Back in May of 1928 women's fashion styles were being shown for the coming summer season in magazines. I happened upon a copy of the National Farm Journal for the month of May 1928. In addition to articles about farming a full page spread article about current fashions was included.

The article was centered around women's fashions. In particular it was previewing the newest upcoming summer styles. It started by emphasizing the "costumes" should be "feminine" in line and feeling. For summer of the year 1928 thin fabrics and soft flowing lines would be seen. It stated that sports outfits would still be popular and would continue to be short, straight and simple.



For the ladies needing to travel, suits were required. The

lines in suits were changing from the plain and scant to include pleats and many diagonal lines in trimming.



Hats were reported to be going wider across the brim in order to protect ladies's eyes from the summer sun. It did mention that in Paris, however, the hat styles were still showing the tight fitting toque with little or no brim.

A great deal of attention was being paid to neck finishes. Scarf, collars and lace were very New neck styles would offer softer feminine lines, flattering than the hard straight

neckline of 1927 styles. One end of the new long scarf would be securely fastened to the dress while the other would be left to tie or fall off the shoulder at the back of the dress.

Capes were coming into fashion popularity. Always useful and flattering, the new cape style came right off the shoulders, having a long scarf like tie that secured it in the front. The scarf like treatment of this resembled the scarf style of the new dress styles.



So, essentially, the new look in women's styles emphasized a more feminine, flowing profile.

The Memorial Day Story



The story of Memorial Day began in the summer of 1865, when a prominent local druggist, Henry C. Weltes, mentioned to some of his friends at a social gathering that while praising the living veterans of the Civil War, it would be well to remember the patriotic dead by placing flowers on their graves. Nothing resulted from this suggestion until he advanced the idea again the following spring to General John B. Murray, Murray, a civil war hero and intensely patriotic, supported the idea wholeheartedly and marshaled veterans' support. Plans were developed for a more complete celebration by a local citizens' committee headed by Welles and Murray.

On May 5, 1866, the Village was decorated with flags at half mast, draped with evergreens and mourning black. Veterans, civic societies and residents led by General Murray, marched to the strains of martial music to the three village cemeteries. There, impressive ceremonies were held and soldiers' graves decorated. One year later, on May 5, 1867, the ceremonies were repeated. In 1868, Waterloo joined with other communities in holding their observance on May 30th, in accordance with General Logan's orders. It has been held annually ever since.

Waterloo held the first formal village wide annual different from the previous year. observance of a day dedicated to honoring the war dead. On March 7, 1966, the State of New York recognized Waterloo by a proclamation signed by Governor Nelson A Rockefeller. This was followed by recognition from Congress of the United States when the House of Representatives and the Senate unanimously passed House Concurrent Resolution 587 on May 17th and May 19th, 1966 respectively. This reads in part as follows: "Resolved that the Congress of the United States, in recognition of the patriotic tradition set in motion one hundred years ago in the Village of Waterloo, NY, does hereby officially recognize Waterloo, New York as the birthplace of Memorial Day..." On May 26, 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson, signed a Presidential Proclamation recognizing Waterloo as the Birthplace of Memorial Day.

Do You Have Seat Belts in Your Model A?

I had a different subject in mind for this month's Spoken Wheels but I changed my mind when I received an email from Brad Richter, secretary of the Model A Touring Club. Brad reported about a Model A that was involved in an accident while participating in a local Club Tour.

The accident happened on Saturday, May 12th. It happened in an instant and the driver of the Model A was not at fault. The driver suffered a broken elbow, broken ribs and a severe laceration to his arm. The passenger was found pinned in below the gas tank and had to be air lifted to a Trauma Center with major injuries. She died the next day. The car WAS NOT equipped with seat belts. Brad included this picture of the Model A involved in the accident.

Our cars are now reaching the age of 80 years and while we are able to upgrade our Model A's with improvements that allow us to comfortably run at speeds where we can drive the freeways and interstate highways when necessary, we need to always keep in mind that the Model A Ford does not have the built-in safety features that modern automobiles do.

Hopefully, we will never experience an accident but if we do, seat belts are the one safety feature that is most often credited with preventing or minimizing injuries to the car's occupants. Seat belts help keep occupants seated and not thrown around in the car, or worse, thrown out of the car.

Tech Tip - Installing Seat Belts

Most Model A parts suppliers offer seat belts at a reasonable price for your Model A Ford, but if the seat belts are not properly installed, they are of little use in the case of an accident when they are most needed.

Properly installed seat belts require strong anchor points that will not fail if an accident should occur. There are good instructions in "Mechanics Handbook", vol. 2, by Les Andrews and also "How To Restore Your Model A", vol. 6.

Installing seat belts in a Model A Ford is not something every owner is qualified to do. So if necessary, seek professional assistance.

IMPORTANT OTHER STUFF

Do You Remember Gas Ration Stickers?

If you've been in the "old car" hobby for a while, chances are that you've seen gas ration stickers in the right corner of the windshields of classic cars. When World War II broke out, the U.S. Office of Price Administration (OPA) rationed gasoline beginning on May 15, 1942 on the east coast, and nationwide that December to assist in the war effort. This was in reaction to shortages of gasoline, and stickers were introduced to control the amount of gasoline that the public consumed. By law, the stickers had to be affixed to the lower right side of the windshield. Most car hobbyists have seen the "A" gas ration sticker, but there were several more types issued.

The "A" sticker was the most common and was issued to the general public. To get the sticker you had to certify that you needed gasoline and that you owned no more than 5 tires, which were also rationed during the war.

The "B" sticker was issued to business owners. It allowed them to get more fuel for their business vehicles.

The "C" sticker was issued primarily to professional people: physicians, nurses, dentists, ministers, priests, mail delivery, embalmers, farm workers, construction or maintenance workers, soldiers and armed forces going to duty, and several others. The interesting thing about the "C" sticker is that there was a list of 17 different occupations and check boxes at the bottom of the form that the person had to check off to qualify for the sticker. In reality, the "C" sticker was probably the most common during the war, as many people tried to qualify to get more gasoline. However, after the war most "C" sticker users scraped it off their windshield as they didn't want the world to know their profession.


The "M" sticker was issued to motorcycle owners. This included telegraph delivery and other messenger services who used motorcycles for their business.

The "T" sticker was issued to truck drivers.

The "X" sticker was issued in special instances for high mileage type jobs such as traveling salesmen.

Reproductions of many of these stickers are available, and they add to the vehicle's restoration.
