NEW MEMBER SPOTLIGHT BY BOB MOORE

Rob Johnson

Our newest member, is a 5th generation from Pasadena. We will see him very occasionally as he lives in Arizona. He grew up in Pasadena and in 1951 his family moved to Arcadia. He graduated from Arcadia High School in 1961. His family was part of the Santa Anita A's almost from the start and some of our old-time members will remember Rob Johnson, his mother and father, Betty and Butch Johnson and sister Pam. Butch had shortened his name from Grover Cleveland.



Rob's father Butch was a true car guy. Butch had the skills to modify any car into whatever he felt best and make it go fast. Rob said that he usually had 3 or 4 cars and when he ran out of room, he would sell one and start on another. Jay Leno tried several times to buy his father's Woody Wagon. It was very well built with juice brakes and an overdrive transmission to make it a long-distance car.

Rob's favorite Model A was a 1930 Roadster Pickup. Butch found the car in pieces at the back of the lot across the street from where they lived on 2nd Street in Arcadia. Butch put the truck back together with a flat head Ford, 39 transmission and a chopped top. After Butch died, the Model A was maintained until 2014 when it was sold after Betty was moved to a retirement home.

After High School, Rob started with Southern California Edison in Orange County as a meter reader and ended up supporting the San Onofre Nuclear Power Plant by co-managing SCE's largest machine shop dedicated to serving the power plant.

Rob learned his car building and rebuilding skills from his father. While putting in his 38 ½ years with SCE, Rob built several hot rods, including a 1927 Ford Coupe which was featured in several hot rod magazines including *Hot Rod Magazine* and *Ol Skol Rodz*. His other cars were a 1970 Indy car built with his dad, a 56 Chevy Cameo pickup, and a 34 Ford pickup. Rob had an interest in restoring vintage homes and has restored Colonial, Spanish and Victorian. Victorian homes were in his blood, and after retiring after 38 ½ years with SCE, he and Judy, his wife of 30 years, moved to Prescott, Arizona into an 1898 Queen Ann Victorian home. He also built himself a five-car garage with all the equipment to rebuild any car. His current collection includes 1939 Ford woody, dad's Model A truck, 1970 Porsche 914-6, 1948 MG TC rally car powered by a Ford V8 60, and a 1951 Matchless motorcycle.

His mother had volunteered as "hostess" in the SAA club's 1986-1987 year and as a thank you, she was given a Model A rearview mirror with windup clock that was appropriately inscribed. Rob has always had it hanging in his garage.

This started him thinking about the Model A that had been his father's and wondered where it was and if he could buy it back. It was first sold to someone in Arcadia in 2014. One day a friend in Prescott called and said he thought the car was for sale locally. Sure enough, it was his and he purchased it. It now has his mom's mirror on the car and the license plate reads "Backhme".

Rob says they like Prescott for it reminds them of the informality of living in the 1950's. Doors aren't locked, friendly neighbors, a slower life style. He purchased another Victorian bungalow down the street and their daughter Ashleigh Kaitlyn will be heading there from Newport Beach in a few months.

Rob says that they will try to make some of the club's events. For now, he is happy just receiving the newsletter.

Lummis House Tour

The question of who is Lummis and why does he have a house was answered on our recent tour to his home in Highland Park.



Our tour guide was very knowledgeable and provided us with information that answered our questions about who was Lummis and why did he build this house.

The Lummis House, also known as El Alisal, is a Rustic American Craftsman stone house built by Charles Fletcher Lummis. The 4,000-square-foot home took 13 years to build. The exhibition hall has a concrete floor so that after a party that might include artists, writers and musicians, it could easily be cleaned with a bucket of water. Notable people who stayed in his guest houses included Clarence Darrow, Will Rogers, John Philip Sousa and John Muir. It is located on the edge of Arroyo Seco in Northeast Los Angeles. Lummis (1859-1928), was an author, editor, poet, athlete, librarian, historian, and archeologist. The house's name means "alder grove" in Spanish.



He selected this site in 1895 chiefly because of a mammoth, ancient sycamore (El Alisal).



After the house tour we motored downtown to the world famous Phillippe's French dip sandwich shop. We had a good turn out for this tour with 30 people in 10 cars.

I Pledge Allegiance

Rather than just recite a few words with blind thought as to the meaning, take a few minutes and review the short historical narrative provided by U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.



Thirty—one words which affirm the values and freedom that the American flag represents are recited while facing the flag as a pledge of Americans' loyalty to their country. The Pledge of Allegiance was written for the 400th anniversary, in 1892, of the discovery of America. A national committee of educators and civic leaders planned a public-school celebration of Columbus Day to center around the flag. Included with the script for ceremonies that culminate in raising of the flag was the pledge. So it was in October 1892 Columbus Day programs that school children across the country first recited the Pledge of Allegiance this way.

