MEMBER SPOTLIGHT BY BOB HARBICHT

Chuck Davies

I wrote about Chuck a little over two years ago when he was a new member of our club. At that time, he owned a '29 Model A Tudor. But he's really been bitten by the Model A bug. He now owns a '30 Cabriolet, a '31 Fordor sedan, a '31 Pickup and



recently acquired the '30 Fordor sedan from Sue Chandler that her husband John Chandler had restored to like-new condition. Chuck says he never thought he would fall in love with a car, but he is in love with this one.

Asking him where he kept all those cars led into a fascinating discussion of his business ventures. A couple of years after coming to California, Chuck went into stereo and sound sales and eventually opened his own store. A couple of years later (in 1985) he opened a "Disc Jockey" department, selling equipment to DJs who entertained at parties and weddings. This led to supplying lighting to the disc jockeys and eventually retailers who sold lights for the entertainment industry.

Unfortunately, most of the lighting available was poor quality, meaning it had to be repaired when it came into this country. A fruitless search for good lighting led him to toddle off to Asia in search of a light manufacturer who could produce quality equipment. He has now made over 100 trips to Asia and another 50 to Europe to work with manufacturers of the lighting he imports. He now has four warehouses for his lighting business: two in Southern California, one in Mexico and one in Europe.

Back in about 1985 Chuck hired a 17-year-old DJ to help in his store. That kid is now running the show for him. Chuck is retired but still shows up at the warehouse because "that's where my cars are." He used to keep them inside the warehouse, but expansion of the business forced him outside. So, he stores them in 20-foot shipping containers in the parking lot. The first couple of containers he bought were used and cost about \$2,000. Then he found he could buy new containers for only about \$3,100. Well, they've been used once. It turns out that - because of the US trade imbalance – there are more shipping containers coming into this country than going out. So, you can make a pretty good deal on a once-used shipping container because the shipper avoids the cost of shipping it back empty. So now there is a row of shipping containers in the parking lot, filled with Model A's (and one 1931 Pierce Arrow).

John and Sue Chandler's 1931 Deluxe Roadster Named Jezibel - Part 2 by Doug Nielsen

This is Part 2 of a story about the history of Sue and John Chandler's 1931 Deluxe Roadster was written by club member Doug Neilsen and was first published in the January 2002 issue of the Spoken Wheels. It is an interesting story in that it documents the history of his car "Jezibel" beginning in 1951. John was involved with the formation of MAFCA in 1956. John died in 2017. His wife., Sue, is still active in the SAA's and has given Jezibel to their daughter..

In June 1962 Jezibel went to the MAFCA National Restoration Meet in San Francisco. As you can see from the photo, a sharp car will attract the pretty girls. As John W. displays the car, it gets eyed by a young lady. The results of that meet are not known, but it is a good bet that it did well. Shortly thereafter the car was featured by Motor Trend magazine and appeared in the August 1962 issue and was on its cover. The 40 hp Model A was put through many of the same tests as the chrome and vinyl behemoths of that time. In the zero to sixty miles per hour timed test it was noted that the car topped out at 58 mph. The overall results concluded that the car performed as Ford had intended and had provided a substantial product for a very modest cost. The sheer reliability and ease of maintenance made it the most popular collector car in the country.



John says,"I kept track of the car and John Wedberg for years. In 1988 I called him and asked if he would be interested in selling the car. He said no, as he had done so

many times in the past, but this time he did mention that he would like to have a restored 1934 Ford Cabriolet and if I could find one he would buy it, then sell Jezibel to me. I heard that Gene Valdez at Ford Parts Obsolete in Long Beach (a very popular Ford Parts dealer similar to C. W. Moss in Orange) had retired and owned a restored 1934 Cabriolet. I called him and to my surprise he wanted to sell!" A few phone calls later a three way deal was arranged and Valdez sold the 1934 Ford to John Wedberg. .John Chandler purchased the elusive Jezibel and all three men were happy with the transaction.

Most Deluxe Roadsters on the road today have one or two fender mounted spare tires, but the original 1931 Deluxe Roadster returned to an earlier style and was produced with the rear mounted spare tire rather than a fender mount. Many felt that presentation gave a sporty appearance heightened by simple lines. Jezibel remains as Ford designed and built her.


A-400 was featured on page 84 and the Model 160-B Slant Windshield Fordor on page 244 of Henry's Lady by Ray Miller.

Make-up and hair styles from the 20's

Make-up such as bright lipstick, colorful eye shadow and smoky mascara were introduced in the 1910's, but the new cosmetics became more widely available in the 20's and offered women another means of bold expression. Every department store and pharmacy were now offering a special makeup counter dedicated to this new exciting and popular idea.



