



NEW MEMBER SPOTLIGHT BY BOB MOORE

Jeff Headley is our newest member. He grew up in nearby Glendale and graduated from Hoover High School in 1971, then Cal State Northridge in 1975, before deciding he wanted to drive on the other side of the road.

"Go west, young man" was in his DNA, and he moved to Australia. There he received a Master's Degree in Global Project Management and an MBA from Torrens University Adelaide, while also



becoming Australia's first Microsoft Certified Professional. Jeff spent several decades in Australia and China managing large projects. He re-opened Australia's first iron ore mine that had been closed for decades, migrated a state's electrical utility's data centers into "the cloud", and managed the redesign and automation of Australia's largest steel-making plant, among other challenges.

Now Jeff's back in the US as project manager for a state of Nevada software system that will automate the permits and routing of oversized vehicles on major highways.

About 20 years ago in Middleton, a tiny country town in rural South Australia, Jeff stopped at a Ford dealer and chatted with the very elderly owner. He greatly admired their brand new looking Model A in the showroom. The man in his 80s called it a 1927 Model A, saying they put it on display when they opened in January 1927. Jeff pointed out that car didn't roll off the assembly line until later that year, and was officially a 1928. The old man leaned across the counter, looked him in the eye, and replied with a grin, "You're far too young to know that!"

Jeff restored his first Model A in high school and college. He's now doing a full restoration of a 1928 Tudor. He splits his time between Carson City, Nevada, where his father (and currently the Tudor) live, and Glendale. Jeff has pulled the A entirely apart and is reassembling it as nearly original. The only modifications will be a Burtz engine which has just arrived, hydraulic brakes already installed by Bowling Brothers in Lindsay, CA, and a Mitchell overdrive. So not only should it tour faster, it might also be able to stop.

We hope Jeff's schedule will allow him to be in Glendale on one of our meeting days. Jeff told me that he knows the church very well, and his 1930 sedan-with-a-rumble-seat made many trips there during college. He used to date the church organist, Martha, who lived in a house behind the church while she attended UCLA.

Why did Jeff select the Santa Anita A's? Chris Wickersham's articles in our newsletters caught his eye. He identified Chris as someone with undeniable wisdom. He also speaks highly of Tom Endy's articles on the website. And he said he enjoys reading and hearing about how the whole group loves our mutual passion.

A BIT OF HISTORY

This is one of a series of articles Tom Endy wrote some years ago. These articles will be reprinted in Spoken Wheels from time to time.

Fordlandia

Fordlandia was the name of a settlement in Brazil established by Henry Ford in 1928. The purpose was to produce natural rubber for Model A tires. The enterprise was a colossal failure costing The Ford Motor Company over twenty million dollars.

At the time the British and Dutch had a lock on the world's natural rubber trade. They formed a rubber baron cartel that controlled market prices similar to the oil cartel of today. Natural rubber was produced from rubber trees grown in Southeast Asia. The trees had actually been imported from Brazil, where they grew wild.

Henry believed that he could establish rubber tree plantations in Brazil. Unfortunately rubber trees do not fair well in their native land due to leaf blight. Henry also did not originally include botanists with the management organization he sent to Fordlandia. The attempt was to build an American style settlement in the jungle. A rubber processing plant, power plant, modern hospital, library, golf course, hotel, and row after row of Midwestern style clapboard houses were erected.

The plan was to run the operation much like his auto assembly plant. He also insisted that the native workers adhere to his strict standard of moral behavior. Alcohol was banned from Fordlandia, and he insisted that all workers learn to dance and attend his weekly square dance sessions.

Though he paid the native workers 37 cent an hour, which was twice the going rate, they disliked the cultural constrictions placed on them. In 1930 they rioted and caused wide spread damage. The Brazilian Army had to be called in to restore order.

