A BIT OF HISTORY

Bonny & Clyde! Fact & Fiction By Tom Endy

Most people living today have a conception of the life and times of Bonny Parker and Clyde Barrow based on the 1967 Hollywood movie "Bonny & Clyde". The movie starred Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway. Both actors were tall and beautiful; the real Bonny & Clyde were anything but that. Their two-year reign of terror was depicted as adventurous, when in fact they endured a dreary, painful existence until they were finally put out of their misery. The movie is good entertainment, but certainly not factual. The ambush scene comes the closest to the actual truth.

A third character in the movie was that of **C. W. Moss** (played by Michael J. Pollard), a somewhat goofy teen-ager cast as part of the Barrow gang. The character is fictional and was a melding of two factual people who were members of the gang at different times. The first was W. D. Jones, just 16- years old when he joined the gang. The second was Henry Methvin, a hardened criminal in his early 20's. It was Methvin's father who in fact set up Bonny & Clyde for the ambush in return for a pardon for his son Henry.

Today there is an antique auto parts store in the City of Orange in Southern California that goes by the name **C. W. Moss.** The 1934 V8 Ford Bonny & Clyde were ambushed in is still around. The car was stolen from Ruth Warren of Topeka, Kansas on April 29, 1934. After the ambush Ms. Warren filed a Federal lawsuit to regain custody of the car. She eventually sold it to Charles W. Stanley who toured the country with it until the early 1950's. Today the car is on display at a gambling casino in Stateline, Nevada.

The ambush took place on May 23, 1934 outside of the small town of Gibsland, Louisiana. Six law enforcement officers lay in wait on a lonely road. The disabled truck of Henry Methvin's father was set up as a decoy along the road. When Clyde Barrow stopped to offer assistance the officers opened up with a barrage from high-powered automatic riles, including several BAR's. They were no more than 30 feet away. The first burst hit Clyde in the head and he was killed instantly. All six officers continued pouring fire into the vehicle and essentially shot the occupants to pieces. Texas Ranger Frank Hamer, the officer in charge, walked around to the passenger side of car and fired several more rounds point blank into Bonny's lifeless body He could clearly see that Clyde was already dead.

Today the town of Gibsland thrives on a Bonny & Clyde tourist industry.

Henry Methvin was given a pardon by the states of Texas and Louisiana as promised. However, the state of Oklahoma had made no such agreement. Henry was extradited to Oklahoma and convicted of murder and sentenced to death. The sentence was later commuted to life in prison and he was paroled after 8 years. He was shot to death some years later.

Articles written about Bonny & Clyde during their life, and for a number of years after, were in many cases exaggerated, contained inaccuracies, and in some cases downright untrue. Even articles written later by surviving family members are suspect, as many of them were covering their own involvement in harboring the two fugitives. Clyde Barrow is said to have murdered more than a dozen people.

The Dreaded Vapor Lock Why Does My Model A Not Want to Run Right on a Hot Day?

Back in February, our club had a tour out to the Chino clear and cool and it was a pleasure to get the car out for an but that afternoon when returning back home it was another story. After a few miles of driving, when I would have to to idle and had a great deal of difficulty getting back up to speed again. Once up to speed, the car would run better and was fine until the next stop light was encountered. I was able to nurse the car home but there were a few times that I thought I may have to stop and raise the hood. I suspected had gotten into in one of the jets.

The next morning, I took the car to my shop to fix the happening if the conditions are right. problem. It was cool and the Tudor ran very well with no apparent problems. Upon disassembly of the carburetor, I did not find any evidence of dirt and everything seemed to be in order so what was going on? Model A problems usually do not just fix themselves on their own but require some kind of intervention.

A few days later when I heard some others who had been on the tour had similar problems, it finally dawned on me that what we had experienced was "Vapor Lock". Vapor lock usually only happens in the summer on a hot day when driving in the mountains. Our tour was in February and we were also near sea level so how could this have happened?

Vapor Lock occurs when somewhere in the fuel delivery system, the liquid fuel boils, or changes state from a liquid to a gas (or vapor). The Model A carburetor depends on the fuel being in a liquid state in order for it to meter and atomize the fuel into the correct mixture with the incoming air.

The tendency for liquid fuel to change state from a liquid to a gas is governed by 3 factors: temperature, atmospheric pressure and the fuel itself. Elevated temperature and low atmospheric pressure, such as driving to the mountains on a hot day can promote boiling of the liquid fuel. The to find the right amount of additive that formulation of the fuel itself will also determine its boiling point. California mandates a special "Winter Blend" fuel for

again getting back up to speed, the cooler fuel entering the hot carburetor would reduce the temperature of the fuel already in the carburetor and the boiling would stop. The engine would then run well until the next time the car had to come to a stop.

