Ken Mallory Honored at Dodger Stadium

Ken Mallory was recognized as "The Military Hero of the Game" at Dodger stadium on Tuesday, June 15.



The Dodgers have a tradition of recognizing a military hero in the middle of the second inning of every home game. He would normally be escorted to the field where the selected military hero's accomplishments are read to the crowd and his branch of service theme song is played by the organist. He would then return to the stands after first passing by the Dodger dugout where

Ken was previously scheduled to receive the award on April 11, 2020 during the LA Dodgers opening game in a series against the defending World Series champions, the Washington Nationals. But it didn't happen—the game was canceled due to Covid 19. Ken was not there to be honored.



This story was reported by Bill Plaschke, sports writer, for the LA times in the April 16, 2020 edition. Ken had purchased 15 tickets to the game for his family. He was going to wear the same uniform he wore when he served in the Army. This was to be his day --- but his day was not to be.

However, his family did organize a zoom conference where dozens of relatives participated and created a game atmosphere by wearing Dodger uniforms and singing "Take me out to the ball game". It was not a complete shut out.

Ken served in the U.S. Army from March of 1943 to October 1945. He first served in the Aleutians before transferring to Europe where he served in the "Battle of the Bulge".

A BIT OF HISTORY

Ford Flying Quail Radiator Cap

In the beginning of the 1920's having some sort of mascot or logo on the radiator cap of cars became popular. There were many kinds made from horses to bull dogs on large trucks to windmills to bows and arrows and even figures similar to the ones on the front of ancient sailing ships.

Henry Ford can be credited with selecting the quail as the Model A mascot. He told Irving Bacon, who worked for him, that he wanted something that would depict a quick getaway, the way he was advertising his cars. Bacon suggested a rabbit but Ford wanted something better than that. He suggested that a quail flushes out of the brush just like a firecracker going off. He thought a quail would be just right. So a quail it was, designed with wings down as though it were just starting to fly off.

Of the 5,000+ parts in the Model A, Ford seemed to be involving himself in every step in the design process of the quail. Hundreds of drawings and samples were made until he was satisfied. He was not an easy man to please before he got to what is familiar on the Model A today.

The Ford factory did not make the quail. It was made by the George Stant Machine Works that had been making other radiator caps for many years. They were located in eastern Indiana at Connersville. It was Model A part number A-18385. It cost less than \$1.00 to make and sold for \$3.00. In one year over 250,000 were made.

This accessory is cherished by the people that restore cars. Even though an original quail was inexpensive, one might sell for \$150.00 or more today, if it is in good condition.

The patent on making the quail radiator cap was never renewed so it is possible for factories to make reproductions today. Most dealers that have Model A parts sell a reproduction quail, but for much more than the \$3.00 it originally sold for. Most of the time if you see a quail on the radiator cap of a Model A today, it will be one of these reproduction quails made recently.

Flag Day - June 14

Origins of the Ahoogah

1. The very first Ford sold was to Dr. Pfennig in 1903, for a grand total of \$850. The "Model A" had a 2-cylinder engine, and could reach a max speed of 30 mph. William Clay Ford, Jr., or Bill Ford, currently owns the first Ford vehicle ever sold.

- 2 Henry Ford and Thomas Edison were lifelong friends. As requested by Ford, Thomas Edison's son captured Edison's last exhale in a test tube and sealed it with a cork. Ford kept the tube as a memorial to Edison's "life and breath."
- 3. Ford's signature blue, oval logo was not introduced until four years after the company had already been in production.
- 4. In 1964, after Ford debuted the Mustang, 94,000 pedal-powered toy mustangs were bought for children the following Christmas season.
- 5. In 1965, a Ford Mustang was transported in 4 separate pieces to the observation deck of the Empire State Building, using resident elevators, where it was reassembled and photographed by helicopter. The car was later reassembled inside the building, until it was eventually taken apart and removed from the building 5 months later.
- 6. The only car that Jim Morrison, legendary Doors singer, ever owned was a 1967 Shelby GT 500.
- 7. When former President Gerald Ford was describing his no-nonsense, style of governing, he was quoted as saying, "I'm a Ford, not a Lincoln," comparing President Lincoln's eloquence with Lincoln, the luxury car company owned by Ford Motor Company.

