William S. Hart Museum Tour

When we think of famous cowboys, names such as Gene Autry, Hopalong Cassidy and Tom Mix come to mind. You may add William S. Hart's name to that list as well. We will learn all about the man as we travel to his Horseshoe Ranch in Newhall on Saturday, February 17th.

Staring in over 70 films during the silent era from 1914-25, Hart became one of the most popular and successful actors in the world, on par with Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks. After retiring from the movies in 1925 he built a 10,000-square-foot, Spanish Colonial Revival mansion on a hilltop. It is now a museum containing his original furnishings from the period.


Brad's Farewell Address May, 1978

It seems like it was only a month or two ago that we started our chapter. I can remember talking to Reese King in Yuma in 1975 about the possibility of his being a charter member. And then there were others who came to help: Marlin Perry, Tom Wellnitz, Erv Sly, Doc Kleckner, Gene Reinhardt, Gordon Johnson, and Erin Wirtz. With these people, on May 23, 1975, we met and drew up a document to petition the National for recognition as a chapter,

I remember how difficult it was to select a name. There were suggestions like "Baldwin's Lucky A'S and Henry Ford's A's. There was even the suggestion of naming our club "The Brass Nuts of Arcadia". I've still got that T-shirt in my closet that has "The Brass Nuts of Arcadia" silk screened on the back of it. We finally agreed that the club should be called "The Santa Anita A's" and the first club crisis was over.

Our first election was very basic. After the officers were elected, (more like injected) the first five hands up were chosen to make up the Board of Directors. Those who didn't get their hands up fast enough ended up with jobs like Tour Director, Raffle Chairman, and Hostess. Our first paper was called "The Bulletin" and Marlin and Elaine Perry were the club's first editors.

We got better organized and started to grow. We all got out and brought in new-members.



time that if you were a board member and didn't bring in at least one member each month you would get one of the windows in your A broken. We got a lot of members. There were no broken windows.

We finally got enough members to need jackets and patches so that we could be identified as a group; another crisis. After much discussion we decided on the gold jackets we have now. The next problem came in trying to get them from Penney's. They never did have enough of the small size. The club patch was designed by Tom Grabowski. We shopped around until we found someone who could produce the patch at a price we could afford. One interesting note is that on the original design by Tom, the patch had a peacock on top of the car because the bird is the symbol of Arcadia. The club felt the bird looked too much like a turkey so it had to go. The patch was finalized and we had the best looking emblem in the area thanks to Tom.

We supported the club by individual donations during the first months of operation. Tom and Claudia Wellnitz donated the money for



the club's post office box for the first year. Boy, it was hard to get a post office box in Arcadia. I donated the club's gavel. Marlin financed the first issues of the Bulletin. We had an auction to raise money where we all donated parts and then bought them back! I remember Reese King buying over \$150 worth of parts. Then there were the weddings and football games. One of our sayings at that time was "We do weddings ...or marry her and we'll deliver".

Little by little our treasury grew. We had raffles, and we had raffles. Eleanor Lasecki made a beautiful Bi-centennial Afghan and donated it to the club to raffle off. Of course when the lucky ticket was drawn she'd won her own afghan, Pat and I were very proud when she presented it to us. The original dues paid by the members were placed in a savings account and have been there ever since.

The original Tour Directors were Marlin Perry and Tom Grabowski. One of our first big tours was to Solvang. I broke down about three times. If it hadn't been for Herb Cuckler I would still be in Solvang. It seemed that during our first year as a club I had a lot of trouble with my car. During our first year we were incorporated as a non-profit organization, established by-laws, and did what every newly formed Model A club has to do which included filing Income Tax statements.

The second year of our club was as productive as the first. With the new officers leading the club, new ideas and promotions helped generate interest in our young club. It was at this time that the club had a contest to change the name of our paper. The prize was \$25 or a skate board. Jim Graham was the winner with our present name, "Spoken Wheels" It was during this time that several articles of the bylaws were changed because of the club's growth.

