



Peter told me the story of his work history that led him to discover his Model A. At 13, Peter had his first job stocking shelves and cleaning up in a small market store near his home. Within six months, he was also working the register. When the elderly owner was unable to work the

full day, Peter was given the responsibility of stocking the shelves, cleaning up, turning the lights out, locking the door and delivering the day's receipts to the owner who lived nearby. At 15, he started working at a liquor store two days a week and also helped at the market.

After graduating from High School in Azusa, Peter spent four years in the Air Force working on aircraft engines. At discharge, he joined the Air Force Reserves and went to work for the Federal Government as ART Technician. His started at Lockheed in Burbank where he was assigned to the Department of the Navy inspecting P3's and being responsible for approving the plane prior to their purchase by the Navy. After 11 years, his Reserve unit was called up for Desert Storm/Desert Shield and the 30 day call up ended 8 month later.

When returning, he was assigned to the Department of the Air Force at the McDonald Douglas facility in Long Beach where they were building C-17's. He now had the responsibility for giving final approval on a 500 million dollar airplane.

The C-17 program wound down and after 4 ½ years, he joined the FAA. Peter's job was to visit and inspect the manufacturing facilities where components of commercial aircraft were being manufactured. On one visit to a small mom and pop shop, he came across a collection of antique automobiles, one of which caught Peter's eye, a 1931 Model A Ford Victoria that needed restoration. The owner explained that he was going to complete them "one day." Eighteen years later the owner died. The car was untouched and his wife, who knew of her husband's wish to sell it to Peter, did so.

Peter's other passion which is keeping him extremely busy on weekends is brightening the lives of children with intellectual and physical disabilities. While in the Reserves, he discovered small versions of Air Force aircraft that 35 years ago were used as a recruiting tool. Peter was able to secure five replicas of the F16's. The planes are 9' X 14 ½'. His sixth plane, a replicate of a P51 was built by a friend with the same passion as Peter. On weekends, Peter and his crew trailer the planes to events at places like Children's Hospital of LA, Ronald McDonald House, and the City of Hope to bring happiness and joy to children as they ride in the planes.

If you ever traveled on the Pasadena Freeway you no doubt have seen the off ramp sign for the "Lummis House". You probably wondered who in the ---- is Lummis and why does he have a house. Well, if you



are really curious and want answers to the "Lummis" questions, then come on along with us on our tour to the Lummis House on Saturday, January 11.

In 1884, Charles Fletcher Lummis was working for a newspaper in Cincinnati and was offered a job with the Los Angeles Times. At that time Los Angeles had a population of only 12,000. Lummis decided to make the 3,507-mile journey (Possibly traveling by route 66) from Cincinnati to Los Angeles on foot, taking 143 days.

Lummis purchased a 3 acre plot around 1895 in the Mount Washington area of Los Angeles and spent 13 years building what would become a 4,000-square-foot stone home with an exhibition hall. He named it *El Alisal*.

How - When - Where: Our drive to the Lummis house will begin at the home of Jim Kroeger, 2669 E.Villa St. Pasadena. Be there on Saturday, January 11 for a 9:30 AM departure. Following our tour of the Lummis house we will make a short drive to Philippe's and partake of one or more of their famous sandwiches.

Our SAA's annual photo contest entries were shown to attendees & asked to vote for their two favorites on display.



Pasadena High School Model A Ford club

Pasadena High School was built in 1960. Prior to that the last two years of high school in Pasadena was conducted on the Campus of Pasadena City College (PCC). Junior high schools in Pasadena before 1960 went up through the 10th grade. The Pasadena High School Model A Ford Club was established in 2016 by Wilbert Smith, a member of the Santa Anita A's Model A Ford Club (SAA).





Pasadena City College

A number of technical seminars for the high school Model A Ford Club have been conducted at PCC. The instructors there volunteer their time to open the automotive shop on a Saturday morning to enable the activity. The most recent seminar was held there on Saturday November 16, 2019. The subject was the assembly of an overhauled Model A Ford transmission and bell housing. The two will be installed in the Model A Ford the club is currently restoring that will later be raffled off.

Pasadena City College is located on the corner of Colorado Boulevard and Hill Avenue in the city of Pasadena. It was established in 1924 and is a two-year community college. In the old days the Rose Queen and her court came exclusively from PCC. This ensured there was always an abundance of beautiful girls on campus.

A distinguished PCC alumnus is Ken Mallory (Santa Anita A's Model A Ford Club). Ken was a student at PCC during WWII when he was drafted into the army. He later fought in the Battle of the Bulge in Europe. Another SAA distinguished alumnus is Rick Phillips, who was a PCC student and later became an instructor there.

Headlights

Thru the years there have been a lot of comments from owners about not being able to see well at night with original Model A headlights. This has been on ongoing discussion from the time the Model A was first sold. With an increase in power the Model A was faster than the Model T but the headlights were essentially the same. With the higher speed of the Model A, when driven at night, the headlights would not light the road far enough ahead for safe driving. Henry realized this and in February of 1929, the "Twolite" headlight system was introduced which incorporated a "low beam" for around the town driving and a "high beam" for open highway driving with no cars coming toward you. This was definitely an improvement but still was marginal at best. Aftermarket high output 50/32 C.P. (candle power) bulbs could be purchased which increased the "high beam" light output by more than 50%. When these bulbs were properly focused and adjusted and if the reflectors were in good condition, driving at night became much safer and enjoyable. Even today, this combination works well for most night driving situations.