I pledge allegiance to my flag and to the Republic for which it stands: one Nation indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all.

Controversy continues over whether the author was the chairman of the committee, Francis Bellamy who worked on a magazine for young people that published the pledge or James Upham who worked for the publishing firm that produced the magazine. The pledge was published anonymously in the magazine and was not copyrighted.

According to some accounts of Bellamy as the author, he decided to write a pledge of allegiance, rather than a salute, because it was a stronger expression of loyalty, something particularly significant even 27 years after the Civil War ended. "One Nation indivisible" referred to the outcome of the Civil War, and "Liberty and Justice for all" expressed the ideals of the Declaration of Independence.

The words "my flag" were replaced by "the flag of the United States" in 1923, because some foreign-born people might have in mind the flag of the country of their birth, instead of the U.S. Flag.

A year later, "of America" was added after "United States." No form of the pledge received official recognition by Congress until June 22, 1942, when it was formally included in the U.S. Flag Code. The official name of The Pledge of Allegiance was adopted in 1945.

The last change in language came on Flag Day 1954, when Congress passed a law which added the words "under God" after "one nation."

Originally, the pledge was said with the hand in the so-called "Bellamy Salute," with the hand resting first outward from the chest, then the arm extending out from the body. Once Hitler came to power in Europe, some Americans were concerned that this position of the arm and hand resembled the salute rendered by the Nazi military. In 1942, Congress established the current practice of rendering the pledge with the right hand placed flat over the heart.

Section 7 of the Federal Flag Code states that when not in military uniform, men should remove any headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, thereby, resting the hand over the heart. People in military uniform should remain silent, face the flag and render the military salute.

The Flag Code specifies that any future changes to the pledge would have to be with the consent of the President. The Pledge of Allegiance now reads:

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

The Model A Is Recognized For It's Adaptability

Two diverse groups are in agreement that the Model A Ford will be able to adapt to the geophysical predictions now being presented to the public. This is in regard to concerns about climate change and the possible end of the world as we know it in 12 years.

The first group is advocating significant expenditures to stop the world's climate change predicted by a "consensus" of scientists representing the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), an intergovernmental body of the United Nations. This group has predicted that the oceans will rise and cover many of our highways and railroads tracks, hindering our means of transportation.

The second group represents those persons who believe the earth's climate will continue to change as it has for millions of years. They believe there is an alternate way to react to the change in climate be it colder or warmer. This group believes "Science in not a consensus and a consensus is not science." They are sometimes referred to as "Climate deniers".

Fortunately both groups recognize that the Model A, because of it's rugged design and high road clearance will be able to easily adapt to driving on either hot water or snow covered roads. The concern now is how to accommodate those persons who do not now own a Model A.

A representative of the United Nations, who asked not to be identified for security reasons, stated that a new committee has been organized to study the possibility of cloning the Model A's with some slight genetic modifications which will still meet MAFCA judging standards.

Dressing Young in the 30's.

Those college kids got to have all the fun fashions! This sentiment was shared by many back in the day as more young people were finding their way into college! After World War I more opportunities became available to those having served their country, to attend a good college or university. Young women were attending colleges in greater numbers, and with more regularity as well. As soon as the young ladies were able to give up the corset everything moved towards a freer road ahead. Women were going to work outside of the home in greater numbers as the young 20th century gained momentum.



For the college students, being away from parents (who had previously done their laundry) had need for sportier clothing, such as knee length knit suits and knit dresses. They also had need for knit sweaters knit vests, knit socks and knit gloves.

They were easy to wash. The kids also wore cotton, silk, linen and rayon dresses but knitwear was sportswear and sportswear is what every college kid was wearing. As for shoes, you guessed it, sporty two-tone Oxfords, straps and pumps were in vogue, and flashy satin Sandler's were out. In Winter wearing a raccoon coat was high fashion!

A sorority girl living in a community house needed a lounging robe or house jacket and slippers to remain modest. Her busy school schedule did not excuse her from changing clothing several times a day.

Each girl's wardrobe should contain an extra dress or two which could be worn to meals. At breakfast and lunch the girls were expected to wear the dresses that they wore to class. At dinner they were to wear something different. The reasoning behind this expectation was for social purposes. It was thought that they would find themselves fresher in appearance and would behave in a more sociable manner!



A casual 1920's day outfit might combine, for example, a pleated skirt, blouse, long knit vest, thin belt and a knit beret hat. Add a pair of walking Oxfords, and a school day outfit such as this would suit until the time to dress for dinner.



