2017 F.A.S.T. Hill Climb in Murrieta, CA

With the threat of rain forecast, participation in the 2017 hill climb was down from last year. However, it turned out to be a perfectly beautiful, comfortable day and those who decided not to go really missed out on a fun time. There were only 16 cars so it gave everyone plenty of time to make as many runs as they wanted. We registered over 150



spectators which was good even though it was down from last year's 200.

The "King of the Hill" was Wesley Eisenga from Ripon, CA with an ET (elapse time) of 8.478/speed of 74.08mph and right behind him was

Denny Sprecher from Utah with an ET of 8.566/speed of 72.93mph. These two "boys" were neck and neck for the winning slot! Art was right behind them with an ET of 8.613/speed of 71.27. Olive was way down the line this year with an ET of 9.119/speed of 68.40. And believe it or not, there was a souped-up Model T that ran an ET of 8.604/speed of 66.86. Needless to say he was ecstatic about beating a Model B engine!

For those of you who have never experienced a 4 banger hill climb, mark your calendar for the 1st weekend in November 2018 for the next one. The course is 1/10 of a mile length where the cars

run one at a time from a dead stop, using timing lights to measure the elapse time and the speed. Each car must have a 4 cylinder engine block (Model T through 1934) using only pump gas. There are many modifications allowed which determines your racing category. There's everything from Model T's, stock Model A's, vintage speedsters, etc. Fun for all!

This article written by club member Doug Nielsen appeared in the March 2002 issue of Spoken Wheels. It is a story about the restoration of a very rare Model A by Gordon Johnson. Gordon who died in September of 2017 was one of the founders of the Santa Anita A's.

Gordon & Helen Johnson's 1931 Model 130B, Drop Floor Deluxe Delivery


This rare Model A truck was just a basket case in 1969 when Gordon acquired it in a deal made with his brother, Gail. In trade for this vehicle, Gordon's part of the deal was to build a double garage with a second story for Gail.

The garage structure was completed as agreed and Gordon finally took home his long term project. The owner prior to Gail was his wife's uncle who had barely started restoration, working just a little now and then. He threw away the most unusual part, the drop floor, believing it to be only an extra part! Gail had done some work on the truck and had taken the body off the frame to have it sand blasted and a primer coat applied. All the parts were in boxes and crates and none, including the frame, had been painted.

Gordon started restoration in 1971, but unfortunately his first wife became ill and all work stopped on the project during the time of her illness to the time of her passing in 1973. Later on he met and married Helen and they decided to remodel one home and then decided to build a new home with a six car garage.

In 1986, restoration was started on Gordon's 1931 A Pickup and this necessitated attending many Model A swap meets for parts along with continuing his research on the Deluxe Delivery. It was a busy time with the two restoration projects going on at the same time. Actual manual labor started on the Delivery in 1991, while Gordon was still working on the Pickup which was completed in 1995.

There were only 77 Model 130B Drop Floor Deluxe Deliveries made in 1931! Compare that production with the much touted Town Car with a total production of 1,198 units and the Town Car Delivery with 196 units produced. Perhaps one reason for the 130B Drop Floor Model A not being recognized as being so rare is the fact that the standard floor and drop floor Deluxe Deliveries have the same model number of 130B. Production of the drop floor model did not start until May, 1931. Most likely many of the production figures combined the standard and drop floor models even though the configuration of the body, floor, rear door, and tail light placement were very different on the two versions of the 130B. Having a combined U. S. production of 14,550 units hid the fact that only a very few drop floor units were produced late during the final phase of Model A production. How many of these A's have you seen? You could probably count all the remaining units on the road on the fingers of one hand. The drop floor A's were produced especially for those businesses



that needed easier cargo loading. Customers included laundries, dry cleaners, office machines and tobacco companies.

The floor behind the two front seats drops down one foot behind the rear axle and extends to the back door of the vehicle. There is a small rectangular door across the lower part at the back which closes off the bottom space and drops down for easier entry. Ford also produced the Panel Delivery in 1931 with the drop floor which was introduced much earlier and had total production of over 1,900 units. That model, identified by its two rear doors and about a ten inch higher profile most likely was opted for by many customers because of its larger cargo capacity. On the Panel Delivery, the model number for the drop floor was changed from 79B to 225A.

The first obstacle was to find a really good metal man who could build the drop floor that was tossed out by a previous owner. A friend recommended someone called the "Bird Man" who turned out to be at artist in metal work.


In turn, the next step was to locate someone else with the exact model vehicle. Luckily, Gordon just happened to spot fully restored one in November, 1986 in Escondido when the Santa Anita A's toured there for a multi-club Model A event. The owner

> of the A, Dave Maier, was approached and he gladly told them about the truck which he had professionally restored. Dave said that when he acquired that A it had the top half of the body cut off. He was able to locate an Minor top from an out-of-state source and was able to have it welded on his unit. It was a beautiful restoration. Dave gave permission to take photos and measurements of his authentic drop floor so specifications and plans could be drawn by Gordon for the metal work.