In the late 1930's, the automobile industry introduced "Sealed Beam" units to replace the conventional separate headlight bulbs, reflectors and defusing lenses. Sealed Beam headlights had better light output and required much less maintenance. Kits soon became available to install Sealed Beam units in the Model A headlight housings and there are still many Model A's in service today with this conversion. Sealed Beam headlight units have the advantage of precisely positioning the filament at the exact focal point of the reflector, preserving the mirrored surface of the reflector from moisture and tarnish and keeping everything clean.

One downside of using 50/32 C.P. bulbs or Sealed Beam units was that the higher current requirement would tax the original Model A generator to its limit. Also if the generator output was adjusted for a higher output for driving at night, it would be too high for extended daytime driving which often resulted in overcharging the battery.

In recent years, with horsepower improvements and overdrives that allow our Model A's to be driven at even faster speeds, owners wanted even better light for night driving. One solution was to install "Quartz Halogen" headlight kits. While Halogen bulbs did produce better light, they required either modifying the existing reflectors or installing new reflectors. They also operated at a very high temperature and require even more current to operate. This resulted in failures of the sockets and wiring connections within the headlight assembly and a high output alternator was necessary to provide the increase in the current requirements. I do not recommend Halogen bulbs.

Recently, direct replacement LED headlight bulbs options have become available. These LED bulbs have the advantage of producing more light and require very little current to operate, much less than the original Model A TWOLITE Bulbs. When focused correctly, LED bulbs will definitely light up distance objects much better. They fit right into your original sockets and only require a few amps to operate. You may have to lengthen the focusing screw and spring to achieve good adjustment. There seems to be less light projected down onto the road immediately in front of the car but this may be just a perception.

The USA made direct replacement headlight bulbs use an array of several small LED elements while a direct replacement LED bulb made in the UK (England) uses just 2 large individual LED elements. The UK bulbs seem to be a little easier to focus. Tech Tip

Model A headlights will not work well if the reflectors are not in good condition. Original reflectors in otherwise good condition can be re-silvered or you can purchase new reproduction reflectors. Brattons offer a very high quality reproduction headlight reflectors that are aluminum coated and sealed. These have the same reflectivity as the original silver plated reflectors and will probably cost less than having your original reflectors re-silvered.

Trend Setters

Silent film actress Colleen Moore basically invented the bob. Women around the world copied the black block cut that she and other early adopting actresses made popular. She influenced women clear into the 1960's (and beyond). In the 1960's an even shorter popular style called a pixie crop became extremely popular; just remember Twiggy!

Party girl Louise Brooks tried and tested all of the trends that the decade had to offer. She helped to popularize the bob, and got women to see how fabulous trousers can be. Palazzo trousers are still a staple of holiday style.

Dripping with glamour in her spliced gold dress and bejeweled headband, Gloria Swanson was the picture of 1920's fashion. Never knowingly understated, her extravagant dress sense meant that she was one of the decade's stand-out style stars. A Lady Gaga for the Jazz Age, if you will.

The first European actress to be invited to Hollywood, silent film star Pola Negri's fashion and beauty trends highly influenced all sorts of our favorite fashion and beauty styles. She loved headgear, put fur boots on the fashion map and even introduced the world to the concept of red painted toenails.

The square cut was "the" neckline of the decade, flattening the bust line after ample cleavage in corsets. Co-founder of the film studio United Arts, Mary Pickford was a 1920's heroine for women at work, and a power dressing one at that. She helped to bring the square neckline into popularity.

Realizing that the late teens and the nineteen twenties brought us the movies, we can easily imagine

how vastly influenced people must have been to idealize the clothing worn by actors on the silver screen.



These few women and many more of their male and female counterparts provided visual representation of the styles and fashions that the people wanted to wear. As we enter a new decade of twenties we will have to see what new trends, styles and fashion ideas will influence the way we all will dress!

The "Low-End Boys" have been busy working on Don Dawkins car. We fixed the problem after his paint shop did a poor job in re-wiring his headlights after they did a very nice job re-painting his fenders. After some time Don complained that he could not start the car and it kept on blowing fuses. So...back again, we checked and cleaned the spark plugs, points and timing. It was out of gas, so we added a little gas. We replaced the fuse and it started right up. We then told him to get more gas. Don called and said he could not start the car and it was still blowing fuses. We gave up and instructed him to have the car towed to Warren Records' shop. They found that the generator "cut-out" switch had a dead short and replaced the fuse holder.

Scott Bonner needed help getting his sedan started. After cleaning & adjusting the points and plugs it was starving for gas. We replaced the carburetor and everything was fine. (Be sure to add "Sta-bil" to your tank if you are not going to drive your car for a while). Car starts and runs well.

One of our newest "Low End Boys" (Bob Harbicht) had problems with his stop light on his pickup truck. His right front headlight was not working either. Bob reconnected the wire to the stoplight after his car and a new bed and paint job. His headlight was repaired by installing a new light socket which he purchased.

If you have problems getting your car started, please contact Mickey Fruchter and the "Low End-Boys" will try to get you back on the road.
