SAA's Member Louie Formia Dies

Louie passed away on March 24. He had been hospitalized in recent weeks and was transferred to hospice care where he passed away a few days later.



Louie was born in Glassell Park on June 24, 1931. He served in the Air Force from 1951 to 1956. Although he

traveled to many countries during his military service he regretted never visiting his parents birth place in Northern Italy. After his discharge from the Air Force he went to work

for the Southern Pacific Railroad for a couple of years prior to beginning his apprenticeship to become an electrician.

Louie met his wife, JoAnn, on a blind date and six months later they were married on November 17, 1963 in Las Vegas. At the time, Louie had a bright red Corvette which he sold to purchased their home in Pasadena where they have lived for 54 years.

JoAnn said Louie was a very patient man. He could fix and build almost anything. He built things to last forever and used the same theory throughout his life with his friendships, marriage and fatherhood. Louie and JoAnn joined the Santa Anita A's February 2002. They were active in the club and participated in many of our tours and events.

A memorial service will be held for Louie on May 12 from 3:00 PM to 6:00 PM at the the Chaffee Community Museum of Art, 217 S. Lemon Ave. Ontario, CA. Members are invited and encouraged to drive their Model A's. A caravan of cars driving to the service will assemble at the Perry's residence at 1:45 PM for departure at 2:00 PM.

ERA FASHIONS

In the 1920's and early 1930's families were growing larger than ever as they spread out across the country. When the Depression hit at the end of 1929, right in the middle of our Model A era, times became hard. Things such as new clothes for themselves and their growing families became less important than food and shelter! In those days feed sacks were made of cotton, and when the manufacturers saw that women were using the cotton fabric to make dresses and other items for the family they stepped up and began printing the fabrics with colorful patterns.

Women used these flour sacks as material with which to create dresses for themselves and clothing for their families. As zippers were unavailable at this time women used buttons. Buttons were reusable. The worn out clothing was now usable as cleaning rags, and buttons were cut off for another garment! The colors and designs of feed bags were stunning. The brightly colored sacks came in beautiful and whimsical designs. This was of course during the Art Deco period



and geometric patterns and designs were all the fashion! As an aside, the buildings, furniture and interiors were all taken over in this fabulous style! The manufacturers of these bags also decorated bags containing household goods such as flour for baking. The manufacturers became competitive with their designs in trying to outdo one another. Women could choose their favorite designs. Just imagine how fun shopping could be now.



Feed companies already in the fabric design business were dealing with the farmers, whose wives had preferences regarding which patterns their husbands should purchase. Feed companies were being encouraged to print their bags with the latest fabric designs! Commenting on this trend one feed salesman interviewed commented, saying: "years ago they used to ask

for all sorts of feeds, special brands you know. Now they come over and ask me if I have an egg mash in a flowered percale. It ain't natural."

Using cotton sacks to do double duty helped many families to be able to have more without sacrificing or going without. They were able to have much nicer clothing, curtains, and kitchen towels.

California Gas Tax Hike Will Cost Typical California Family \$779.28 More Per Year

California politicians are misrepresenting the true cost of living impact that will result from their car and gas tax hikes that started going into effect November 1, 2017. Governor Brown came out and stated that the increase will cost the average California Family no more than \$10.00 per month or \$120.00 per year. Not sure where he studied math, but the real cost is over \$700.00 per year. Worse, California media has failed to properly report on the cost increases.

To illustrate the increase costs that a typical family of four would see under the car and gas tax hikes, Reform California prepared an analysis to illustrate the kinds of price impacts that could be seen. Cost of Fuel Increase: \$405 per year.

This is the one that the media has focused on, but most of the media gets the true cost increase completely wrong. While the gas tax went up by 12 cents a gallon November 1, the gas tax hike legislation contains a hidden tax by changing how taxes are assessed per gallon of gas. As a result, the true increase in gas-tax-per-gallon will be 19.5 cents - and it will automatically increase thereafter.

The average family has 2.1 cars. For our illustration of a typical California family, let's round that down to just 2 cars using 20 gallons per week (filling up the tank once per car per week). For a two-driver family, that's an extra \$405 per year.

