By-Law vote scheduled for January meeting

Every member of the Santa Anita A's was mailed a copy of the proposed changes to our club bylaws. The proposed changes have been approved by the SAA Board of Directors. The process of changing by-laws requires that the proposed changes be presented to members in writing and that a two-thirds vote for approval be obtained at a club meeting.

As stated in the letter you received, there are two significant changes which affect the manner in which we operate our club.

 The "operating year" of the club will be changed to a calendar year beginning January 1, ending on December 31.
 The dues amount for new members for the first year will be prorated by the month they join.

The Board requests your vote of approval of these changes.



The Kellogg house was built at a cost of \$150,000.

After lunch, we will attend the horse show which starts at 2:00 PM. If time permits, after lunch we will stop at the Farm Store.

Comparing cars to Computers

BATTERY TECH TIP

This article is thanks to Randy Rundle of Fifth Avenue Antique Auto Parts.

Vaseline (Fig 1), also known as petroleum jelly, works well to keep battery posts free of corrosion. After you have cleaned the posts and the cable ends using a battery terminal cleaner tool (fig.2). NO — it's not a Charlie Brown Christmas tree, reinstall the cables.



Next put a light coating of Vaseline on top and around the cable clamps. The Vaseline will keep the terminals free of corrosion insuring a positive start every time. Better yet, you can upgrade to a sealed type battery like the Optima Brand of Batteries. There will be no water to add and no posts to clean. Sealed batteries also eliminate the chance of spilling acid, and damaging the car's paint.





Caution! DO NOT use dielectric electrical grease to keep battery posts (fig.3) free of corrosion, as dielectric grease is an insulator and has a low melting point. When dielectric grease melts (caused by the heat generated

as the current passes thru the posts) it changes into a liquid form and runs down between the battery post and the cable clamp. All will be well, until you shut off the engine and everything cools down.

When you go back to restart your car the battery will appear to be dead. In reality the current from the battery is not being allowed to pass thru to the battery cables. To correct the problem remove and clean both the cable ends and the battery posts with emery paper or a battery terminal cleaner tool and reinstall. That should restore your battery connection. Notice how dirty this battery is in fig 3. Next month I will cover some methods of keeping your battery clean and how to prevent battery problems.