Belterra did not prosper either and continued to drain money from the Ford Motor Company. During World War II synthetic rubber was developed and the market for natural rubber for tires no longer existed. In 1945 Henry Ford II discontinued operations at Belterra and sold all the property back to the Brazilian government for \$250,000, which was a fraction of what was paid for both Fordlandia and Belterra. Many of the buildings of the doomed effort at Fordlandia and Belterra still stand today.

Fordlandia by Greg Grandin, ISBN 10: 0-850-8236-0, published in 2009, is an account of the adventure.

Parts Cleaning and when NOT to use a Bead Blaster.

When working on our old Model A Fords, often a lot of time is spent cleaning the parts after a component has been disassembled for repair or restoration. When doing engine work in the "Old Days", we would use solvents such as kerosene or even gasoline (which is absolutely not recommended) to wash off all the old grease and grime. This was a dirty and time consuming job but often there was not a better way, especially for the amateur mechanic working out of his garage. Today however, the hobbyist may have a much better equipped work shop with some of the latest tools to help with the task at hand. One such piece of equipment is a Bead Blaster.

In recent years, bead blasters, and the larger air compressors necessary for their operation, have become more affordable. Bead blasters save a lot of time and work very well for cleaning a lot of different types of parts but there are some components that definitely should NOT be bead blasted. A good general rule is "Any surface that is exposed to any lubricant SHOULD NOT be blasted with glass beads or any other type of abrasive media". This would not only include engine components, but the housings and internal parts of the transmission and differential. The reason for this is that it is almost impossible to remove all the old glass beads and the new lubricating oil will loosen these residual beads and they will get mixed in with the oil. Glass beads are very hard and abrasive and will cause bearings and other finely machined surfaces to wear premature and fail. I have seen several engines ruined when they were assembled with parts that had been cleaned using a bead blaster.

Recently, when putting together several of the new Burtz Engines, some owners thought they were doing me a big favor by bringing me used parts, such as the oil pan and front and side covers, that they had cleaned and painted and were ready for assembly. This was fine and much appreciated except when a bead blaster had been used to clean the parts. I then had to spend a lot of extra time washing and scrubbing the bead blasted parts to be as sure as I could that all the old beads had been removed and were not stuck in the pores of the cast iron or caught in some old residual grime that had not been completely removed.

One particularly difficult part to clean is the oil pan dipper tray. There are three baffles that are spot welded to the underside of the tray. The flanges of the baffles do not perfectly conform to the shape of the tray which results in small voids between the tray and baffles. Thru the years, sludge and old oil residue will fill these voids and when the tray is blasted, glass beads will be trapped and imbedded in this old crud only to be released back into the clean oil once the engine is completed and running. Once the part has been bead blasted, it is virtually impossible to perfectly clean all the trapped beads out of these voids. To be sure these voids are absolutely clean if a dipper tray has been bead blasted, the spot welds have to be drilled out and the baffles removed from the tray. After the areas where the baffles fit to the tray have all been throughly cleaned, the baffles can then be re-welded to the tray. This is a time consuming but necessary process.

Another popular part to bead blast is the intake manifold. The inside passages in the manifold are rough and also will often have accumulated a coating of old dried up fuel that the beads can become imbedded in. Fuel in the incoming mixture can pick up these trapped beads and when they go thru the engine they can score the pistons and cylinder walls. No matter how hard you try, you cannot be completely sure that all the old beads have been removed from the inside passages of a manifold.

So, how do you clean these types of parts? For the hobbyist, soaking parts in solvent is a good place to start. Old paint can be removed using paint remover and a motorized wire wheel is also a great tool. Rusty parts can be soaked in a rust dissolving solution such as Evapo Rust or Rust 911. The final clean for any part should be a good scrubbing using soap and hot water. This will leave the surface clean and free of oil and solvent and the part will then be ready to paint or assemble into the engine.

To summarize, using a bead blaster to clean parts such as bumper brackets and similar chassis or body components is fine but DO NOT glass bead any part that will be exposed to fuel or lubricating oil. Remember, as Henry always said, "Cleanliness is next to Fordliness".