Cost of Vehicle Registration Increase: \$250 per year The car tax (vehicle registration assessment) goes into effect January 1, 2018 and many families are now getting the first notices of the increase in the mail. The amount of the car tax increase depends on the value of your car. For our illustration for a typical California family, let's set aside luxury cars like a Mercedes or BMW.

Let's suppose the family we study has a Ford Fusion and a Jeep Wrangler - pretty standard economical cars. For this family, the car tax hike is \$100 more for the car worth \$25,000 or more (Ford Fusion) and \$150 more for the car worth \$35000 or more (Jeep Wrangler). For this family, that's an extra \$250 per year. Cost of Shipping and Cost of Goods Increase: At least \$124.28 per year (food alone).

This is where the impact of the gas tax hike is really hidden as it is imposed on transportation companies using diesel and they in turn pass it on to consumers through price increases. REPEAL THE GAS TAX!

FROM THE BENCH BY CHRIS WICKERSHAM

ARE YOU READY TO GO ON A TOUR?

The summer season for touring is now upon us and it is time to be sure our Model A's are ready for the road. Just because there were no problems the last time you drove your Model A does not insure there will be no problems when your start off on a long tour. Henry did a very good job with the design and construction of our cars and when properly maintained, the Model A has proved to be very reliable. The problem we face today is that the first Model A's are now 90 years old and the local corner garage is no longer around to perform routine maintenance so for the most part, this responsibility now falls with the owner. One help we do have is the Model A Ford "Instruction Book" that would have been included with your Model A when it was new. This little book has a wealth of information which will help today's owner with necessary maintenance.

Before starting out on a tour, most owners understand that it is necessary to be sure the oil is changed, the chassis is lubed and the fluid levels in the transmission, differential and steering box fluid levels are checked but during the tour, there is ongoing maintenance that should be performed routinely.

When touring, before starting out every morning, you should walk around the car and take a good look to be sure there are no obvious problems. Check the water in the radiator, check the brake lights for proper operation and look at the front tires for excessive wear. Run your hand across the tread to check for "feathering" or uneven wear. This is usually an indication of incorrect toe in or toe out of the front wheels. Excessive toe in will cause very rapid wear of the front tires. This is not difficult to correct and there is always at least one member of the tour that can assist you with adjusting the toe. Raise the hood and take a look at the engine compartment. Check the oil level, check the fan belt for proper tension and look for fuel, oil or water leaks. Look for missing bolts and loose components. Look underneath the car for fluid leaks. This only takes a few minutes and a problem discovered in the motel parking lot is a lot easier to deal with than on the side of the road. For long tours, be sure to lube the generator, distributor and water pump every 500 miles.

For those who are using the original type wet cell batteries, check the water in the battery. Original type batteries can lose a little water especially if an original type generator without a voltage regulator is also being used.

Unlike modern "tubeless" tires, original tube type tires will lose a little air so be sure to also check tire pressures. Some of us can remember working in a gas station when we were a little younger and it was our job to always wash the windows, check the water, oil, battery and tire pressure when a customer came in for fuel.

One item to absolutely not over look is the lug nuts. Before the tour and then every day or two, check to be sure the lug nuts are tight. If you had any wheels off your car just prior to the tour, check the lug nuts at the first rest stop to be sure they are still tight.

Whether on a tour or just driving around town, get into the habit of routinely taking a look at your Model A with an eye toward maintenance items. Taking care of a small problem early on will often prevent a major problem that can be inconvenient and also very expensive to correct.



TECH TIP - CLOGGED FUEL SYSTEM

An ongoing problem Model A owners are having is with dirt or rust in the gas tank clogging up the fuel system. Complete elimination of this problem usually requires removal of the tank and having a shop clean and coat the inside of the tank. This process also removes the paint on the outside which requires repainting the tank. Sometimes a tank with rust can be cleaned while it is still installed in the car by using products such as Evaporust or Rust911.

May be a simpler solution to this problem is to install a strainer in the inlet of the fuel shutoff valve. This little strainer presses into the fuel shutoff valve and, when installed, the strainer is inside the tank and filters the fuel before it enters the valve. While the strainer does not eliminate the dirt or rust in the tank, it often will keep it from entering the fuel system. I had a problem with rust in the tank getting into the fuel system with my first Model A. I installed a strainer and had no more problems for the next 4 years that I owned the car.



This little strainer is available from most Model A parts supplier for about \$5.00.