What can be done to prevent vapor lock? We cannot come to a stop at a traffic light, the engine would not want reduce the tendency of the fuel to boil by increasing the atmospheric pressure so this is not an option. We cannot reduce the temperature of the fuel in the tank unless we want to use some sort of a refrigeration system which is not practical. However, we can do a few small things such as insulators or heat shielding to reduce the temperature of the the problem was in the carburetor with a piece of dirt that carburetor itself. The most effective remedy available to us is to increase the boiling point of the fuel itself. This can easily be done by

> adding something to the fuel which many owners of old cars have been doing for vears. Fuel stabilizers such



as "Sta-bil"" not only extends the life of today's fuels but will also raise the boiling point a little. However, this can be costly especially if driving long distances such as when on an extended tour. Adding Marvel Mystery Oil (MMO) will help and also keep the valves lubricated.

A more cost effective

solution may be to add a little diesel fuel or mineral spirits (paint thinner) to every tank full. Early V-8 Ford owners have been using mineral spirits or diesel fuel for many years in their flat head Fords which are very prone to vapor lock.

You will have to experiment a little will work well for you. For fuel stabilizers,



start with half the amount suggested on the label for fuel in our area that has a lower vapor pressure or boiling point long term storage. One California club is teaching auto tech with a Model A+ approach



Dr. Wilbert Smith epitomizes classic car culture. Born in 1950, he grew up working on cars. In 1975, he bought his first Model A for \$2500, a purchase that inspired a 47-year obsession and multi-model collection. Smith loved the history, and he loved the stories and unique connections he made with fellow members of the Santa Anita A's—a Pasadena-area charter member of the Model A Ford Club of America.

"The average age in our local club is 75," Smith says. "Together, we're 125 families who collectively own over 200 Model As. But we realized our demographic isn't getting any younger, which means a lot of these great cars will soon be coming up for sale without buyers."

This old story took a refreshing new turn in 2016, when Smith and other club members hopped into 25 of their freshly polished As and went to the local high school.

"We decided that the best approach to find young people and generate interest in the Ford Model A hobby was to put the kids in the seats of our cars and let them put their little fingerprints all over the vehicles," says Smith. "The effort was an extreme success. We had about 100 kids say they were interested in learning more about the Model A." And so, the first car club of its kind in America was born—the Pasadena High School Model A Ford Club. School administrators supported the idea but lacked the money to fund a new campus club. Also, schools in the district didn't teach auto shop anymore (a sad trend seen around the nation); the shop space at Pasadena High School hadn't been used since 1982, well before any of the students—and possibly even their parents—were born. "To be totally self-sufficient, our funding strategy for the club is a very simple one," says Smith. "We find a Model A in moderate condition and determine if it's something that we can restore without putting an extreme amount of resources into it. We then work with the kids in the campus's retired auto shop after school to fully restore that vehicle and then raffle it off."

From upholstery to engine work, Smith taps his own self-taught mechanical skills, along with a rotating team of fellow Model A restoration expert/ volunteers, who enthusiastically pass their knowledge on to teens working hands-on through rust, sweat, and happy tears. The club's 25 members—all 9th through 12th graders—have delivered a fully restored Model A for raffle every year, on average. Tickets sell for \$100 each. All money raised goes to provide seed funding for the next year's project.

"The club's restoration efforts are very serious," Smith says with pride. "Last year's 1928 Model A Phaeton was a perfect example. It came all the way from the East Coast. Our kids not only put the body and fender work together, they restored it to the point that it looked like it just rolled off the showroom floor."

Only six years since the club's founding, Smith says the experience and mentorship have already inspired a number of high schoolers to get into auto body repair. Restoration seminars and field trips developed through a partnership with Pasadena City College have helped funnel interested students into the college's auto tech curriculum, as well. No one has yet offered to buy one of the Model As owned by an aging member of the Santa Anita's A's.

"Maybe someday," Smith says with a laugh. The original, and some might say "self-serving," desire that drove him and his fellow club members to start reaching out to the next generation has been replaced by all the other great things that come with teaching the art of restoring an old vehicle.

"Kids in the club not only learn to be part of a team and an organization, but they also realize that they could not restore a vehicle on their own. They work on the transmission, the undercarriage, the braking system—they learn that it takes various individuals working together and learning skills to make it all happen. They're fortunate to be doing things that other kids in the Pasadena school district will never see or come close to. And we're very proud of that."
