I grew up in Fox Lake Illinois. Both my parents had family from Fox Lake going back over 100 years. Fox Lake is one of a dozen lakes connected by rivers and channels that is collectively known as the Chain of Lakes. We were just south of the



Illinois/Wisconsin border about 25 miles or so west of Lake Michigan.

I acquired my 1929 Tudor in 1987. It had been someone's project and they passed it on to me. I do not know much about the car's history. It did have a 1966 city sticker on the wind shield from Sterling Illinois. I did not do much with the car other than put on new white wall tires, powder coated the spiked rims, and installed a new exhaust system. The car ran very well for the few years that I drove it. Winters in Fox Lake could be long and brutal back then. Normally when one possessed an old vehicle in the Midwest, you park the car in November and keep it off the streets until April and then only when the roads are dry would you take it for a drive. It takes a few good rains before the salt has washed off the roads.

It was one weekend during mid-winter in 1988 that the conditions were such that I took the old car for a spin. My driveway was clear, the roads were dry, so I took off and drove to a boat launch at the end of our peninsula. Snow was packed on our frozen lake and I drove over the ice. I spent the day visiting friends who either lived on the lake or off the numerous channels. I gave my friends rides. I took off across the main part of the lake and caught the attention of a pack of snowmobilers who came along side me and followed me for a time. I visited the east shore of the lake and discovered that the snow was rather deep due to the prevailing winds. I had two dear friends in the car, Bud Ericksen and Ray Agger. We ended up circling Columbia Bay in very deep snow, but to my surprise we never got stuck. As it got late In the day, I set off for home and returned to the western shore of Fox Lake. When I got to the spot off from the Mineola Hotel where the fishing was good, there were still a number of ice shacks on the ice. By law, fishermen are not allowed to leave their shacks out overnight unattended. I noticed some guys pulling their shacks back towards shore. I pulled along side them and had them tie their shacks to my back bumper, and they would ride on the running board until we got to shore. When I was done with that, I returned to the boat launch which was at Korpan's landing. The bar at Korpan's was packed and I suppose word had spread about the lunatic in the Model A

driving around the lake that day. It was a warm welcome home and I thoroughly enjoyed that cold winter day.

I moved to California on New Years Eve in 1989. It was a temporary move, but I fell in love with the climate and the area. I wanted to make a career change. I live in Alhambra and do volunteer work at the Angeles National Forest (Echo Mountain/ Mt. Lowe RR) and the railroad museum in San Dimas and in Perris, CA.

My plan is to get the car running again, restore it and and have it finally finished once and for all. I want to leave it in better condition than I found it. I have only been to three meetings of the Santa Anita A's club. I am looking forward to getting to know you.

Five Reasons Why We (and Everyone Else) Love the Ford Model A

It's that time of year again, and Old Car Festival inside the Henry Ford's Greenfield Village is the place to see Ford Model As. The beloved automobile will make up almost a quarter of the sweet rides on



display this year. But wait, Old Car Festival covers 42 years of vehicles, 1890-1932, so why are there so many from the four years the Model A was produced? After some research and talking with our Curator of Transportation, Matt Anderson, here's why.

5. You can drive it on the road

Okay, this one seems pretty obvious. But some restored vehicles, no matter how sexy they look, tend to putt along on side streets with lower speed limits. With higher speeds and better brakes, Model As are known to drive pretty darn well on modern roads. Despite being 80+ years old, many Model As can cruise easily at 40-45 miles per hour thanks to an engine exactly twice as powerful as its predecessor, the Model T. And the Model A's mechanical brake system on the wheels—admittedly less secure than a hydraulic brake system—is safer than the Model T's mechanical brakes on the transmission.

Of course, Model Ts are still extremely popular and drivable, but most vintage car owners want to show off their prized vehicles on the open road, and the Model A gives us more route options. Racing down the freeway might not be an option, but give the car a break—the Model A is older than some of our grandmas. And my grandma doesn't drive the freeway, either.

4. You can learn to drive it without a historian present

So the Model A can handle the road. But more importantly, today's drivers can handle the Model A. The car was the first Ford to have controls we're used to, like gas pedals and a conventional gear-shift lever to name a few. Before the Model A Ford "horseless carriages" like the Model T were built under the assumption the driver only had experience driving, well a carriage, horse included.

