Annual Club Raffle





John Wayne, Roy Rogers and Gene Autry are famous movie cowboys but the man that proceeded them all was William S. Hart. Our club visited his Horseshoe Ranch in Newhall recently and learned all about the silent movie star.

Eight Model A's, all equipped with overdrive, met in Pasadena and immediately changed routes. The "Overdrivers" as they are now called, hit the freeway for the thirty-mile drive to the ranch. Once we arrived we were given special permission to drive up the hill and park next to the museum.

Everything needed for an unforgettable celebration of St. Patrick was there but the green beer. However, that didn't slow anything down. There was plenty of laughter, jokes, singing, great food and a contest for the most Irish dressed.

We started with several Irish blessings. I just wish Jack Dawson had been present to give them to us with the Scotch/Irish accent. A few Irish jokes from Bob Moore got us in a St. Patty's mood. Then, our only full-blooded Irishman in the room, EJ Callahan, sang a great Irish story with a sad ending. Hearing it sung with an Irish accent was special. After that, Bob Moore, EJ Callahan, Steve Concidine and Chuck Sharp led the group in the song about Molly Malone who sold cockles and muscles.

After a few more jokes, a fabulous corned beef and cabbage luncheon was ready to eat. There was plenty of food topped off with a St. Patrick's Day cake from Costco.

Bob told more jokes interspersed between the singing, games and listening to Don McBride, Jim Lank, Albert Robles and Paul Hould tell their jokes.

Elaine Perry had prepared three different word games, each with an Irish theme. They were won by Adele White, Kathy Concidine and Mary Carpenter.

Then the group got serious about the singing. This year we were fortunate that Jim Constantian brought his collection of Irish records, the earliest dating to 1912. We were able to sing along with some, but on Peg of My Hart, Bing Crosby was just too slow so we continued on without him. Bob, EJ Callahan and Steve Concidine were joined by Paul Hould and Mary Carpenter at the front of the room.

Sheri Johnson conducted the 50/25/25 which was won by Elsie Johnson and Bob Moore. There were nine that competed in the best Irish dressed contest which resulted in a tie between Paul Hould and Mary Carpenter.

When the depression hit at the end of 1929, during our Model A era, the times became tough. The carefree days of the twenties became only pleasant memories for most. Scrimping and saving, reusing and re purposing became necessary in order to get by.


Things such as new clothing for their growing families became lesser priorities, falling behind the needs of food and shelter. Hand me downs became one way of coping with expenses. Desperation called for innovation and the bags containing flour to bake the daily bread came to be useable for other purposes. The material that contained the flour was made out of cotton. Fabric sold on the bolt at the town's dry goods store sold as high as sixty cents a yard! This price was prohibitively high for many people. Women realized that they could use the material to make things that they needed. When the sack was emptied it could be used to make dish towels, curtains, bedspreads and, last but not least, clothing.

At the beginning many a dress was created out of sacks with company logos, and other art to advertise the company. Women came up with ways to get the designs out of the material. Eventually the companies began to make the sacks with pretty patterns and designs in order to allow women to have fabric that would be stylish. The manufacturing companies became competitive in coming up with brighter and more interesting designs.

Farm feed companies got into the act as well. Feed companies used cotton sacks to contain animal feeds. For example, egg mash was used to feed chickens. If a farmer's wife needed a specific pattern to match a feed bag that she already owned, her husband began to demonstrate a preference. Suddenly, feed companies were being encouraged to use the latest dress prints to make their bags. Feed supply stores were turned into fabric stores. Commenting on this trend one feed salesman interviewed commented saying, "years ago they used to ask for all sorts of feeds, special brands, you know. Now they come over and ask me if I have an egg mash in a flowered percale. It ain't natural!"

MY MODEL A QUIT RUNNING, NOW WHAT DO I DO?

Now that spring has arrived, most of us are looking forward to enjoying our Model A's a little more and may be even getting in some serious touring. I am sure we have all done the required maintenance on our Model A's and we are confident that there will be no mechanical problems or break downs, however, keep in mind that our cars are almost ninety years old and unexpected things can happen. A properly restored Model A that has been well maintained will usually be very dependable and can be driven many thousands of trouble free miles but what do we do if the engine starts to run poorly or just completely quits and we find ourselves sitting on the side of the road? Unless there has been a catastrophic failure has such as a stripped timing gear or broken crankshaft, most problems are either electrical or fuel related and eliminating one or the other will greatly speed up the necessary repair process and shorten the time it takes to get back on the road.

If your engine starts to run poorly or just completely stops, first check the obvious such as fuel in the tank, the coil wire falling out of the coil etc. If nothing is found, check for spark by removing the coil wire from the distributor and placing the end about 1/8 inch away from a head stud nut. With the ignition switch "ON", crank the engine and watch for spark to jump between the coil wire and the head stud nut. If no spark is observed, look for a problem with the ignition system such as a loose or broken wire, burnt points, a failed condenser etc.

If you do have spark, proceed with checking the fuel system. Most fuel related problems that occur with a Model A that had been running well but all of a sudden starts to run poorly or not at all are usually caused by a restriction in the fuel system. So first check for fuel flow to the carburetor. If your Model A is equipped with a cast iron sediment trap either on the firewall or in the case of the late 31's, on the carburetor itself, open the drain valve and watch for a continuous steady stream of fuel. For cars using the glass bowl type filter, close the fuel supply valve under the dash, remove the fuel line at the carburetor and then open the fuel supply valve and watch for fuel flow. You may want to catch the fuel in a container and not allow it to run onto hot engine components. If there is little or no fuel flow or the flow starts strong but dwindles down to a trickle, check for a clogged fuel system, dirt or rust in the lines, valves or fittings. Fuel flow problems can even be caused by something as simple as a plugged vent hole in the gas cap. If there is a good flow of fuel to the carburetor, close the fuel supply valve and remove the drain plug from the bottom of the carburetor and then open the fuel valve and check for a good flow of fuel thru the carburetor. Occasionally, the problem is within the carburetor itself.

When stopped on the side of the road, it is important to remember to quickly determine if the problem is either ignition or fuel related and then proceed with the diagnosis and execute the proper repair. Do not just guess and start changing parts. Do a few quick checks first.

TECH TIP

I recently ran across a problem I had not seen before. The Model A was equipped with a Model B intake and a newly rebuilt "B" carburetor. The engine ran fine around town but would starve for fuel when running on the freeway. After checking all the usual things that would contribute to fuel starvation and finding nothing, it was determined that the problem was in the carburetor itself.

Upon disassembly of the carburetor, it was found that the float valve installed was a "Grose" ball type valve with a very restrictive internal fuel passage. An original needle and seat type float valve was installed and now the Model A runs fine, both on surface streets and in overdrive on the freeway. In researching this problem, I found that there were a lot of incorrectly made ball type float valves that found their way into the market. When using the ball type float valve, be sure it is not one that was incorrectly made with a very restrictive internal fuel passage.