Tech Tip

Removing the Dipper Tray from the Oil Pan

I use an old headlight bar as a lever to remove the dipper tray from the oil pan. I find the 28-29 headlight bar works best but the 30-31 will also do the job. With the pan on the floor, just hook the end of the headlight bar under the tray in the opening for the oil pump. Use your foot to hold down the other side of the pan and a sharp downward push on the bar and the tray will pop right out.

Santa Anita Club Member Doug Nielsen Passes

Doug Nielsen passed away peacefully in his sleep from natural causes on June 8, 2022, at the age of 84.

Doug was born in Ringsted, Iowa in 1937 and moved to Los Angeles after serving in the U.S. Army for two years. He met and married Helene, his next



door neighbor. They moved to South Pasadena where they raised three children. Doug and Helene joined the Santa Anita A's in October of 1999 and owned a number of Model A's.

They were both active until Helene died some years ago. They were previous editors of the Spoken Wheels.


Nielsens' Document history of Member's Cars

While they were editors of the Spoken Wheels, Doug and Helene Nielsen wrote a series of articles about Model A's owned by the Santa Anita A's club members. I was able to make copies of these stories for use in future issues of our newsletter. Following is the story he wrote about his 1931 Model A Ford Town Sedan. The article appeared in an early issue of Spoken Wheels.

Doug and Helene Nielsen's 1931 Town Sedan Named Thelma

In the summer of 2000, Doug had just gotten his 1930 Coupe on the road and looking good, when he decided that it would be nice to have an A with a little bit more room and one that could accommodate taking passengers without having them sit in the wind behind the driver's compartment. The late 1931 Fordor was always one of his favorites, after all it was not only larger, but the largest Model A made.

A search was made on the Internet and available car newsletters and magazines to locate a suitable second A. In June, 2000 a 1931 Panel Delivery was spotted on the Internet that was very appealing about the same time that a four door A was listed for sale in Pasadena. Doug was



impressed by the unique look of the Panel and ended up in Washington state to purchase it and have it delivered to South Pasadena.

Still somewhat curious about the Fordor Model A, as it was advertised, and shown with a very dark frontal photo that made it impossible to determine the model, he drove over to the Volkswagen dealership in Pasadena in his newly acquired Panel to check out the ad. The Panel was a big hit

with the VW staff as they were used to dealing in motorized inverted saucers and other nondescript vehicles. After a wide array of questions and an inspection of the Panel, Doug and the sales manager then went into the service bay to have a look at the Ford that was for sale. To Doug's surprise, it was a Slant Window Town Sedan.

The sales manager explained that the owner of the dealership had purchased the A over the Internet sight unseen from an individual in Chestnut Ridge, New York and had it shipped to Pasadena hoping to drive an antique car of his own. The A was never registered in the State of California as it was being carried as dealer inventory. After keeping it for only about six months, he decided to sell it as he was not familiar with A's and was disappointed with the lack of power, mechanical brakes and he thought the motor was constantly overheating.

The A was parked in front of the service department parts counter and the repairmen were required to walk around it each time they needed to get some parts. The sales manager was anxious to get rid of the car and free up the space as they were very crowded. Doug had to drive the car when it was taken for a test drive because no one else knew how to drive a Model A! After returning to the dealership, Doug indicated that he liked the A but had just purchased the Panel, and another car at this time would put a squeeze on the Model A budget. He was, however, hesitant to walk away from an A he wanted, so he made a lowball offer of about 75% of the asking price. To his surprise, after a call to the vacationing owner, a purchase was made the same day.

New drums, hubs and brakes put the car in great shape. It turns out the radiator was full of undiluted antifreeze which was churned by the overactive Model A water pump and bubbled out around the radiator cap. Draining the radiator and filling it with water and a small amount of soluble oil ended what appeared to be a problem. The engine works great. Doug has since had a Mitchell overdrive installed and says he really likes it and is sure that Henry would have put his mark of approval on the unit if it had been available. The A is painted Ford maroon and black and has vermilion red striping.

All in the Family



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

