In August of 1976, we ran a concession stand at the George Cross/ Roger Wilson Swap Meet. Marlin Perry was in charge of the concession stand which netted the club a bundle. During our second year of operation Erv Sly was the Editor of the Spoken Wheels and each month he gave us his "Forty Honks". Our Tour Director for that year was Doc Kleckner. We had joint tours with Pomona and Diamond Tread, Bi-centennial Tours and Progressive Dinners. My favorite was the tour to Capistrano. Besides not breaking down, I enjoyed the peaceful and easygoing tour that it was.

Too soon the second year of our club was over. With the beginning of our third year, I became president again. Like every newly elected officer, I had high goals and a lot of dreams. Among some of my goals that never got off the ground was the idea of having the 1980 National Meet in Pasadena. However we did get a Southern California Regional together and we do have a calendar of events of all chapters' events for the rest of the year.

A difference of opinion that started in our second year caused a minor split in the club. This split caused a crisis early in the third year, with the efforts of the Board of Directors and concerned members, it was resolved. However, as a result of this, two board members became inactive. It was through the

> efforts of the membership and the Board of Directors that we pulled together, the split was healed, and the club was even stronger than before.



The club gained financially, but more important than money, our club worked as a team to put on a well organizes event.

In reflection, it is you, the membership that has made our chapter the great chapter it is. You are the ones that have participated in our events and have represented our club in other club's events. I am fortunate to have had an important part in the club and have had many good memories because of it. I am proud to have been your president and to each of you, my thanks for your help and support which you have given me.

Bob & Joyce Travis

Because the first month of Bob Travis' latest term as our President is coming up, I thought the time was right to profile him and Joyce. This will be the fifth time for Bob as our President. The rumor that he has to keep doing it



until he gets it right is vastly overstated! Bob has served on the Board many, many years and has been our auctioneer for at least ten years.

Bob was born in MacDougall, New York and Joyce in San Jose, California. So how did two people from the left and right coasts meet? Exactly where you would expect, Germany. Bob was stationed in Germany with the U.S. Army and Joyce was a government employee teaching American kids there. They were to marry and have their first of three daughters in Germany.

But being in the Army means they never stayed in one place too long. They moved 21 times during Bob's 30-year Army career. Hard to hit a moving target, right Bob?

When Bob Retired from the Army as a full Colonel in 1982 (After "30 years, 3 months and 3 days"), he took a job with a defense contractor in Norwalk, Connecticut. Three years later he was offered a job in California. He was so excited with the offer that he told them, "No way in hell was he living in L.A." But they made him an offer he couldn't refuse, so he and Joyce decamped for their first home in Arcadia.

They lived on Woodacre Lane for 15 years. The only problem was that Bob didn't have adequate room to store his growing fleet of Model A's. So, about 17 years ago they bought their current home on Third Avenue. It had a guest house which - once the front was torn off - served nicely as a Model A garage and work area.

Bob's first Model A was acquired in 1951 for \$25 and was his daily driver in high school. He no longer has that car, but still has the second he acquired: a Fordor Sedan he bought for \$400. He currently has four Model A's and he "isn't looking for any more" (that's what they all say).

They have been members of the Santa Anita A's for 21 years and members of MAFCA for 53 years!

Joyce enjoys knitting, her PEO Club, and has been a volunteer at the Arboretum for 32 years. Bob has also been an Arboretum volunteer, but "only" for 20 years.

This should be another great year for our club with Bob at the helm.

ERA FASHIONS

In 1907 a man by the name of Leo Baekeland, a chemist by trade, and already an inventor of exceptional repute, having invented Velox photographic paper, did it again! He invented a material he called Bakelite after himself of course. He had gone and created the first synthetic plastic. This discovery and invention of Leo's marked the introduction of the Polymer Age. The new material was known as the material of a thousand uses. At first the substance was to be used in many industries. Due to its unique chemical attributes it was particularly suitable for the electrical and automobile industries. It was used to make telephone parts, electrical devices like bases and sockets for light bulbs and other electrical items. It was even used in making the outside of radios which are highly sought after collectibles and are now quite expensive. The radios are mostly designed in the Art Deco style and have sleek long lines making them especially attractive. They also came in many amazingly cool colors!

