



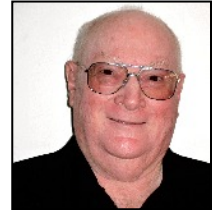

There were many activities to participate in, ranging from silent movies, tour of the Homestead house, banjo contest, bands, fashion show, dancing and dance lessons.

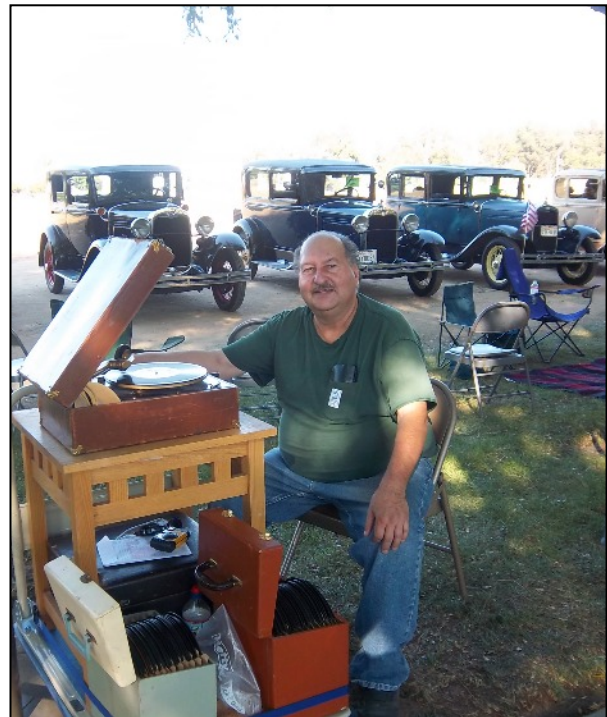
There were many vendors this year selling twenties clothing and jewelry. Our own Jim Constantian

Model A Ford Museum Update

Below is a letter from Jerry Morrissey, a MAFFI Trustee, which is an update on the progress of the new Model A museum under construction at the Gilmore museum facility in Michigan.



The Summer is flying by and so is the progress on the Museum. It is hard to believe that we are already in mid-August. The dedication of the building is approaching fast. I hope to see most of you there. All of your hard work in planning and raising money and promoting the hobby is becoming a reality.



Cornerstone Construction is working hard to stay on schedule with the building. Most of the glass is now installed for the front of the building. They are starting to power wash the brick. The tile work on the floor is moving along nicely, but it is a big job! They had 2 weeks in the schedule to lay the tile. Gilmore personnel will seal the tile floor after the tile contractor finishes his work. This will also take two weeks so we are on schedule; but it will be tight for the drive through photos on Sept. 15th. The back wall is complete except for the cap on the roof and touch up painting. The electricians have put in the maintenance fluorescent lighting and the theater lights and were finishing outlets yesterday. The first order of bricks for the walkway has arrived!

I know many of you are watching the progress on the Webcam and over the next month there is going to be a lot of activity right up front. They are finishing off the canopy. Then the drainage trench will be dug across the front of the building and curb basins will be installed. The road will be widened and a sidewalk will be installed across the front of the building. Lastly, paving for our drive will take place and the brick walk will be installed. It is going to be a busy month. Have fun watching and continue to support the effort any way you can.



MODEL A ENGINE FAN AIRFLOW

The following information was taken, in part, from the Model A Times magazine.

There has been a lot of discussion about which is the best fan to keep that Model A temperature the coolest. Is the original 2-blade metal fan, the later 4-blade metal fan, or the after market 6-blade plastic fan the best?

For the tests, a sophisticated instrument was used to measure the air speed in MPH at three different engine RPM's. The results are not scientific, but do give a good indication of which fan produces the most air flow? The test were performed on a stationary vehicle.

The following tests indicated the fan air flow MPH speeds with engine speeds of 500 RPM, 1,000 RPM, and 1,500 RPM. The measurements were taken at the front right corner of the engine block.

Engine	@ 500 RPM (25 mph ground speed)	@ 1,000 RPM (12 mph ground speed)	@ 1,500 RPM (37 mph ground speed)
Fan	Air Flow	Air Flow	Air Flow
2 - blade	7 mph	18 mph	25 mph
4 - blade	11 mph	24 mph	32 mph
6 - blade	8 mph	22 mph	34 mph

The above Air Flow test results indicate:

1. The 2-bladed fan produces less air flow than either the 4-bladed or 6-bladed fan.
2. The 4-bladed fan produces the most air flow up to 1,000 rpm.
3. The 6-bladed fan produces the most air flow at 1,500 rpm and higher.

Summary: The 2-blade fan should be adequate if the cooling system is up to par. If not, more fan blades might be needed. A car's higher speed will increase air flow through the radiator, but also increase engine heat. Remember, a good clean radiator, correct coolant and tight fan belt are essential to good Model A cooling.


