inevitable



My message this month is not on a technical subject, but one that I think is important. An article "Preparing for the Inevitable", written by Dave Graham, Associate Editor of "V8 Times" magazine, appeared in their March/April issue. I thought it was worth sharing.

The average age of a V-8 Club member is seventy-four years. I have experienced the loss of several good friends, not only in our regional group but others as well. I would like to offer some advice and common sense responsibilities, not only to you but to your spouse as well.

We all seem to have too many cars, parts, literature, signs and collectibles. You need to make some provisions for disposal of these items in case of an untimely death or illness. A sudden heart attack or stroke can happen without warning, cancer may give you some time to plan but do not be too sure.

I am not an attorney and I am only offering suggestions. Every person has a different idea or desire and we all expect to live forever. The thought of our demise is something that is not easy to talk about, but do not ignore it. I think the most important thing you could do is create a "Living Trust" for your family's wealth, even if it is small. If something happens to you or your spouse, your assets simply are passed on to them. This avoids probate and taxes, and is simple to execute.

I highly recommend the services of an attorney to set up the "trust" so it is correct, legal and complete. My attorney charged me \$1,200.00 for this service and you can always change it. review it or even cancel it at any time. The attorney will sit down with you and discuss, at length, how you would like to handle your estate. He will compose the documents, review it with you and finalize the trust. We chose to have the attorney keep the original "trust" in his file so it does not get lost or altered. Make sure the family members are aware of the documents and who has them.

We chose to have our attorney be the executor of our estate. This will eliminate any fighting or bad feelings among our heirs. It might cost the estate a little more, but it would be just and fair to all. You have the assurance that everything will be handled in a fair and timely manner.

Even though you have a "family trust" in place, a "will" is also an important document to prepare as soon as possible. We have a hand written "will" that was reviewed by our attorney to make sure it was written correctly. It is a .good idea to store the "will" with the attorney as well. Anyone could easily throw it away if they did not agree with your wishes. You can always put a clause in the "will" that states "if anyone disagrees with your wishes or tries to change it. they are eliminated completely." That will keep them quiet!

I put all the "car titles" together in one place and signed them without dating anything. It is best to have the actual correct signature, even though it maybe sold later on. I have friends that make a list of the value of their cars and update them every year or so. Not a bad idea to list the name and phone numbers of interested buyers, if there are any. I have witnessed first hand, some of the vulture types that try and buy cars from the estate even before the funeral!

I believe the best advice is to wait six months or more before you sell anything. That gives everyone time to grieve, get your emotions under control and make a sound decision what to sell and for how much. You might consider selling some of the overflow of cars, parts and memorabilia soon. Your grandchildren or great grandchildren could certainly use college money and you would be doing more for them at this stage of life than later on. How many cars can you drive at one time? It is fun to show off your collections, but think of your spouse, heirs and needs of your family.

Perhaps you may consider "willing" cars, parts, or literature to the Early Ford V-8 Foundation and Museum. Your donations will be acknowledged for years to come in your name.

Talk to your spouse and your family about what your wishes are. Do not leave a burden for others or issues to fight over later. Money spent on an attorney or accountant now is money well spent, and will save money, anger, and grief after you are gone.

My thoughts and suggestions are my own and they are free. Only you can prepare for the future, do not put it off!