More modern controls in the Model A help drivers like me and you guess how to, you know, put it in gear or make it stop. We might still need to Google, "how to drive a Model A," but at least we're not completely lost at the wheel.

3. Replacement parts are not crazy difficult to find

If you've got a vintage car that's the coolest, most obscure, one-of-three-ever-made—congratulations. But you know where I'm going with this. Collectors of rare cars dread the day they need to replace a part because finding one or getting a new one made is no easy task. Not all car buffs have the luxury of that kind of time, energy or money.

But with the Model A, a lot of original parts are still floating around out there since Ford built right around 5 million Model As between the 1928 and 1931 model years. And as our Model A love is no secret, there are now vendors who make less expensive, sometimes more reliable copies of vintage parts. So the Model A is a sweet vintage vehicle, plus, the replacement parts are comparatively easier to get ahold of. Especially if you look in the right places, like Bert's Model A Ford Store in Denver or the Model A Ford Club of America's classified ads.

We're not saying restoring a Model A is easy by any means, but the availability of parts opens up the art of car restoration to more of us because the Model A is fun to restore and maintain, not a giant headache.

2. They're relatively affordable

This isn't rocket science, but it's true. Let's revisit a fun-fact we gave you two paragraphs ago: about 5 million Ford Model As were made, and a lot of them are still around. So the Model A is historic, but it isn't quite rare enough to cost an arm and a leg—a phrase which here means the \$70,000 you could pay for a Packard of the same vintage. Yikes.

Some highly scientific research (looking on eBay) revealed there are decent Model As out there priced as low as \$6,000. What's not to love about that?

1. Eye-popping styles and colors

There is a practical side to car restoration, like finding replacement parts and choosing drivable routes, but we can't deny the Model A is just pretty. Seriously, we could stare at this car all day.

With new sporty body-styling, the Model A was an instant hit. Millions of people stormed Ford showrooms on December 2, 1927 because, as an Irving Kaufman song of the time period claimed, "Henry's made a lady out of Lizzie." Well, we think Lizzie was always a lady, but the Model A undoubtedly brought some serious class to the early American auto scene, styled to look like "a baby Lincoln," and offered in an array of colors, contrasting with all those black Model Ts. For all his mechanical prowess, Henry Ford didn't have much of an eye for style, but his son Edsel gave the Model A body the elegant finesse that we can't get over. And today, especially in the Motor City, taking a pleasure cruise in a piece of automobile history is really a special treat.

With the looks, the performance and doable restoration--it's no wonder we love the Model A so much! We can't wait to see the approximately 200 stunning, unique Model As driving the streets of Greenfield Village or parked for up-close ogling during Old Car Festival this year. Join us this weekend and we can drool over wire wheels and glossy colored fenders together.



Adjusting Valves

Does your engine talk to you every time you start up your Model A? Do you hear a constant Clack-Clack-Clack as you drive down the road? If so, it is possible that your valves need adjusting. A constant click-click-click noise that increases in frequency as the speed of the engine increases may indicate one or more of your valves are a little loose. Valve noise should not be confused with timing gear or cam noise. Timing gear or cam noise usually only occurs at idle or very low engine speeds and will often go away as engine speed increases.

Some published procedures for adjusting Model A valves call for the crankshaft to be rotated until #1 piston is at the top of its compression stroke and then 4 valves can be adjusted. The crankshaft is then rotated 1 full turn and the other 4 valves are adjusted. This procedure MAY work with an original Model A cam but MAY NOT work with most re-ground, Model B or aftermarket cams. The problem is the clearance between the valve stem and the lifter (tappet) must be checked when the lifter is on the heel of the cam and not close to the cam lobe. With the "4 valves at a time" procedure, some lifters are very close to the actual lobe of the cam and the quieting ramp (lash ramp) portion of the lobe may be partly under the lifter. Adjusting the clearance while the cam lobe is in this position will result in incorrect valve lash.

