Just Bob - Bob - Bobbing Along

Tracing back the roots of bobbed hair helps us to understand more about the 1920's, when our treasured Model A's were fresh from the factory floor. The term "bobbed" hair is one used to describe a cutting off of a woman's hair from traditional long styles to much shorter styles. The implications of this act are historically and culturally based.

Back in the 1890s a trendsetter in France, а woman by the name of Marie Bouchaud was wearing short skirts and cropped hair. She was not typical! Womenswear at the time consisted of constricting corsets which tightly cinched women's waists in order to create a more feminine hour-glass figure. Skirts were long, sleeves were long and collars reached up to the neck! The very popular and almost universally worn hair style of the period was "Gibson called the Girl"



Ladies' long hair was

carefully styled up, and secured almost atop the head so it was fuller looking and occasional wispy tendrils of hair were allowed to fall out to frame the face.

As the new century approached, styles were beginning to move forward. Skirt lengths slowly came up and off the floor. By the 1910's women's clothing became much less structured and constrictive. The waistlines dropped to a very low waist and dresses and other women's garments followed suit. Skirt lengths were above the ankles. During these changes the corsets were no longer worn. What a liberation for all women! Now they could take deep cleansing breaths of air.



This manner of dressing was becoming more relaxed, and during the Art Nouveau period of the teens into very early twenties, dresses were soft and comfortable. Beautiful embroidery of nature such as leaves, flowers and other natural themes were used. Lighter more comfortable fabrics and colors were popular. Hair styles were worn simply, and flowing as even furniture of the period was created to appear like nature with curving and rounded edges. Hair styles were still long.

Hair has historically been seen as a woman's crowning glory. It represented a woman's power, and actually still does. Long hair is an archetypical symbol of strength and beauty in women. This is one of the main reasons that women were so reticent



to relinquish their long locks! Young girls and girls into their teens were expected to wear their hair long and down. The idea was that when maiden hood ended the hair went up atop the head and off of the shoulders. Usually this rite of passage occurred upon marriage. Young women were expected to take a husband while still quite young. This meant that babies came along and with them, many responsibilities. Caring for children, cooking and cleaning, as well as doing the laundry for the entire family were daily chores. Most women sewed the family's clothing, and



mended them. They also knitted and crocheted to create warm sweaters, hats and gloves for the winter. In addition to all of this, many women sewed recreationally in order to embroider linens, and curtains. Some ladies made lace to decorate linens, doilies and such. They did this by "tatting", an old fading art. Don't forget about quilting and the popular quilting bees where ladies met to sew and socialize.

I am trying to give an in-depth account of women and their hair from an historical point as to provide an appreciation of the enormity of change that had to occur so that the bobbing of women's hair can be seen in it's historical perspective.

Let There Be Light

From early on, Model A owners have been attempting to improve upon the light from the original headlights. Almost from the start of production, higher output bulbs were available and when "sealed beam" headlight units became available in 1940, aftermarket adapter kits that allowed sealed beam units to be installed in the original Model A headlights were offered for sale. About 40 years ago, quartz replacement bulbs were being sold. While all of these "improvements" did make the headlights brighter, there were drawbacks with all of them. All required more current to operate and often the owner would also have to upgrade the vehicles charging system. With the case of the quartz bulbs, when illuminated they were very hot and often a failure would occur when the special sockets or the wire connections would melt.

Within the past few years, several versions of LED Headlight bulbs that promised brighter light with less current draw have come on the market. Most of the more "mature" Model A owners with eyes that no longer see as well welcome brighter headlights. Less current draw is especially attractive to those of us who do use our Model A's for night driving and touring that are still equipped with the original 6 volt generator charging system, just as Henry intended. No modifications were required when using these LED bulbs. They simply replaced the existing bulbs in the original sockets.

In 2018, I purchased a pair of LED bulbs for my '30 Tudor. that I use for touring. I found the lights were brighter, but it was impossible to actually focus the light to where it was needed. The end result was more light, but it was all over the place. The 50/32 CP incandescent bulbs that I had been using were able to be focused and provided better usable light down on the road where it was needed. These first generation LED bulbs did provide more light and only drew a few amps to operate, but in reality they were less than satisfactory.

Recently, a second generation "pre-focused" LED headlight bulb has come on the market. They have all the good qualities of the original LED bulbs but incorporate their own built in reflector which eliminates the problem of focus. Pre-focused LED bulbs are brighter, require much less current to operate and the light they produce is able to be directed onto the road. They are also are a direct replacement for the original incandescent bulbs. I have not done a lot of night driving since I installed these new pre-focused LED bulbs. I am satisfied that they will be a good solution for those Model A owners wanting brighter, more usable light with less current draw.

Tech Tip

Anti-freeze Warning - If you are using Anti-Freeze in the cooling system of your Model A, be sure to use Antifreeze formulated for older cars. Components in anti-freeze that is formulated for newer cars with Aluminum radiators may degrade the solder in the old radiators in our Model A's causing failure of the cooling system Always look for anti-freeze that is labeled "for older cars" or cars made before 1998 or cars with copper radiators. DO NOT use antifreeze that is formulated with organic acid technology (OAT).

Santa Ana Army Air Base

During World War Two Orange County California was Missile Battalion brought the Nike-Hercules system host to one of the largest army air training centers in the from Fort Bliss and temporarily installed and country. It was an air base with no runways, hangars, or operated it at the old SAAAB site until their airplanes. Thousands of young men destined to become permanent installations (Site LA-88) in Chatsworth pilots, navigators, and bombardiers went through nine weeks of initial processing and training here. Ground was broken for the facility on October 23, 1941 and it was land was divided for many uses. In the postwar years activated on February 23, 1942. The base was located between Harbor Boulevard on the west, Newport the Costa Mesa Air National Guard Station, and the Boulevard on the east, Baker Street on the north, and Orange County Fairground shared the land. Many of Wilson Street on the south.

Turnover of personnel was rapid so that by the end of 1942 23,470 soldiers had passed through SAAAB. By the end of 1943 that number jumped to 57,895. In the fall of 1942 SAAAB became an Overseas Replacement Depot (ORD) housing Army Air Force personnel awaiting transportation overseas. In November of 1943 members of the Women's Air Service Pilots (WASP) began training at the base, followed shortly by members of the Women's Army Corp (WAC). In 1945 SAAAB became one of six Redistribution Centers in the country for airmen returning from overseas who were to be assigned stateside duty. In late 1945 Japanese aliens from the internment camps who were being returned to Japan by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) were housed here while awaiting transportation back to Japan.

SAAAB continued as a redistribution and separation center for a short time after the war. On March 31, 1946, the base was officially deactivated. However, in 1956 elements of the 551st Antiaircraft Artillery and atop Oak Mountain were completed. In 1958 the base was declared surplus and soon afterwards the private homes, apartments, Orange Coast College, the base's original buildings remained in use for years by the college and the fair grounds.

It is interesting to note that a young John Riggs (Orange County Model A Ford Club) received his initial training here prior to advancing to pilot training, eventually to become a B-25 pilot and commissioned as a second lieutenant. At the same time a young Charlie Viosca trained here and became a B-17 pilot and was also commissioned a second lieutenant. Charlie currently lives in Frisco, TX (Dallas Model A Ford Club) and is the founder of the Victoria Association, the Model A Ford Youth Scholarship Program, and the Youth Restoration Program.