The Art Deco style began in 1909, the year Baekeland announced his new invention to the world. Jewelers and fashion designers recognized potential in the addition of affordable new bright pieces to complement some of the incoming fashions of the day. When designers such as Coco Chanel and Elsa Schiaparelli started wearing the



Bakelite Jewelry pieces themselves and being shown in fashion magazines such as Vogue, the women wanted to buy them for themselves. The Art Deco period lasted well into the nineteen forties.

The Jewelry was popular for many reasons. It was light weight and came in many bright and bold colors. The Art Deco designs were modern. They stood out well and were very becoming on the ladies. They were sturdy and light weight. Many women bought popular sets with necklaces, and matching rings, bracelets and accompanying earrings. These sets were reasonably priced and very attractive. Today the heavily carved bracelets are the most sought after items. The material made all sorts of other Jewelry designs like dress clips, belt buckles for dresses, and even buttons.

Bakelite went out of style during the late forties and were resurrected during the 1980's. A resurgence has been in the making for the past twenty years or so. It now sells for a high price compared to when it was first created. Most women could afford a few pieces of the Jewelry back then. It has gone up in price dramatically in past years and is quite collectible. It was very popular during our period of the Model A era. When searching for appropriate pieces try to find Art Deco styles such as the ones that look streamlined as the look is the most authentic. When collecting keep in mind that red, black and clear "apple juice" are the most popular and valuable colors. Apple juice is lightly amber in color and is clear. It's a fun hobby collecting Bakelite, and I am afraid, highly addictive! Happy hunting.

The Model A electrical System

The electrical system of your Model A Ford as designed is very simple and reliable however electrical system problems contribute most to the reasons our cars will not start or run. The first of our Model A's were assembled ninety years ago and today we still find some cars with original wiring or other electrical components. If your Model A has old deteriorated wiring, replace it with good quality wiring available from the better parts suppliers.

The battery is heart of the electrical system and having a good fully charged battery is necessary for reliable starting the engine and operating the ignition system, lights and horn. Today, we can purchase original type "Lead Acid" wet cell batteries as well as Optma Batteries with Spiralcell technology. The Optma battery will not discharge over time and will last 2-3 times longer than a lead acid battery. Whichever type of battery you use, it is still necessary to be sure the battery is well secured and the cables are in good condition with clean tight connections. A master battery cut off switch is recommended when storing your Model A and you will also find this very useful when performing repairs and maintenance.

A charging system in good working order is necessary to keep the battery fully charged. If you are using the original 3 brush type generator, refer to the Model A Instruction Book (Owner's Manual) for the proper adjustment of the generator output for your type of driving. Aftermarket regulators are available for the original Model A generator which will automatically adjust the output of the generator to keep the battery fully charged. Alternators with built in regulators are also available for those who want a more modern charging system. Alternators with up to a 30 amp output will work fine with the stock Model A electrical system but the use of a higher output alternator will require other modifications.

The original Model A ignition system in good condition will perform well for most owners. Most ignition system problems encountered involve the distributor. Distributors that are worn out or the use of poor quality components are responsible for most of these problems. Good electrical components and new or rebuilt distributors are available from the better parts suppliers. Beware of all electrical components made in China as they usually are very poor quality and subject to failure.

The best way to keep your Model A running well is to first perform the necessary repairs to get the electrical system in good condition and then drive your Model A often.







Tech Tip

When replacing a 6 volt battery in your Model A, be aware of the correct polarity of the electrical system. All original Model A Ford electrical systems are <u>POSITIVE GROUND</u>, most other cars are Negative Ground. When installing a new battery, attach the "Hot" cable first and the "Ground" cable last. First, connect the "Hot" battery cable, the one that goes to the starter switch, to the smaller Negative (-) post of the battery and then connect the "Ground" cable, the one that goes to the frame, to the larger Positive (+) post of the battery. Installing the battery with the polarity reversed will cause the charging system not to work and may damage some components of the electrical system.

Beware of charging systems that have been modified or converted to 12 volts. Some modified 6 volt systems and most 12 volt systems are Negative Ground.