After eleven months, the expert metal man finally finished the drop floor metal part and it was installed. It was a perfect fit to the existing original wood frame which was in excellent condition. All the bolt holes matched up just right with the original holes in the drop floor framework.

One small but important part missing was the rear our handle. It is different from any other A handle. It was a T shaped handle with no locking device and took Gordon twenty years of

searching until he happened on to one at a swap meet. Using the originals as patterns, the interior was totally replaced, including the oak wood floor, masonite lining panels, headliner and side panels were all reproduced. Gordon did most all the restoration himself except for the metal work and feels that this A has been restored back to original as much as humanly possible.



In 1999 for its first time out after completion, it was driven to the Temple City Collectors Car Show where it won the Collectors' Choice trophy. It will be entered in the Blue Ribbon Class at the 2002 Riverside MAFCA National Convention in Riverside.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT BY BOB HARBICHT

I'm running out of new members to profile, so I thought I'd profile an older member. Only I hesitate to use the word "older" because it has other, negative connotations. Let's just call them long-term members of the Santa Anita A's.

Bob And Judi Moore

Bob and Judi started life in Long Island, New York and that's where they met and married. A few years after their marriage they came to California, with a stop off in Pennsylvania for a couple years.



They lived 36 years in Arcadia. Looking for a bigger piece of property to indulge Bob's Model A hobby and a singlestory home, they moved to their current home in Bradbury about 16 years ago.

And indulge his hobby they did! Bob currently owns seven (count 'em, 7) Model A's. And he has about a 2,000 square-foot building to work on them and house them in. Bob worked in human resources, spending time in labor relations, benefits, etc. When he retired about 20 years ago he went to work for his son's computer software firm, helping with sales, etc. Judi worked with Mary Kay for about 20 years, retiring six months ago.

They have been very active in the Santa Anita A's. Bob has served as our President twice, was Tour Director for seven or eight years, and has spent many years on the Board of Directors.

Judi enjoys weaving and knitting. In addition to keeping his fleet of A's running, Bob enjoys gardening. He is President-Elect of the Pasadena Civitan Club. Bob & Judi have two children and two grandchildren.

SEE AND BE SEEN

When driving your Model A, it is very important not only to see where you are going but also to have other drivers easily see you. During day light hours, you may think other drivers will easily see your car but that is not always the case. This is especially true when a "civilian" car is following closely behind you. The original left hand single tail light assembly on a Model A is minimal at best and often other drivers do not recognize that we are slowing down. Most of us have installed a second tail light assembly on the right rear of their car. This certainly helps but the original stop light bulbs were not very bright and some drivers following our cars do not see our stop lights when we are slowing for a turn or a stop.

To help others better see that we are turning or stopping, some owners have converted their stop and tail lights to LED assemblies which are much brighter than what Henry provided. These are available from the major parts suppliers at a reasonable cost and are a major improvement to the rear lights on our cars. The LED assemblies that replace both the bulb and tail light lens are the brightest and most effective. To improve the situation even more, the "Brakelighter" LED brake light assembly is available that can be easily installed in the rear window. This third brake light can be wired thru your turn signal assembly so it will activate when both slowing and when making a turn. This third brake light is very effective and is easily seen by those drivers who are following you.



Another improvement is the addition of additional tail light assemblies and also red reflectors. Reflectors are very effective when driving at night.

The headlights on our Model A's as they came from the factory with 32/32 CP (Candle Power) bulbs are adequate at best for normal around-the-town driving at night. For touring, you may want to consider installing brighter 50/32 CP bulbs. If you have good reflectors with the bulbs properly focused

and the headlights correctly adjusted, the headlights on a Model A are not too bad.

Most suppliers also offer Quarts Halogen Bulb conversions that are much brighter than incandescent bulbs but they require a higher output charging system and they also get very hot. Owners have had problems with the sockets and connections in the headlight assembly overheating and melting when using Halogen Bulbs.

Be sure you can see where you are going and also those following can see you and easily recognize when you are slowing or stopping.

Tech Tip Make Good Connections

For the electrical system in your Model A to work best be sure all the connections are clean and dry. Corrosion can build up at connection points and add resistance to the electrical system. This includes every connection, not only those connections with screw terminals but also the connections that snap together and even the connections of the light bulbs in their sockets.

A small stainless steel wire brush used for "TIG Welding" is very useful for cleaning connections. These are about the size of a big tooth brush and are available at welding shops and most hardware stores.

After the components that are being connected are clean use a little silicone dielectric grease to eliminate future corrosion. Sometimes you will only find "Spark Plug Boot Silicone Grease" which is the same thing.