Specific sports called for different types of clothing; however, there were two primary sets. The first set was worn by golfers, tennis players and other ladylike sports. It consisted of a long or tea length skirt, long sleeve blouse and a loose-knit vest or sweater. A thin vest tied the waist in. A low heel Oxford or flat saddle shoes were best on grassy surfaces. It was a look that

inspired sporting games. The second look was for more vigorous outdoor activities, such as hiking, riding, camping and fishing. Instead of a skirt, women wore wool knickers also plus fours, togs, breeds or jodhpurs. They were wide and baggy around the hips with a button cuff below the knee. Women wore thick stockings or knee high argyle socks with a pair of flat Oxfords. A button down shirt with collar and a skinny black tie gave a nod to men's wear. Knit vests, pullover sweaters, and long cardigans added warmth. Men did not appreciate this masculine look but young adventurous women loved it!

Being able to wear pants (knickers) and "men's" clothing gave freedom to a new generation of women who embraced non-traditional roles.

A Modern Model A Engine?

Long time MAFCA member Terry Burtz of Campbell California has long been working on a project to manufacture new Model A engine blocks, crankshafts and connecting rods. The engine block will be identical to the original Model A block on the outside but will have 5 main bearings, a balanced crankshaft, and full pressurized oil system.



Terry began this project in 2007 and has worked with California foundries for several years trying to get an end product that would cost about the same as rebuilding an original Model A engine. The project stalled in 2015 and for the 4 years, there was no new news.

However, this year, Terry got in touch with a man with businesses in China and USA that manufactures engines. They have met and discussed Terry's project and it looks like the project is back on track.

Time to Repair the Electrical System

It is the beginning of a new year and it may be a good time to address some questions that have often come up involving the electrical system of our Model A's. The electrical system as Henry designed it is quite simple and when new, our cars were reliable, dependable and required little maintenance. After years of poor repairs and amateur modifications, many owners find their Model A's are not very reliable and are prone to refusing to run at the most inconvenient time. If your Model A fits in this category, it may be time to overhaul the electrical system. While very good information is available in the Les Andrews series of repair manuals, the following are some tips that may help.

Purchase good quality wiring harnesses from one of the major parts suppliers. Do not look for the cheapest price but the best quality. If you are using turn signals, main wiring harnesses are available that incorporate the additional wires required for turn signals and you won't have to add them later. Besides the main harness and the harness from the junction box to the instrument panel, there is other wiring that also may need to be replaced. Be sure to inspect the headlight, cowl light, tail light sockets and replace or rewire as necessary. If you have a good soldering iron, some rosin core solder and a little wire, you can rewire the sockets yourself. The result will be better than some of the poor quality replacement components available. Also, do not forget about the wire in the center of the horn rod and the ignition switch to distributor cable. A kit is available for the horn rod but if you are using an original Pop-Out Ignition Switch, you may want to have an expert rebuilt this component. Other wiring that may be in need of replacing is the wiring for an electric windshield wiper and interior dash and dome lights. At this time, also consider installing a fuse assembly to help protect the electrical system from damage should a short circuit occur. Just be sure to carry extra fused with you.

Battery cables are also part of the electrical system. You will find good quality cables from a major supplier are sized correctly and will fit better than generic cables that you will find at your local auto parts store. This may also be a good time to install a master electrical disconnect switch and an extra ground cable from the battery frame ground connection to the engine/transmission assembly. If you need to replace the battery, consider an Optima battery. While a little more expensive, Optima batteries will hold a charge a lot longer, have more cold cranking amps and can last as long as 12-14 years before needing to be replaced.

Other components of the electrical system that may need to be rebuilt or replaced are the starter, generator and distributor. If these components are not in good order, you will never experience the reliability that was originally designed into your Model A. Parts and information is readily available for those owners who want to rebuild these components themselves or rebuilding services are available from the better parts suppliers. If you want to install an alternator, one with 30 amp output and positive ground work well and do not require modifications to your stock wiring. Alternators with higher output will require modifications. It is not necessary to convert your car to 12 volts if the original 6 volt electrical system is in good condition.

The Model A horn may be the most important component on the car. There is nothing that identifies with the Model A Ford more than the sound of a good operating "Ahooga" horn. I find when driving my Model A, there will often be someone who wants me to honk the horn. Most of the time, a good careful cleaning and lubrication of the motor is all that is necessary to restore a horn to operating condition. For a horn that may need more extensive repair, rebuild kits are available or you can send your horn to one of the experts for a major overhaul. A Model A is not a Model A without a good operating Ahooga horn.

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