Before we go on, let us review some modern cam design terminology. The "CAM LOBE" is the raised part of the cam that the lifter rides on that causes the valve to open and close as the cam rotates. The "LIFTER", also known as the "CAM FOLLOWER" or "TAPPET", rides on the "CAM LOBE" and contacts



the end of the valve stem. As the "CAM LOBE" rotates under the "LIFTER", the "LIFTER" moves up and down causing the valve to open and close. "VALVE CLEARANCE" or "LASH" is the space or clearance between the end of the valve stem and the top of the lifter when the valve is in the closed position.

Valve "LASH" is necessary to insure that, when closed, the valve is tight on its seat and not held partly open by the "LIFTER". The "BASE CIRCLE" or "HEEL" of the cam is the round portion of the cam that is not part of the "LOBE".

The "OPENING" and "CLOSING RAMPS" are the portions of the "LOBE" that raises and lowers the lifter.

The "NOSE" is that part of the lobe that transitions between the "OPENING" and "CLOSING RAMPS". Now, as the cam rotates, just before the "OPENING RAMP" there is a "LASH RAMP" or as some of us old timers refer to as the "QUIETING RAMP. This "LASH RAMP" is designed to slide under the lifter and take up the valve "LASH" or clearance just prior to the "LIFTER" contacting the "OPENING RAMP". Taking up the "LASH" prior to raising the lifter results in quiet operation of the valves and lessons the wear on the lobe itself.

It is important when adjusting valve "LASH" to be sure the "CAM LOBE" is NOT in a position near the "LIFTER" and "LIFTER" is truly on the "HEEL" of the cam.

When adjusting valves, the following is the accepted procedure to insure the lifter is truly on the heel of the cam and not close to a lobe.

Start with #1 cylinder

FIRST, Rotate the crankshaft in the normal direction as when the engine is running (clockwise when standing at the front of the car) until the #1 cylinder EXHAUST VALVE JUST STARTS TO OPEN (when the valve just begins to lift off its seat). With the cam in this position, ADJUST THE INTAKE VALVE for #1 cylinder.

SECOND, Rotate the crankshaft until the #1 cylinder INTAKE VALVE JUST CLOSES (when the valve just comes to rest on its seat). With the cam in this position, ADJUST THE EXHAUST VALVE for #1 cylinder.

Repeat this procedure for the other three cylinders.


When following this procedure, you will find the cam lobe for the valve being adjusted is almost pointing straight down and is not close to the lifter.

To summarize, "Exhaust opens- adjust Intake, Intake closes-adjust Exhaust".

If you are using new adjustable lifters, be sure there are no rough spots or burrs on the head of the adjusting screw where it contacts the end of the valve stem. A burr can lead to an incorrect lash measurement.

This procedure will help you be sure your valves will be nice and quiet and your Model A engine will not talk to you as you drive down the road.

SPECIAL REPORT

BLT Guys Mitchell Install – December 14, 2022 by Tom Endy

A Mitchell overdrive installation was conducted by the BLT Guys organization on Wednesday, December 14, 2022 at my house. The car is a 1931 Coupe owned by Steve Pavich who lives in Fountain Valley, CA and is a member of the Orange County Model A Ford Club. We began slightly before 10 AM and the car was road tested at around 2:30 PM. A \$500 installation fee was donated to the Model A Youth Restoration Award Program. There was a good turnout of BLT Guys willing to work including two from the Santa Anita A's Model A club.



The overdrive was purchased new from the Mitchell Overdrive Company in 1999 and remained undisturbed in the box all the years and was recently sold to Steve Pavich The 31 Coupe was recently purchased by Steve and had been driven very little in the past 35 years. The car also has hydraulic brakes.

There were a number of show stoppers that had to be overcome during the installation process. A bracket was welded to the top of the toque tube that contained the hydraulic brake lines that had to be cut loose. The two pinion bearings and the double race were shot and had to be replaced and the pre-load set. The banjo was full of sludge and had to be flushed out with paint thinner and the oil replaced. The overdrive was stiff to rotate and difficult to shift in and out of gear from sitting all the years. During the road test it began loosening up. The hydraulic brake lines had to be bled. This early overdrive housing does not contain a threaded boss to mount the vent valve, even though a vent valve was included in the overdrive kit. The owner will have to fabricate a vent valve boss in the top fill plug later on.

At the end of the day the car performed as Steve Mitchell and Henry Ford ordered.