Clara Bow, a very famous silent movie star, was influential in defining the new look that became all the rage. If we think back to a young woman of the 1960s, an English girl known as Twiggy, we are able to better understand the impact of Clara Bow. She was also known as the "It Girl". FROM THE BENCH BY CHRIS WICKERSHAM

DRIVING WITH A TACHOMETER

Most of us have been driving Model A Fords for many years and I am sure we all know how much throttle to use and when to shift gears for the best overall performance and reliability of our cars. Just before the Lost Coast Tour in 2016, I installed a tachometer in the Tudor I use for touring. I mostly just wanted to have one more instrument to watch while driving down the road but I was also interested in knowing if I was operating the engine within the RPM range that I felt was best for overall performance, economy and reliability. With over 65 years driving all sorts of vehicles and with tens of thousands of miles driving Model A Fords, I was sure there was actually very little I could learn from driving with a tachometer.

Off we go on the Lost Coast Tour with the route taking us up Angeles Crest Highway and on to our first stop in Lancaster. With a lot of mountain driving, I soon found out that if I watched the tach, I could more easily know when to up shift or down shift and when it would be advantageous to use the Mitchell Overdrive as a gear splitter, running in second/overdrive as opposed to just second or third gear etc. I was having fun choosing the proper gear and I felt overall that the engine was under less stress.

After our stop in Lancaster, we started north on Sierra Highway and then turned west on Backus Road to pick up Tehachapi Willow Springs Road which would take us on to Tehachapi and our lunch stop. Backus Road is mostly straight with no obvious hills as the desert in this area appears to be flat. As we started west on Backus Road, I was driving along at about 50 MPH in overdrive. Even though it appeared we were driving on lever ground, the road was actually going slightly uphill and I soon found I had to use full throttle just to maintain speed. I slowed a bit, shifted the Mitchell into direct and continued on at about 45 mph. I continued to drive along watching the Model A's in front of me and not paying attention to the tachometer. After a few more miles, I once again was at full throttle and my speed had dropped to less than 40 MPH. The tach was now indicating 1500 RPM. I immediately down shifted to second and put the Mitchell into overdrive. I had not been watching the tach and did not realize the incline of the road had increased and we were also driving right into a very strong headwind. I quickly learned I needed to pay closer attention to the tachometer.

The best operating range for a Model A engine is between about 1750 and 2300 RPM. With continuous highway driving, a good range of RPM is somewhere between 1900 and 2100. Continuous running at full throttle below 1750 RPM is hard on a Model A engine. The crank bearings are very heavily loaded and the crankshaft itself is under a lot of stress. The oil pump is turning a bit slower so there is less oil available for lubricating the engine and the cooling system has to work harder than necessary.

Over revving is equally hard on the Model A engine. With the long stroke, piston speeds become very high causing increased wear on the pistons and bores, the rods are more prone to failure at high engine speeds and the engine in general is overworking itself.

If you limit the engine speed to no more than 2300 for up-shifts and no less than 1750 for down-shifts and cruise in the 1900-2100 RPM range, you will find your engine is working a lot less and will last longer. You may also find your fuel economy has improved. One thing you should always remember is, DO NOT LUG THE ENGINE. Do not continuously run your Model A at full throttle with engine speeds less than 1750 RPM.

A tachometer is not only fun to watch but is a very useful tool to help you operate your Model A at more optimum engine speeds.

TECH TIP

There are several tachometers available for your Model A. However, one I like to recommend is the Tiny-Tach, an economical, easy to install, small self contained digital combination tachometer and hour meter. The Tiny-Tach is small enough so it can be mounted to the dash using two sided foam tape or you can easily make a bracket that would mount under one of the dash screws. Tiny-Tach has its own internal battery supply so it does not require any hook up to your Model A's electrical system. There are only 2 wires to deal with, a ground wire and a signal wire that just wraps around the ignition coil wire. Tiny-Tachs have a battery life of about seven years but the battery is not replicable so the whole unit must be replaced. The hour meter function is handy when keeping maintenance records. I have a Tiny-Tach installed in both of my Model A's.

Tiny-tacks are available for \$48.00 plus shipping by ordering on line from <u>www.tinytach.com</u>. Order a tachometer for a <u>"Gasoline</u> <u>Engine"</u> and at the bottom of the shipping address page in the Check-Out procedure, in the "Special



<u>Requests</u>" box, type in "Model A Ford, 1931, 4 cylinder, coil wire signal, 2 sparks per engine revolution".