Pioneers in car-horn technology included Miller Reese Hutchison, an avid inventor who later became chief engineer for Thomas Edison's laboratory in West Orange, New Jersey. Among Hutchison's many inventions—which, ironically, also included an early hearing-aid device—was his car horn that

would become synonymous with an entire era.

The Klaxon. which patented in 1908, was Hutchison's most recognizable contribution to the car world. This unique-sounding device became as ubiquitous as the Ford Model T to which it was frequently attached. In cities around the world, the Model T's signature sound was the klaxon's unforgettable ahooga.



What gave the klaxon its unique sound? "There's a diaphragm that gets struck by teeth on a rotating wheel," Anderson explained. "There's an electric motor that drives it, but as the wheel comes up to speed you have that *ahoo*, and as it slows back down, that *gah* sound to it." After jumping from the Ford Model T to the Model A, the klaxon horn began to fade away by the 1930s. In its place arrived simpler electric horns which, by and large, have remained relatively the same up to the present day.

The Sixties Do The Twenties

Western fashion in the 1920's underwent a modernization. For women, fashion had continued to change away from the extravagant and restrictive styles of the Victorian and Edwardian periods towards looser clothing which revealed more of the arms and legs. This had begun at least a decade before with the rising of hemlines to the ankle and the movement from the S-bend corset to the columnar silhouette of the 1910's. Men also began to wear less formal day attire and athletic clothing or 'Sportswear' became a part of mainstream fashion for the first time.

The 1920's are characterized by two distinct periods of time. In the early part of the decade, change was slower, and there was the reluctance to wear the new, revealing styles. From 1925, the public more passionately embraced the styles now typically associated with the Roaring Twenties. These styles continued to characterize fashion until the worldwide depression in 1931.

During the 1920's, the notion of keeping up with fashion trends and expressing oneself through material goods seized middle-class Americans as never before. Purchasing new clothes, new appliances, new automobiles, new anything's indicated one's level of prosperity. Being considered old-fashioned, out of date, or-worse yet- unable to afford stylish new products was something Americans went to great lengths to avoid.



For women, face, figure, coiffure, posture, and grooming had become important factors in addition to clothing. In particular, cosmetics became a major industry. Women did not feel ashamed for caring about their appearance and it was a declaration of self-worth and vanity, which was why they no longer wanted to achieve a natural look.


An interesting aside I would like to note is that the 1960's are commonly referred to as: "The Sixties Do the Twenties". You may recall the sixties included a young woman model from England known as: "Twiggy". She was all the rage in 1967, and 1968! Her figure was skinny, and androgynous. Her hair style noted as the "Twiggy hair cut" was very short and similar to a "bobbed" style of the twenties. She wore very short skirts which were called "mini-skirts", and were soon the new version of flapper-like dress. This style of dress got some of us in trouble when wearing them to school or at the office. Although I think that they became much more popular and accepted as time went on.

I also recall that the Pasadena schools began allowing girls to wear pants soon after that to school. Hummm?

In the following discussion about make-up in the Twenties try to remember Twiggy's eye makeup. She brought in a new style which had women drawing an extra set of eyelashes below their lower lashes!

Back to the era of the Twenties now, we learn about the new evenings and events make-up looks. The popular look was a smoky eye with long lashes, rosy cheeks and a bold lip. Women also started wearing foundation, and using pressed powder.

With the invention of the swivel lipstick, lipstick was on the rise with bright colors women could apply to their lips to achieve a Cupid's bow and "bee stung" look.

Glamour was now an important fashion trend due to the motion picture industry. The actors in movies wore lots of make-up for the cameras. They wore beautiful clothing, and were idolized by women and men alike.

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














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
